In addition, we need to thank our volunteer Board of Trustees that oversees all aspects of the school and for whom the future of the school is a daily responsibility. We can look ahead to our next event. On Friday, May 6, Lieutenant Governor Kerry Healy will officially dedicate our school building as the permanent home of South Shore Charter Public School. You will be receiving more details, but all of our families will be invited to this celebration that will include the culmination of National Charter School week and the official celebration of our tenth anniversary as a school. We have much to celebrate and we will want you all to join in that celebration.

Thanks to you all for all your work and support...Spring is here and the rejuvenation that the season symbolizes will give us impetus to join together in making our school even stronger. Plan to come together for the April 30 parent social, the May 6 dedication celebration, the May 14 carnival, June 4 graduation and the June 12 picnic...they should help to make this a memorable finish to an amazing year.

FROM THE PROJECT DIRECTOR

The SSCPS community has just completed a number of impressive community service initiatives as part of Community Service Week.

Levels 1 & 2 performed a canned food drive to benefit families in the greater Boston area. The food drive initiative was aided by Nicole Keiley and Art Force. A group of Level 1 students will take part in a hop'athon to benefit Easter Seals.

Level 2's wood working project, led by Colin Gibney, produced a lovely blue bird house, which was installed at the Allen's Pond reservation habitat on March 17th. Level 3 took part in "Daffodil Days" which benefits the American Cancer Society. Level 3 students raised \$377.00 to fight cancer.

Level 4 took a whole day field trip down to Dartmouth, MA to the Allen's Pond reservation. Students installed 65 blue bird boxes in large seaside grassland habitats that are owned and operated by the Massachusetts Audubon Society. Gina Purtell, Director of the habitat said, "It was a real pleasure to see what everyone together could do." She also commented that our group did, in one day, what would have taken her three years to accomplish. She is the only full time employee and she can only devote one day a month to planting the boxes. The boxes were constructed by a vocational high school located in Dartmouth, MA. Gina Purtell has said that she looks forward to utilizing our participation in future projects.

Level 4's marketing project, lead by Jennifer Dulong, is also in the middle of a food and supply drive for the Quincy Animal Shelter.

Levels 5 & 6 accomplished a tremendous amount with two trips to the Greater Boston Food Bank on Thursday, March 17th and Monday, March 21st. Forty two students and seven chaperones sorted a total of 12,279 lbs. of food. 9,823 lbs. of food was salvaged for distribution to Boston area families. This amount of food translates in to 7,548 meals. This is a huge impact. These figures are provided by the Greater Boston Food Bank to all participants. SSCPS is making efforts to continue our new relationship with the Greater Boston Food Bank by sending students there on a monthly basis.

As a result of Community Service Week, our community has made a tremendous impact. Our initiatives have successfully aided families and the environment. Our community membership is strengthened by these efforts. I look forward to working with you all as we forge new connections and partnerships that link us to communities beyond our own. FROM THE HEALTH OFFICE

FACTS ABOUT BACKPACK INJURY

Carrying an overloaded backpack can cause painful back and neck problem and injuries, possibly leading to long-term medical problems. Medical professionals advise that individuals carry no more than 10-15% of their body weight on their backs.

Examples:

A student weighing:

- ?? 50 lbs should carry no more than 7.5 lbs.
- ?? 80 lbs. should carry no more that 12 lbs.
- ?? 100 lbs should carry no more than 15 lbs.
- ?? 130 lbs. should carry no more than 19.5 lbs.

Please weigh your student and his/her fully loaded backpack. If you find it weighs more that 15% of his/ her body weight, help your student lighten the load.

Tips on Wearing a Backpack Properly

- ?? Distribute weight evenly. Put heavier items on bottom to keep weight off the shoulders.
- ?? Choose a backpack that has heavily padded shoulder straps and lumbar support. Padded shoulder straps offer cushioning for the trapeziums muscles and the clavicle bones. The lumbar support cushions the lumbar spine and redistributes the weight to the legs.
- ?? Bend you knees when lifting a backpack.
- ?? Carry only the necessities. (Clean out the backpack at least once a week.)
