From the Head of School

Our Parent Association Diversity Committee has been hard at work in the last few weeks to put together something that hopefully will develop into a strong and lasting school tradition. The week of April 24-28 will be *Community Week* here at School; this is the week following Spring Break. Developed by a group of parents representing a spectrum of perspectives on what constituted "community" this week will endeavor to celebrate our collective strengths and offer opportunities to discuss those things that would limit our harmony as a K-12 school.

Over the last month there has been extensive discussion in the parent forum online and in conversations both in and out of school regarding the Day of Silence on April 26. There has been a wide range of positions taken on this event. Some have seen it as an anti bullying support event, others have seen it as promoting homosexuality, some see it in isolation, some see it as one element of a larger issue. Whatever your point-of-view is, it is no doubt developed by sincerely held ethical, moral or religious beliefs around the subject of sexual orientation. There is a plethora of thoughts regarding this issue that confounds every level of our society; why should we be any different than the rest of America.

The American writer, Samuel Clemens once observed: *The universal brotherhood of man is our most precious possession*. If we take Mark Twain's viewpoint that no matter who we are, what we believe or where we are from, the brotherhood of man is our starting point in resolving conflict, we will find strength in working together.

Community Week is to celebrate that "brotherhood of man." Looking at the long-term health of the school community, we must build bridges among all members of our population in order to move ahead with the challenges that face us as individuals in the school and as a school as a whole. I hope you will all support the activities the parent's have put together for this inaugural Community celebration.

Here is a list of the events that are planned:

Monday: Unity Chain – each member of the school will be given a strip of colored paper to decorate as they choose. The strips will then be looped and connected into one long chain that will be hung down the main hall of the school.

Tuesday: Affirmation – in age appropriate ways, everyone in the school will write something complimentary about everyone in his/her pod or class. These will be read to the group.

Wednesday: Day of Silence – Students on Levels 4, 5 and 6 will have the option to show their support for gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender students both at SSCPS and elsewhere who experience discrimination and harassment. Students on Levels 1, 2 and 3 will have a discussion on "how we are alike, how we are different and how individual similarities and differences are both good."

Thursday: Discussion on bullying and how you feel about it and how the school can create an environment that discourages it.

Friday: Community Feast – students and staff are invited to bring in a BAKED GOOD to share with those on their level. Ideally these will be foods that are special to their families, possibly ethnic, or something they have around a family celebration. Please provide enough for about twelve (12) people and make them precut into individual portions.

Thank you to the parents, particularly Cassie Proude, Natalie Hill and Roger Keller for organizing this Community Week. Their efforts can only help to bring us together as a stronger school.

Join us for our Earth Day celebration this Friday, April 14th! One-way to stretch yourself and become more "Green" is to produce **ZERO WASTE** during **LUNCH**. Americans produce 154 million tons of garbage every year . . . enough to fill the New Orleans Superdome from top to bottom, twice a day, every single day of the year.
