FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL

Last week SSCPS had an assessment made by the Department of Education (DOE). The result of their assessment is that SSCPS is in great shape! Thursday, a team from DOE made its two-year checkup visit to the school. In the five year term of a school's charter the DOE visits each school in the second and third years to assess how the school is doing relative to items that were highlighted in the last visit and to see where things stand relative to *faithfulness to the terms of the charter, academic success, and organizational viability*. The team met with groups representing the Board of Trustees, teachers, students, the administration, and parents; they also visited many classrooms.

The DOE Visiting Team met with the School administration Thursday afternoon to give a preliminary report on their findings from the visit. They discussed the three areas of the review that are same in the charter renewal process; what follows is a brief summary of the major points from the visiting team. The formal report will be out in about a month.

Faithfulness to the terms of the charter:

The community stakeholders all expressed a clear understanding of what the school has for a mission and how it is played out in the operation of the school. Leadership, project-based learning, experiential learning, student-centered learning...are all qualities they saw as the visited classes during the day. They saw evidence that we are working closely to our accountability plan. However, they would like to see us disseminate our good practices among other schools and organizations more than we do; a teacher speaking at conferences about what they have accomplished is important.

Academic program success:

They noticed a distinct effort to align our program with the state frameworks. This was evident in the creation of the curriculum maps and sequencing efforts. Classroom practices showed high student engagement, good behavior, multiage student interaction, and teachers being able to address a variety of ages and learning styles in a class. The Learning Services staff were evident in their support of the students in their charge and the other students as well. There was evidence that the school has supported teachers in being able to address the variety of student learners. There was evidence of strategies to address improved MCAS test scores. There was evidence that we are beginning to use external data better in curricular decisions made.

Organizational success:

The leadership of the school is structured for the success of the school. Recent accomplishments of finding and purchasing the new campus, moving the school from Hull to Norwell, becoming fully enrolled, implementing a new math curriculum, listening to the various stakeholders in the community in regular meetings all support the improvement of the school. The facility appears safe and meets all legal regulations. The legal requirements for state and federally mandated program are fully met. There was evidence that the recommendations of the 2004 Comprehensive Program Review study were addressed and that we have excellent support services. The staff is highly qualified and the improved mentoring system will only help to improve the new staff to the school. Annual evaluations need to be continued. The schools finances are sound and even though there are challenges ahead for the organization, it appears that the Board and administration are addressing them.

Is the school becoming the school is wants to be?

Yes!

I would like to thank all the parents, students, teachers and Trustees for being part of this chartering process. We can come away from this visit knowing that we are officially recognized as meeting the needs of our students and while we have much ahead to do; we are moving in a sound direction.

ECO-TIPS FROM THE SSCPS GREEN TEAM

ECO-Tip from THE GREEN TEAM: "Take a Walk on the Safe Side!"

Winter has finally arrived delivering icy steps and walkways. Did you know that traditional ice-melt products can heat up to 175 degrees when exposed to moisture? This can injure your children and your pets. Children can get de-ice products on their hands or mittens and rub their eyes, causing dangerous irrigation. Ingestion can result in mouth burns and gastro-intestinal injury. Pets paws can be burned walking through treated areas and licking sore paws can burn their mouths. To top it all off, these salt-based products can kill plants in your gardens. To avoid these dangers but still keep your walks safe, you can switch to inexpensive and easy bags of builders sand (50 pounds from Home Depot for about \$2.50), or use clay-based kitty litters (no scoopables). There is also a safe, nationally-available, environmentally-friendly, de-ice product sold as SafePaw that can be purchased at local hardware stores. http://www.safepaw.com/fact_sheet.html

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Your child is currently enrolled in our school's Health Education Program. The goal of our health curriculum is to promote the health and well being of our students, as well as provide factual and age-appropriate information which will help them make informed and healthy decisions during childhood, adolescence, and beyond. South Shore Charter School's Health program, in accordance with the Massachusetts Comprehensive Health Curriculum Frameworks, is based on the core concept of Health Literacy, Health, Safety & Prevention, and Personal and Community Health.

During all portions of the health program, students will ask questions which will be answered factually and in an ageappropriate manner. Each student's privacy will be respected, and no one will be put on the spot to answer or reveal personal information. Material will be presented in a balanced and factual way, making it clear that people may hold strong religious and moral beliefs, which must always be respected.

Level III (grades 5&6) curriculum will include the concept of total body wellness, including social and emotional issues, an introduction to puberty and reproduction, healthy relationships, avoidance of risk behaviors such as smoking, drinking, and substance abuse.

Level IV (grades 7&8) curriculum will include physical and emotional changes as related to the reproductive systems during puberty, sexual orientation, the components, functions, and processes of the reproductive system, the benefits of abstinence, postponing, and setting limits on sexual behavior, sexually transmitted diseases and STD prevention, pregnancy prevention, pregnancy, and the importance of diet, rest, exercise and the avoidance of risk behaviors such as smoking, drinking, and substance use contributing to the health of a mother and fetus. There will also be discussion on interpersonal relationships, positive self-esteem and communication skills.

Under Massachusetts's law and SSCPS Policy, you may exempt your child from participation in any portion of the class by simply sending a letter to the school. No exempt student will be penalized and alternative assignments will be provided.
