FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL

Strategic Plan 2007-2010

Nearly a year ago the Board of Trustee and the school faculty and staff began the process of creating a new strategic plan for SSCPS. Such plans often take a while to put into working order. A strategic plan is:

A document used by an organization to align its organization and budget structure with organizational priorities, missions, and objectives. A strategic plan should include a mission statement, a description of the agency's long-term goals and objectives, and strategies or means the agency plans to use to achieve these general goals and objectives. The strategic plan may also identify external factors that could affect achievement of long-term goals.

SSCPS completed its first three-year strategic plan in 2006. That plan oversaw the purchase of the new campus, the renovation of the building, the move from Hull to Norwell, the addition of 114 students to reach full enrollment, the approval to increase enrollment to 540, the improvement in faculty salaries and benefits, the improved public image for the school, and improvements in the academic program.

The next strategic plan for 2007-2010 has goals that will help the school improve student achievement, address diversity issues of our population and complete the facility renovations. In the next few days you will be receiving a draft copy of the plan. Read it over. There are several meeting set aside for community feedback and if you cannot attend one of them you are welcome to email me your thoughts and recommendations about the plan. The Board of Trustees would will then make final adjustments to the plan and adopt the plan at its March or April meeting.

Topic: **An IEP for My Child** When: Thursday March 22, 2007 from 7:00 pm to 9:00 pm Where: SSCPS – Music Room Presenter: The Federation for Children with Special Needs

What will be covered: The Individualized Education Program is a written plan for an eligible child with a disability that is developed, reviewed, and revised in an IEP Team meeting following the federal special education law. It is the legally binding contract which explains how the student will receive access to the general curriculum as well as which supports and services will be provided for success in all areas of the school. Every child with a disability who receives special education services must have an Individual Education Program. This workshop takes parents step-by-step through the development of the IEP including how to articulate a vision, using evaluation to write annual measurable goals and how to measure their child's progress.

ECO-TIPS FROM THE SSCPS GREEN TEAM

Feeling Good about Looking Good:

Avoid the Top Ten Toxins in our Personal Care Products

A survey of 2,300 people found that the typical adult uses 10+ personal care products a day, exposing themselves to an average of 146 chemicals. Do your own survey . . . toothpaste, soap, shampoo, conditioner, hair gel, shaving cream, after-shave, deodorant, foundation, various makeup, lip balms, nail treatments, hand and body lotions, sunscreens, soap for hand washing during the day, etc. The list is long. The FDA does not regulate product ingredients, so some of our personal care products are among the most toxic items in our homes. Ironically, the ideal way for many toxins to enter our systems are through our skin or via the air we breathe, and they accumulate in our systems, adding to our total body burden. When shopping for health and beauty aids, read the labels. The top ten cancer-causing, neuro-damaging, endocrine-disrupting toxins are:

- Mercury skin lightening creams, acne medications, spot removers, mascaras, artificial tears/eye drops, vaccinations
- Thimerosal mascaras, vaccinations
- Lead acetate facial cleansers, hair coloring
- Formaldehyde nail polishes (particularly OPI polishes)

- Toluene nail polishes (again, particularly OPI polishes)
- Petroleum distillates mascaras and foundations
- Ethylacrylate mascaras
- Coal Tar therapeutic scalp shampoos (like T-Gel, the T is for Tar)
- Dibutyl Phthalate nail polishes and strengtheners
- Potassium dichromate HeadOn pain reliever/sleep aid

What else we can do is vote with our wallets. Try to purchase personal care products only from companies who have signed the Safe Cosmetics Campaign pledge, a pact signed by over 500 companies (but not one of the top 5 product manufacturers!) to produce their products with non-toxic ingredients.
