What will be covered: The Individualized Education Program is a written plan for an eligible child with a disability that is developed, reviewed, and revised in an IEP Team meeting following the federal special education law. It is the legally binding contract which explains how the student will receive access to the general curriculum as well as which supports and services will be provided for success in all areas of the school. Every child with a disability who receives special education services must have an Individual Education Program. This workshop takes parents step-by-step through the development of the IEP including how to articulate a vision, using evaluation to write annual measurable goals and how to measure their child's progress.

ECO-TIPS FROM THE SSCPS GREEN TEAM

Truly Clean

On a typical cleaning day in a typical home, levels of chemicals in the indoor air can be hundreds, even thousands of times higher than the outdoor air in the most polluted of cities. This contributes to the increases in respiratory diseases like asthma and emphysema, as well as to the increases in cancers and auto-immune disorders. (The Nature of Things, CBC-TV.) Most chemicals found in household cleaning products are the same as those used in industrial settings . . . but in nearly all cases, we do not need heavy-duty, toxic chemicals to do our home cleaning. What good is getting "dirt" out of our homes if what we're replacing it with stuff that can make us sick? Manufacturers like Seventh Generation, Down East, and Nature Clean make suites of cleaning products that contain far fewer toxins than the standard issue cleaners most of us buy. Prior to WWII and the advent of petro-chemicals, most household cleaning was accomplished using relatively safe ingredients, including baking soda, vinegar, salt, lemon juice, vegetable oil, soap, borax and hydrogen peroxide. And they clean just as well now as they did then.
