## ECO-TIPS FROM THE SSCPS GREEN TEAM

HAVE A NICE LAWN WITHOUT POISONING YOUR FAMILY \& PETS
When the Forsythia blooms, weed seeds are beginning to germinate and insects end winter dormancy. But we've been sold a bill of goods (literally) in the search of the trophy lawn. The truth is you CAN have a gorgeous lawn without chemicals. Here's how.
Lawn chemicals and children/pets/humans/birds/nature do not mix well. Pesticides and herbicides are intentionally toxic substances. We often forget this. Most contain a host of chemicals that have been linked to neurological diseases (including Parkinson's, depression, anxiety, ADD and ADHD), male and female infertility, chronic fatigue syndrome, birth defects, and a number of childhood and adult cancers. These chemicals are tracked and air-lifted in to our homes, where they reside (and build-up) for years in our carpets and upholstery. Additionally, very little is known about the safety of secondary compounds which occur when these applied chemicals bond with naturally occurring compounds in our environment.
This week, we're discussing weed control. Whether a new lawn or an existing lawn, weeds are a fact of life, and crabgrass is the nemesis of many a gardener. There are two categories of weed control: pre-emergent products which either inhibit or prevent germination, and control products which kill existing broadleaf weeds (very nasty chemicals!). Many weeds are annuals so they die in the winter, allowing pre-emergent controls applied in the Spring to be extremely effective. We recommend using a corn-gluten product for pre-emergent control. This is a very (!) effective plant germination/ development inhibitor, and as it's a by-product of processing corn, it is harmless to people, pets, birds, and bugs (here's a novel concept: most bugs are good!). You actually could eat the stuff and it wouldn't hurt you. A side bonus is it also provides a healthy, organic
feed to your lawn. Downside? It smells a little like low-tide for a couple of days. The optimal time to apply a corn gluten product it is WHEN THE FORSYTHIA AND DAFFODILS ARE BLOOMING. This is when the weed seeds are actively germinating. Many corn-gluten products are palletized for ease of application. You can usually get corn-gluten at specialty garden centers. A good local source is ten minutes from the school, at the Family Pet and Garden Center, 25 Washington Street (Route 53) in Pembroke. (781-829-2220) As with any product, follow the manufacturers instructions.
During the season, you could spend a few calories pulling the odd lawn by hand weed here and there. And to prevent later season weed-seed germination, follow these three tips:

- Increase your mowing height to $31 / 2$ to 4 inches to shade out weed seeds and to encourage lusher, healthier turf grasses
- Mow only when the blades of grass are dry to prevent diseases from starting/spreading
- Keep your mower blades SHARP - a lousy blade makes a lousy cut, and a lousy cut is a place for disease and fungus to start
Another option is to fret less and allow yourself to have a living lawn - http://www.livinglawn.org/ Next week; we'll talk about insects and your lawn. In the mean time, just say 'No!' to all of those chemicals!
