### Insects and Your Lawn – Say "NO!" to Chemicals!

Please remember, *pesticides are intentionally toxic substances*. Most lawn pesticides are broad-spectrum, neuro-toxic, organo-phosphates. Exposure to these products has been linked to many illnesses, including cancers, infertility, birth defects, and neurological diseases. We do not need chemicals this dangerous in order to keep our lawns looking green.

Many pests love turf grasses, but nearly all of them can co-exist with a healthy lawn. The key is balance. A critical piece of information is this: **most of the insects in our yards are beneficial.** In a healthy ecosystem, the beneficial insects often keep the bad bugs to a minimum.

Due to years of very effective pesticide advertising, homeowners are obsessed with grubs. "Grubs" are the larval stage of nearly 100 types of insects, and most of these insects do no damage to the lawn. But two types of grubs that can be damaging are the larvae of the Japanese Beetle and larvae of Masked Chafer Beetles. Two biological controls that are tremendously effective for grub control are Milky Spore and Beneficial Nematodes.

<u>Milky spore</u> is a naturally-occurring host-specific bacterium (Bacillus popillae-Dutky) that derails the white grubs of Japanese Beetles; it is harmless to other life forms. Turf inoculation of Milky Spore protects your lawn for as long as twenty years. Milky Spore is available from some lawn and garden centers, and also from click-retailers like <a href="www.homeharvest.com">www.homeharvest.com</a>.

Beneficial nematodes, tiny (virtually microscopic) roundworms, are extraordinarily lethal to many lawn insect pests, yet are safe for plants and animals. Most biological, even Milky Spore, require time to be effective, but nematodes kill root-eating insects in 24-48 hours. Application is as simple as adding a spray bottle to your garden hose and spraying down your lawn and your gardens. <a href="www.gardensalive.com">www.gardensalive.com</a> offers a beneficial nematode product called 'Grub Away' that is so effective at controlling grubs the company has actually stopped offering Milky Spore.
