ECO-TIPS FROM THE SSCPS GREEN TEAM

After the holidays, a real Christmas tree keeps on giving! Most of the towns we live in either collect or will accept live trees, and they chip them for municipal mulch. But here are some other environmentally-friendly ideas for your tree après the holidays:

- Placed in the garden or backyard, the Christmas tree will provide winter shelter for small birds.
- Another good idea is to decorate the tree again. This time hang it with special treats for the birds: Orange slices and apples will attract birds, or hang suet balls (do not use peanut butter!) stuffed with mixed birdseed

- and sunflower seeds. Do please remember to <u>carefully remove all ornaments and tinsel</u>. Birds will try to eat the shiny stuff and it will make them sick.
- A Christmas tree is biodegradable. Its branches and needles make a good mulch in any garden. Cut branches off of the tree and spread under shrubs or place over the crowns of your more delicate perennials.
- Fir tree foliage can be stripped from the branches and snipped into small pieces for stuffing into aromatic fir needle pillows for the sofa or bedroom. Some people also use fir foliage in dresser drawers to give clothing and blankets a lovely fragrance and act as a natural moth repellant.
- ❖ Large quantities of used trees make effective sand and soil erosion barriers, especially at beaches.
- Christmas trees stacked together in a forest provide much needed shelter for birds, rabbits and other small animals.
- Sunk into fish ponds, Christmas trees make excellent refuge and feeding areas.

Another thought for this holiday season is giving to others close to home. Local food banks are being hit with extremely hard times as demand is greatly exceeding supplies. GIFTS OF HOPE supports food banks in Abington, Braintree, Canton, Cohasset, Hanover, Hingham, Marshfield, Norwell, Pembroke, Raynham, Rockland, Scituate, Stoughton, Taunton, Wareham, Weymouth, and the Interfaith Social Services Pantry Shelf (serving 9 towns), as well as the Greater Boston Food Bank. Donations are gratefully accepted through the Mariner Newspapers for each of these food pantries; send donations to Anne Rodwell, CNC/South, 165 Enterprise Drive, Marshfield, MA 02050. Donations are published in the paper, unless the donor requests anonymity. This is a great way to say 'thank you' for all we have, and to reach out and spread the joy.
