# 2008: NEW BEGINNINGS AND "C" WORDS

We are nine days into the month and there is so much going on at SSCPS and the country as a whole. 2008, a leap year, is also a year that voters will elect a new president and SSCPS will choose a new Executive Director and Director of Learning Services and Assessment. The search for a new Learning Services Director has already begun and the Interview Team, chaired by Tom Gorsuch, will be interviewing the semi-finalists on February 11 and 12. On January 17<sup>th</sup>, the Board of Trustees will discuss and finalize the time-line for the search process for a new Executive Director. The proposed ten member Search Committee will be chaired by Board member Frank White. In addition to Frank, there will be parent, student, faculty, and administrative representatives on the Committee. Once the time-line and process has been finalized, I will post the information on our web-site. The Board intends to appoint the new Executive Director at its annual meeting, May 22<sup>nd</sup>.

When I was appointed as the Interim Executive Director, the Board of Trustees asked me to work closely with faculty, staff, students, parents, and Board members to learn as much as I could about the curriculum and structure of the school. During my interview and at our first faculty and staff meeting, I indicated that there were three "c" words that were important for me as an administrator: communication, collaboration, and consistency. I also added that there was a fourth "c" word that organizations always had to avoid and that is complacency. In my short tenure here, the lessons that I have learned about SSCPS is that it is indeed a very special place that honors diversity, builds community, and challenges students to do their best and become independent and creative thinkers. In addition to its strong academic and college preparatory program, I quickly learned that there are two additional areas where SSCPS excels: the visual & performing arts and environmental science. At next Tuesday's Open House, I plan to share my "findings" with prospective students and their families. I encourage all of you to invite neighbors who are looking for a school like ours to attend our last Open House before the enrollment deadline.

There is a fifth "c" word – change. Thoughtful and well-considered changes are important to any organization. Sometimes, circumstances beyond our control necessitate change. Over the past several months, SSCPS administrators and staff have been examining our current structure and daily schedule, identifying areas where we excel and our strengths, and areas that can be improved upon. One change that we have reached consensus upon is having Level IV and the high school follow the same daily schedule next year. This change will make it possible for Level IV students to accelerate and take high school courses. A second change is to require all incoming grade nine students and new high school students to attend a week-long New Student Institute in late August. A third change is in the annual goal setting meetings between the student, parent/guardian, and his/her academic advisor. Beginning in grade seven, an academic plan for the year will be developed at the fall meeting. In developing the plan, the student's goals through high school will be discussed and incorporated into the plan. The plan will be reviewed several times during the year and updated annually.

In future updates, I will share more ideas and possible changes that may take place. As always, the voices of parents and students are most important to us. The Parent Association meets monthly, on Tuesdays. The next parent's meeting is Tuesday, February 5<sup>th</sup> (primary election day). Also, in response to the positive feedback to our Level Coffee Hours, we have scheduled a second one for each level. The dates are: Level 1 – Monday, January 28; Level 4 – Monday, February 11; Level 2 – Monday, March 2; Level 3 – Monday, March 10; High School – Monday, March 24. All meetings begin at 8:30am and will be held in the Music Room.
