NEWS ON THE CHARTER SCHOOL FRONT...

On Tuesday, September 25th, a number of us from SSCPS attended the legislature's Joint Committee on Education public hearing on Senate Bill number 282, an act establishing a charter school working group "to study financing of, caps imposed upon, and innovations promoted by charter schools." The hearing was well attended and the majority of the speakers spoke in favor of charter schools. Senator Robert Antonioni, co-chair of the Education Committee, opened the hearing by stating that the debate over charter schools was over and that charter schools are here to stay. The supporters of charter schools were encouraged by his remarks as well as those of three speakers from the business community. The business leaders stated that Massachusetts charter schools in Massachusetts have prepared students well for higher education and the work force and that they should be viewed as lab schools.

As one of the first charter schools in the Commonwealth, South Shore Charter Public School has made great strides over the past thirteen years and we have a number of successful practices and "lessons learned" to share with our sending school districts as well as new charter schools. Later this fall, we plan to host a meeting with area superintendents and curriculum leaders to discuss our program, practices, and innovations. In addition to disseminating information about our program, we plan to discuss the possibility of forming a professional development partnership and applying for grants from the Department of Education.

CLOSER TO HOME . . .

Kudos to all of the parents for organizing another well attended event. We greatly appreciate all of the effort that goes into planning these special family programs. The Fall Festival was a hit and a good time was had by all. Thanks also to our talented high school musicians and their maestro, Andre Kim!

Next week I will be meeting with the officers of the Foundation and items on their agenda include the Auction, major fundraising, and coordinating the spring dinner with our "reunion" plans to celebrate the past thirteen years and the Class of 2008's graduation. We are tentatively looking at scheduling events for April 3-5, 2008. Look for more details and final dates in future updates.

FUNDRAISING...

We appreciate all of the fundraising activities of the Foundation, Parents Association, Levels, and Project Coordinators. Last February, the Board of Trustees adopted a new fundraising policy in response to concerns raised by parents and local businesses regarding the frequency of requests and the costs. At the last Board of Trustees meeting, I shared with the Board a fundraising request form that we will be using this year. Per Board policy, ALL funding raising requests must be submitted to the Executive Director for approval. In addition, I informed the Board that the school is in the process of reviewing its current field trip and international travel procedures. We plan to develop guidelines/parameters for the field trips for each level and for projects as well as how funds will be raised to support these initiatives. One of the strengths of SSCPS has always been its commitment to field trips, service learning, and international travel. It is not our intention to change this important focus of our school. It is, however, our goal to respond to the Board of Trustee's request that we consider equity and access.

HEALTH OFFICE NEWS

GENERAL GUIDELINES TO AVOID SPREAD OF INFECTIONS

Please review these general guidelines following them will go a long way toward keeping everyone healthier.

- WASH HANDS...WASH HANDS... this is the #1 way to stop the spread of germs of course this also means making sure fingernails are clean.
- PLEASE TAKE YOUR CHILD'S TEMPERATURE IF HE/SHE IS COMPLAINING OF THE FOLLOWING: sore throat, upset stomach, diarrhea, general aches and pains, swollen lymph nodes, or headache. Let common sense prevail. Any of those symptoms plus fever most likely indicates your child needs to stay out of school.
- SCHOOLS HEALTH POLICY dictates a child stay at home or will be sent home with a temperature of 100 degrees.
- PLEASE DO NOT SEND YOUR CHILD TO SCHOOL with any of the following conditions:
- If he/she appears to have redness and/or discharge from the eyes. It could be conjunctivitis, commonly called "pink eye" and can be highly contagious if caused by bacteria. (Viral or allergic conjunctivitis is not contagious, but can only be diagnosed by your child's health care practitioner.)
- Diarrhea
- Fever
- Nausea/Vomiting
- Sore throat with foul breath
- Children with a positive strep culture must stay home until after they have had at least 24 hours of antibiotic medication and the fever is gone.
- Please call your child's teacher and /or the health office to report confirmed cases of infectious diseases. This courtesy will help us alert others to any potential outbreak of communicable disease.

New Parking, Pick up Procedures 2007-2008

The use of vehicles by students and parents has increased this year. In previous years, there were enough spots on campus to accommodate all the parking needs of both the faculty and students and leave space for visitors. We are finding that in the morning more parents are opting to park and enter the building to drop off their child. Unfortunately, parents are parking in the back lot in parking spaces earmarked for faculty and students. If you must park your car in the morning and enter the school at drop off time, please park in the "gated" parking area in front of the playground. The last two rows of parking spaces before exiting the back parking lot are earmarked for our students. Please do not park here. Due to these parking constraints, at this time we are unable to allow parents to use the playground in the morning after drop off for playgroups. Since school has been open a few weeks now, your child is comfortable in knowing where they are to go in the morning when they enter the building. We also have staff to help direct them. There is no reason for you to enter the building with your child.

Our neighbors in the office park have requested us to notify parents that there should be no parking on private property. Please do not ask your child to leave the property to meet you or your vehicle on Longwater Circle as this is a serious safety concern to us. We need to ensure that all students are dismissed in a safe and orderly manner. When you ask your child to disregard the rules we have set for safety reasons, it sets a bad example for all.

Here are some new guidelines for our school community:

Student Parking: There is limited parking available for students this year. The last two rows of parking spaces out back near the exit are earmarked for student parking. Parking stickers are issued by Lottery annually, and are issued by seniority to those senior's that applied for a sticker and then the remaining spaces to juniors. <u>Under no circumstances is any student to park on any other property or roadway in Assinippi Park</u>.

Visitor Parking: There will be very limited visitor parking at the front entrance parking area. These spots will be for a maximum of 1 hour at a time. Please do not block our "fire lane" in the front of the building by leaving your car unattended. Within a few weeks this space will be clearly marked. Out back, if you must enter in the morning, you can park for a short time in the "gated" area of the parking lot. This will be open until 8:20am. It will then be closed so that our students can use this area of the parking lot for recess. Parents should be prepared to leave the building by 8:15am unless they have signed in as volunteers.

Afternoon Pickup: Parents and others picking up students at 3:00 PM will need to get in the pickup line to come through the campus. Please remember that those of you from towns beginning with A-M use the front door and towns beginning with N-Z use the rear door. The pickup line goes down Longwater Circle and around the corner onto Longwater Drive if needed. Please do not block other business's driveways. The police have asked us to keep all student pedestrian traffic off Longwater Circle. Only busses may park in front of the school by the rotary. PLEASE DO NOT USE CELL PHONES WHILE PICKING UP STUDENTS AS THEIR USE DISTRACTS FROM LISTENING TO DIRECTIONS FROM THE FACULTY/STAFF.

How to deal with the change: If parents stagger their arrival for pickup, the line would not be too long and the movement of it would be continuous. Some parents like to arrive very early to get in the pickup line. Others can arrive as late as 3:20 to pick up their student. Whatever your family decides is best for them, will govern how your child can deal with the time. If you decide to pick up at 3:20, your child can do homework here at school. After 3:30 if your child is still not picked up, a phone call with be made to you. Thank you for your cooperation with the changes.


