PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Update from Tara Turner, our High School Science teacher and Speech & Debate Coach.....

The Speech and Debate Team had their first major competition this past Saturday at Dighton-Rehoboth Regional School. Four members of the team participated in the competition; 11th grader Ryan Brenner, 10th graders Kristin Cheney, Austin Hill and Shanna Sobol. 10th Grader Patrick Weed attended as an observer. There were at least 10 other high schools at the competition including Hull, Silver Lake Regional, Fontbonne Academy, Catholic Memorial, Newton South, Lincoln-Sudbury and Dighton-Rehoboth Regional. Although the SSCPS team lost each round by 1 point, Tara said that the team did a "stellar" job. Tara has extensive experience with debating and said that it usually takes a beginning team a year to win a round, and a team needs to win four or five rounds to win a competition. The debate team meets after school twice a week to prepare for these competitions. Thank you to Julia for her time in coaching at the competition, and thank you to Tara for the endless enthusiasm and dedication to these students.

I hope everyone had fun at the auction this past Saturday night. The parents really worked hard on putting together our biggest fundraiser of the year. Thanks to Debbie Shepherd, who chaired the event, and the many others who spent countless hours putting this event.
