## Professional Development Day tomorrow -No school for students

Tomorrow is the second Professional Development Day this year for our staff. In the morning, we will officially begin the Charter Renewal Process. As I have mentioned in earlier Updates, next year, SSCPS is up for charter renewal. The Board of Elementary and Secondary Education is required by law to conduct ongoing performance reviews of each charter school and, by the fifth year of the school's charter term, decide whether or not to renew the school's charter. The decision is based upon the school's performance over the term of the charter in three areas:

1. The school's faithfulness to the terms of its charter
2. The success of the school's academic program
3. The viability of the school as an organization

On the $30^{\text {th }}$, we will focus upon our faithfulness to the terms of our charter. As a staff, we will be meeting in small and large groups to re-examine our mission, discuss the progress we have made in providing a balanced academic and project-based learning environment, and if we have remained faithful to our charter by promoting a respectful culture and a responsive family/school partnership. In February, we will be reaching out to our parent community through the Update, an on-line survey, and meetings to hear from you about our faithfulness to our mission and charter, the success of the school's academic program, and its viability as we plan ahead for the next five years.

In the afternoon, our teachers will be "on their own", working independently, in groups or by level on their grade/discipline initiatives. As you can see, tomorrow will be a very busy day for our staff.

## Schools are a reflection of our larger society and culture

All of us at SSCPS were saddened and, yes, even shocked, by the incident that happened in our school last Friday involving some of our Level IV students. Dr. Connolly and Angie Pepin, Level IV Coordinator, have had Level meetings to discuss the seriousness of the situation with the students and the Level IV teachers have discussed decision-making and reiterated our school's policy on drugs and the fact that we contact the Norwell police when there is a violation of state law. I have also asked our Physical Education and Health teachers, Heather Fredette and Ashley Lorance, to include some additional lessons on drugs and alcohol for students in grades five through twelve. Dr. Connolly and Mrs. Pepin have also scheduled a Coffee Hour for Level IV parents for next Monday, February 2 at 8:30 a.m. in the Music Room. It was just two weeks ago that Mrs. Pepin and Claire Overlee, Level III Coordinator, put on a program on Cyber-bullying and Text Messaging for Level III and Level IV parents. Unfortunately, only two parents attended the meeting. Although we understand how busy parents are today, we hope that you will be able to adjust your schedule and attend next Monday's meeting. Sadly, the problems that we have had with cell phones, text messaging, cyber-bullying, and experimentation with drugs at SSCPS are ones that schools everywhere are facing today. The recent decriminalization of Marijuana by voters in November has only contributed to the difficulties that teachers and administrators have in what I like to call "combating the culture." I am confident, however, that we can win this battle if we work together and communicate a common message to our students about doing the right thing. We need that three legged stool not only for academics but for social and emotional well being and decision making.

## New event: Meeting for Level 1 parents, Tuesday, February 10

At the recent Quarterly Coffee Hour for Level 1 parents, there was a lengthy discussion about the possibility of moving from multi-age classrooms (1-2) to looping. Looping is a grouping model where students have the same teacher for two consecutive years. For example, a first grade student would have the same teacher for first and second grade. The change from our current model would be that the students would be grouped by grade. I know that there has been much discussion about looping and its impact in the Google groups. When we ended the coffee hour, we promised that there would be a follow-up meeting and that all of the Level 1 teachers would be in
attendance. The Level I meeting will be Tuesday, February 10 at $\mathbf{3 : 3 0}$ p.m. We hope that our Level I parents will be able to make this meeting. Note: we have high school students available to babysit.

## 7-12 PRINCIPAL REPORT

Midyear
It feels appropriate to take stock at the midpoint of an event, to use that time as an opportunity to reflect on the first half and to make adjustments and renew our efforts for the upcoming second half. The midyear of a school year is a logical time for this reflection and renewal to take place.
Now is an appropriate time for students to reflect on their efforts to be all they can be in their classes, in their projects/workshops, and in their community. Students should take time to consider where their efforts have paid dividends and where they need to refocus to get the most from their time and their energies.

Parents should use this time to work with their children and their children's teachers to assess what is working and what is not working. This is a time when working together students, parents, and teachers can help young people by redirecting their efforts and providing appropriate adult support. In this work, parents should consider ways they might change practices at home in order to better support what is taking place in the classrooms at SSCPS.
Teachers, by the cyclical nature of their work year, use the midpoint of the school year to assess which practices that they employ in their classes support their students learning and which practices they find wanting. Working with fellow teachers and administrators, students, and families, they refocus and refine their practices to give all students every opportunity to find success.
Working together, we will make a difference. Now is an opportune time to reflect on how we can all work together and renew our efforts to create changes that will allow every student to achieve their academic, social, and emotional potential.

## Discipline

Due to the diligence of Level IV teachers last Friday afternoon, five Level IV students were found to be in possession of marijuana in our school. The marijuana and the students' names were given to the Norwell Police. The students' parents were informed and they met with school officials. The students have been suspended from school. Further discipline may be warranted as we continue our investigation.
Because of the serious nature of the events of last Friday, we will hold a Level IV Coffee Hour on Monday, February 2 at 8:30 AM in the Music Room to discuss the incident and any other topics parents have. All Level IV parents are encouraged to attend this Coffee Hour. Please note that in order to maintain confidentiality we are unable to discuss specifics regarding the incident. Also, please know that our first responsibility as school administrators is to provide students and teachers with a safe and nurturing environment where teaching and learning take precedence. We will continue to be diligent in our work to ensure that an appropriate learning environment continues to exist at South Shore.
