## Projects, Workshops and Exhibitions of Mastery

One of the questions as part of the renewal process that we have been asking staff, current and former students, parents, and the Board of Trustees has been "what makes SSCPS different from other public schools?" The response that I hear most often is "the projects, workshops, and Exhibitions of Mastery." From the very beginning, the parents and educators who founded the school emphasized the importance of making connections between the subjects that were taught and the real world and making this happen during project and workshop time. In the projects, founders envisioned that students working together collaboratively on a common project and presents the results of their work to their classmates/level at least twice a year. In addition, students would also be expected to individually demonstrate their understanding of a particular topic through an Exhibition of Mastery. In the month of February there are many Exhibitions of Mastery and I have enjoyed watching students present to their classmates. On Wednesday, February $10^{\text {th }}$, graduate John Earle talked to students about how he started his Johnny Cupcakes business and some of the lessons that he learned while at SSCPS. Something that I learned after his visit was that he was editor of the first high school yearbook! I encourage everyone to go to his website and check out his blog for February $13^{\text {th }}$ :
www.johnnycupcakes.com. He has a lengthy write-up about his day with us and some wonderful pictures of our students and SSCPS. I loved his introduction: "The other day I stopped by my old high school. Growing up, I had a hard time learning + focusing. However -- when I attended this project based, hands-on Charter School, I was able to learn at my own pace, which made my life that much less stressful and not so lost. It is where I've met some of my best friends, had some of my greatest adventures + memories, grew in my own troublesome entrepreneur ways via selling pranks + outselling the school store with slinging my own candy out of my back pack."

When I returned from the break, I began my morning with a visit to Amy Vandenberg's Level 1 classroom. Amy and Level II teacher, Krista Cafourek, invited me to observe the children in their projects building bat houses. The first, second, third, and fourth grade students were collaborating on the building of ten wooden bat houses that will be put on trees behind the school. The bats that visit these houses will help reduce the mosquito population. Over the past few weeks, the students have been learning about the environment, bats and their habitats, and how to use tools to construct the houses. The designer of the bat houses is Ken Ferguson. Monday morning, Ken and his wife Cynthia (parents of Haley, Level II, grade 4) were on hand with the all of the materials for the students to assemble the houses. It was so exciting to watch students from four different grades work together as a team on the project. Kudos to Amy, Krista, Ken, and Cynthia. The Founders' vision of parents and teachers working together with students from different grade levels on projects is alive and well in 2009.

## Snowplowing Problem and Call for Assistance

Unfortunately, sometime between Saturday afternoon, February 14 and Monday morning, February $16^{\text {th }}$, someone stole our truck, snow plow, sander, and lawnmower. We reported the crime/theft to the Norwell Police as soon as we discovered them missing. The police have been most cooperative and they did inform us that the thefts of trucks and plows are quite common on the North and South Shore right now. This is a huge blow to us and winter is not over yet. We have been in touch with our insurance agents but, in the meantime, we do not have our own vehicle to plow out the parking lot. We are contacting local companies that plow but we may not be at the top of their list to plow. ## K-6 PRINCIPAL REPORT

Last night in two far ranging speeches President Obama and Bobby Jindal Republican Governor of Louisiana used words to try to help us through a process where we "transform" our nation or renew ourselves. Charter schools figured prominently in both speeches. In both speeches charter schools were held up as an important part of the solution to our current difficult times. Both speeches stress new ways to deliver health care, energy and education as the key to making or remaking our country into a better place. We, all parties in the South Shore Charter community, parents, teachers/staff and students are part of what will make American a better and fairer place. This time of change and "transformation" is something that we will come through stronger and better if we stay together both as a country and as a school. It also happens to be taking place right at the same time as South Shore Charter goes through the Massachusetts Charter School Renewal Process. Massachusetts Public Schools are the most successful public schools in the nation and one of the most successful parts of the public system here in Massachusetts are the charter schools. One of the reasons that charter schools are so successful here (this success is not replicated in all charter school states) is accountability and renewal is at the heart of that accountability.

We have begun this very important work of renewal here at school. Every five years Charter Schools in Massachusetts are evaluated by the state. The state asks three questions in this evaluation:

- Are we true to our charter and mission?
- Are we successful academically?
- Is the organization viable?

That is what the word "renewal" has come to mean in this context. But when I really think about the word "renewal" I hear the same feeling/meaning I hear in the word "spring," the making new again. This school began as a dream and it has turned into a reality. As a proud parent of three children who are, or have been educated in this school it is a dream that I know has been worth dreaming. As we begin the "making new
again" process there will be many complex conversations involving all three legs of our "three legged stool." Yesterday and in professional development in January the faculty began a focused discussion of renewal. On Tuesday, February $10^{\text {th }}$ the families of Level 1 had a discussion of the essential qualities that we all value in the special commodity "a charter education." One thing that is an essential quality of our school is that it is a place founded by parents for children.

Two other elements that I see as essential parts of who we are as a school are projects/workshops and Exhibitions of Mastery and yesterday I was lucky enough to see real Mastery in Karen Yelin’s Level I classroom. I saw four second grade dramatizations of Greek Myths and two first grade recitations of poems. The mastery that was most evident to me was the collaboration between a gifted teacher, hard working and motivated students and committed parents. I saw a truly magnificent manifestation of our "three legged stool." The assignments had been planned with such precision and clarity, and the students had worked so hard and with such parental support, that all of the students showed mastery of their craft. The expectations of the second graders were appropriately more demanding than the expectations for the first graders. I sat mesmerized as each child met and exceeded the expectations. The second graders, without scripts or notes, retold stories with acting and props of Greek Myths. The dramatizations had beginnings middles and ends and either moral lessons or explanations of the physical reality of the world. The first graders gave word perfect recitations. I was proud of the children and prouder still of the teacher, the school and our collaboration with parents.

We are special and I hope as we go through the renewal process and the tremendous amount of work required of all three groups, we remember that all of this is worth the work. If we do it well, Charter Renewal will be a part of a cycle like spring, which is renewal. I close with a pep talk that Barack Obama gave last night that fits in so well with the dream we began our school with: "These education policies will open the doors of opportunity for our children. But it is up to us to ensure they walk through them. In the end, there is no program or policy that can substitute for a mother or father who will attend those parent/teacher conferences, or help with homework after dinner, or turn off the TV, put away the video games, and read to their child. I speak to you not just as a President, but as a father when I say that responsibility for our children's education must begin at home." 02/24/09

The only thing I would add to that list as a father of three is to sing to and with your children.

J anuary meeting minutes approved

## Announcements

- Board of Trustee Meeting, Thursday, February 26th. Public welcome.
- Intent to Return forms due February 11th.
- Lottery is February 14th at 10am.
- Volunteers needed for the Auction - signup sheet passed around.


## School Report Prue Goodale

- A potluck dinner was held this past Sunday night for the Title I/After School tutoring families at the Sons of Italy in Braintree. Ted Hirsch and parent Michelle Moisse worked hard to set this up. Close to 80 people attended.
- John Earle, AKA J ohnny Cupcakes, is coming to talk to the students on February 11. He has agreed to waive his speaking fee and also is bringing t-shirts to be sold at a discounted price.
- Sarah Loughlin, school psychologist and founding member of the school, is putting together an event to celebrate the founders. March 28th, Clarion Hotel, Hull, 7-11pm. Asking people to come back and share information/stories from the early days. Cost is $\$ 25 / \mathrm{pp}$.
- Level IV Drug Incident - investigated by both principals. Followed the student handbook policy and held expulsion hearings for 5 students. All students were suspended for 10 days. 3 will be returning to school on Feb. 11 under restrictions. 2 students are not returning to the school. Students claim to have misunderstood the new law and thought that the drug was now legal. School feels that the administration has clearly sent a message to the students.
Q.-- Are we affiliated with any programs like DARE?
A. - Federal Government no longer funds DARE and we are not sure if Norwell schools use it.
Q. - Has legal action been taken against the students that are not returning?
A. - We must respect the privacy of the students and it is up to the Norwell Police Department if they plan on taking legal action.
- Recent Teacher Professional Day - administration and teachers met and discussed the current association (FASA) is a good representative body for the teachers. Some teachers have expressed an interest in forming a union. Teachers are requesting more information on FASA but right now most do not see benefits of unionization. One reason Charter schools were formed was to be free of bureaucracy of management and unions.
Q. - Has there been any change in relationships between teachers that are for the union and the ones that are against?
A. - To help teachers, the PA needs to let them know that we back them no matter what and yes- there is some tension.
- MTA had written to the school requesting names of the parents on our waiting lists. They planned on sending them letters informing them that if they go to a Charter school they will hurt their local school. We did NOT give them the names.
- We are up for Charter renewal and starting the process.
- Level I meeting held today to discuss going form multi-aged classes to looping.
- Comments from parents: Communication is a 2 way street - some parents actively search out a connection with teachers - other parents are spread to thin and the school needs to reach out to them. Re: Unions parents need to respect whichever decision teachers make. Lower Levels vs. Upper Levels - harder to stay in contact with teachers as in Level III and IV students have 4 different teachers.
- Jim Connolly - felt that the profession development day went well. Teachers welcomed the chance to voice their opinions and the administration learned that there are things that need to change.
- Theft from December - no progress. 4 different towns have been involved (Norwell where the theft took place and Braintree, Randolph and Stoughton where the card was used). Only one surveillance video is available and the person is wearing a hat and a hood and is unrecognizable.
- Math Counts Club - 6 students competed - the team finished 23rd out of 32 school. One student, Griffin Howard, finished in the top $1 / 2$ in the individual round.
- Sunday's Boston Globe featured the Scholastic Art Awards. Percentage wise our students received many more awards than most other schools.

## Questions:

Q - Why are we holding back so much money when we voted to spend it?
A - We agreed what amount we would spend - not that we would definitely spend every last dime. We need to keep money back as economy is tough and will only get tougher. This money will give us more flexibility in the future.

Q - Why didn't we agree to give all the field trip money requested if we have it? (\$350 for a kindergarten field trip and $\$ 1000$ for a Level II field trip)
A - We cannot afford to send every child on a field trip so task force decided to just help the ones who are in need. By giving a set amount to each level we can help the students who cannot afford to go otherwise.

Q - Were there other requests that were made?

The Task Force hopes that by approving the requests that they did and changing certain ones - this will encourage people to make well thought out requests. They do not want the PA to become a field trip fund.

Next month a vote will be taken to approve the packet as a whole. We cannot pick and choose to approve certain items.
If approved, money can be used this year or at the beginning of the next school year.
According to the bylaws we cannot vote on it at this meeting. It needs to be reviewed and put on next month's agenda.
