# March came in like a lion . . .

Another snow storm – enough already. We would like to thank those parents who contacted us about snow plowing. For this storm, we were able to have someone plow with the cost being covered by our insurance policy. We did have an offer for free snow plowing that we are going to take advantage of IF there is another snow storm. Across the Commonwealth, cities and towns are dealing with cost overruns for plowing and schools in Western Massachusetts have cancelled as many as ten days of school. To date, SSCPS has had to cancel twice. We are scheduled to be in session for 184 days of school which would make our last day of school Monday, June 22<sup>nd</sup>. In the past, the Executive Director has asked the Board of Trustees to alter the calendar due to snow days. Since it is still winter and it has been known to snow in April, it is too early for the administration to make a recommendation to the Board of Trustees regarding the last day of school for students. Let's hope that we have experienced the last snow storm for this school year.

# Early Release and Professional Development Days: March 10 and March 20

We wanted to remind everyone that there is an early release day next **Tuesday, March 10<sup>th</sup>** and a full day Professional Development day on **Friday, March 20<sup>th</sup>**. On March 10<sup>th</sup> our teachers will be working on formative assessments that they will be administering the following week and on the full-day, the 20<sup>th</sup>, they will be grading and evaluating the assessments and continuing their work on the Renewal process for the school.

# Department of Elementary and Secondary Education Visits: March 25 and March 26

On March 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> two teams from the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education's Charter School Office will be visiting our school. One team will be here for two days and they will be examining our Special Education/learning services and English Language Learner programs. The second team will be here on March 26<sup>th</sup> only and they will be looking at our entire program. As stated in their Site Visit Protocol booklet, "In conducting site visits, the Charter School Office (CSO) is carrying out the requirements of 603 CMR 1.09(2), which outlines the ongoing review of charter schools. Site visit reports, generated by the Department of Education in making a renewal determination for each school. . . . Site visits are usually completed in one day, but may be expanded due to the size, location, or specific conditions of a particular school. They are one of the means by which the Department of Education and the Charter School Office document each charter school's performance and progress over time, corroborating and augmenting the information reported each year in the school's annual report."

The site visit teams focus upon three areas: the school's faithfulness to the terms of its charter, academic success, and organizational viability. During their time at the charter school, the team looks for evidence of our progress towards meeting the goals that we established in our five year Accountability Plan. Focus group meetings are an important part of the visit and each charter school is asked to reach out to the Board of Trustees, parents, faculty, and students and ask them to volunteer to be part of their focus group. The

Charter School office has shared with us a recommended schedule for the March 26 visit and focus group times.

The **Parent Focus Group** is scheduled for 11:15 a.m. to noon. According to their protocol the parent group should consist of "6-10 parents or family members whose children represent a variety of grades as well as years spent at the school." **If you are interested in volunteering to be one of the parents in the focus group, please contact me or my Executive Assistant, Pam Algera**. In the Updates and in all of our meetings, we constantly refer to the importance of parents at our school and that our school was founded by concerned and involved parents and teachers (the three-legged stool). Your voice at the Parent Focus Group is extremely important to us and to the Visiting Team.

#### 7-12 PRINCIPAL REPORT

In the past weeks I have watched as students from across levels struggle to enter and leave the building with large display boards and other items used in their Exhibitions of Mastery. I have had the pleasure of watching some of these EOMs. One of the traits that most impresses me about our students is the way that they comport themselves in public presentations. From Kindergarten through Levels I, II, III, IV and on into high school, our students, on a regular basis, are asked to present an area of study to the school community. Last week, I watched a group of students from Level III do a presentation on their robotics work before the Board of Trustees. Their depth of understanding about the subject matter was extensive, and the presentation was excellent. Several times the presentation was interrupted with spontaneous applause from the audience. As we work to prepare our students for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century, it is clear that working cooperatively in groups, problem solving, and presenting findings are skills that will serve our students well. EOMs and projects and workshops are ongoing activities that allow our students to work at developing these skills. EOMs and projects and projects and workshops help to make our school special.

This spring faculty will work on streamlining projects, workshops, and EOMs to ensure consistency in our practice and to ensure that the Massachusetts Frameworks and 21<sup>st</sup> Century skills are embedded in these learning activities.

Senior **Ryan Brenner** and juniors **Kristin Cheney** and **Patrick Weed** participated in the Boston Regional Brain Bee at MIT on Saturday, February 14. The Brain Bee is part of Brain Awareness Week and the mission of the Bee is to stimulate more research and awareness of neuroscience topics. #### Announcements

- Board of Trustee Meeting, Thursday, February 26th. Public welcome.
- Intent to Return forms due February 11th.
- Lottery is February 14th at 10am.
- Volunteers needed for the Auction signup sheet passed around.

#### School Report Prue Goodale

- A potluck dinner was held this past Sunday night for the Title I/After School tutoring families at the Sons of Italy in Braintree. Ted Hirsch and parent Michelle Moisse worked hard to set t his up. Close to 80 people attended.
- John Earle, AKA Johnny Cupcakes, is coming to talk to the students on February 11. He has agreed to waive his speaking fee and also is bringing t-shirts to be sold at a discounted price.
- Sarah Loughlin, school psychologist and founding member of the school, is putting together an event to celebrate the founders. March 28th, Clarion Hotel, Hull, 7-11pm. Asking people to come back and share information/stories from the early days. Cost is \$25/pp.
- Level IV Drug Incident investigated by both principals. Followed the student handbook policy and held expulsion hearings for 5 students. All students were suspended for 10 days. 3 will be returning to school on Feb. 11 under restrictions. 2 students are not returning to the school. Students claim to have misunderstood the new law and thought that the drug was now legal. School feels that the administration has clearly sent a message to the students.
  - Q. -- Are we affiliated with any programs like DARE?
  - A. Federal Government no longer funds DARE and we are not sure if Norwell schools use it.
  - Q. Has legal action been taken against the students that are not returning?

A. - We must respect the privacy of the students and it is up to the Norwell Police Department if they plan on taking legal action.

 Recent Teacher Professional Day - administration and teachers met and discussed the current association (FASA) is a good representative body for the teachers. Some teachers have expressed an interest in forming a union. Teachers are requesting more information on FASA but right now most do not see benefits of unionization. One reason Charter schools were formed was to be free of bureaucracy of management and unions.

Q. - Has there been any change in relationships between teachers that are for the union and the ones that are against?

A. - To help teachers, the PA needs to let them know that we back them no matter what and yes- there is some tension.

• MTA had written to the school requesting names of the parents on our waiting lists. They planned on sending them letters informing them that if they go to a Charter school they will hurt their local school. We did NOT give them the names.

- We are up for Charter renewal and starting the process.
- Level I meeting held today to discuss going form multi-aged classes to looping.
- Comments from parents: Communication is a 2 way street some parents actively search out a connection with teachers other parents are spread to thin and the school needs to reach out to them. Re: Unions parents need to respect whichever decision teachers make. Lower Levels vs. Upper Levels harder to stay in contact with teachers as in Level III and IV students have 4 different teachers.
- Jim Connolly felt that the profession development day went well. Teachers welcomed the chance to voice their opinions and the administration learned that there are things that need to change.
- Theft from December no progress. 4 different towns have been involved (Norwell where the theft took place and Braintree, Randolph and Stoughton where the card was used). Only one surveillance video is available and the person is wearing a hat and a hood and is unrecognizable.
- Math Counts Club 6 students competed the team finished 23rd out of 32 school. One student, Griffin Howard, finished in the top 1/2 in the individual round.
- Sunday's Boston Globe featured the Scholastic Art Awards. Percentage wise our students received many more awards than most other schools.

#### Questions:

Q - Why are we holding back so much money when we voted to spend it?

A - We agreed what amount we would spend - not that we would definitely spend every last dime. We need to keep money back as economy is tough and will only get tougher. This money will give us more flexibility in the future.

Q - Why didn't we agree to give all the field trip money requested if we have it? (\$350 for a kindergarten field trip and \$1000 for a Level II field trip)

A - We cannot afford to send every child on a field trip so task force decided to just help the ones who are in need. By giving a set amount to each level we can help the students who cannot afford to go otherwise.

Q - Were there other requests that were made?

A - Every request has been presented at the meeting.

Q - Why fund such a large ticket item as the Smartboard?

A - This will be used on a daily basis. The science teacher in Level IV said she does not need new text books - told the school to buy new Spanish ones instead. This Smartboard will help enhance the science curriculum.

The Task Force hopes that by approving the requests that they did and changing certain ones - this will encourage people to make well thought out requests. They do not want the PA to become a field trip fund.

Next month a vote will be taken to approve the packet as a whole. We cannot pick and choose to approve certain items.

If approved, money can be used this year or at the beginning of the next school year.

According to the bylaws we cannot vote on it at this meeting. It needs to be reviewed and put on next month's agenda.

Once the motion is on the floor at the March meeting, discussion can happen again.
