## DESE teams have moved on and the 2009 MCAS testing has begun . . .

Once again, I would like to echo my thanks to all of the parents, staff, students, and members of the Board of Trustees for their participation in the focus group meetings with our site visitors from the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education. Two of the team members teach at charter schools in the area, Rising Tide in Plymouth and Sturgis in Hyannis. A third member of the team teaches at the Lyons Elementary School in Randolph. The other two members are from the DESE Charter School division. We should have the final report in about eight weeks. The chair of the team met briefly with administrators on Thursday afternoon to give us some feedback. There were no surprises and the team acknowledged all of the changes that the school has made since the beginning of the school year to improve student performance in reading, writing, and mathematics. Once we receive the final document, I will share it with everyone and post it on our website.

On Friday, we were able to briefly pause and catch our breath, only to have to get ready for the MCAS! This week begins the 2009 MCAS testing cycle for students in grades 3 through 10. From March 31 through April $15^{\text {th }}$, students across the Commonwealth are taking the MCAS in English Language Arts (ELA). There are two composition sessions for students in grades 4,7 and 10 and three sessions of reading comprehension in grades 3 through 8 as well as grade 10. The MCAS tests in ELA, Math and Science are "high stakes." All high school students must score 220 or higher on the MCAS. In addition, beginning with this year's $11^{\text {th }}$ grade students, local school districts are required to develop Education Proficiency Plans (EPP) for high school students scoring between 220 and 238 in ELA, Math and/or Science to ensure that they are proficient before they can receive a regular high school diploma. These requirements are part of the Massachusetts Education Reform and the federal No Child Left Behind laws. Since September, our teachers and support staff members have been working with their students to improve their reading and writing. We greatly appreciate all of the support that our families have given to help their sons and daughters become better readers and writers this year. One way that parents can help students this week and on future test days is to make certain that they have a good night's sleep and have a healthy breakfast. After the ELA testing, there is a "break" until the Math and Science tests in May. These tests will begin on May $11^{\text {th }}$.

## 7-12 PRINCIPAL REPORT

## The Learning Center

In recent weeks high school faculty and staff have been involved in discussions on how to support struggling students. As the third quarter of the school year comes to an end, some of our students are failing or in danger of failing classes for the year. Currently, the high school has an Academic Workshop that serves some students who need academic support. Coming the second week of Quarter Four, The Learning Center (TLC) will be up and running, staffed to serve all high school students who need help with their studies.

The Learning Center will replace the Academic Workshop and continue to serve those students who had been assigned to the workshop. The Learning Center will also serve students, identified through our Student Support Team, who are currently failing or in danger of failing classes. Through conversations with students, parents/guardians, and teachers, students will be assigned to The learning Center for a portion of workshop time. For example, a student failing several courses may go to The Learning Center on Tuesdays and Thursdays and go to their workshop on Mondays and Fridays. Workshop teachers will allow students to take time from workshop to attend The Learning Center to catch up in their classes. The goal of The Learning Center is to allow teachers extra time to work with students struggling academically in order to shore up gaps and deficits in their learning before returning students to a full school day schedule. We will pilot this program in the fourth quarter to determine if intensive small group and individual tutoring will provide students the lift they need to succeed in their classes.

This hands-on presentation at the SSCPS will discuss software and hardware assistive technology options available to students. Low tech options such as Alpha Smart keyboards and "post-it notes" will be discussed and demonstrated.

Grace \& Nicholas Moore are raising money to donate to the Children's Inn at The National Institute of Health in Bethesda, MD. Their brother, Benjamin, spent 11 weeks receiving treatment at NIMH (National Institute of Mental Health) last April. Grace and Nicholas stayed at the Inn for 5 weeks last year. Their mom and Benjamin, stayed at the Inn for the 11 weeks while Benjamin received treatment.

The family had a chance to experience, first hand, how important a place like the Children's Inn is to families living with chronic and sometimes life threatening illnesses. The Children's Inn provides all services free of charge. Families can stay for up to 120 days or more, in some cases, while their child is being treated.

Here is some more information about the Children's Inn taken from their website:
In June 1990, The Children's Inn at NIH opened its doors to pediatric patients and their families. Since then The Inn has been in continuous operation: 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year. Our doors never close. During the past 18 years, 8,684 seriously ill children and their families have made 40,000 visits to The Inn.

Children and families travel from all over the world to the National Institutes of Health (NIH) because conventional treatments have failed to have sufficient impact on their illnesses. Located in Bethesda, Maryland, NIH is the world's premier biomedical research facility. Children receive treatment for illnesses such as cancer, heart, lung, blood, bone and growth disorders, mental illnesses, and HIV infection. The warmth and camaraderie of The Inn stand in sharp contrast to the isolation of a hotel room. In the lively atmosphere of The Inn, the kids and their families can put aside the challenges they face. The Inn gives kids a place to be kids for a while, instead of patients. At the end of the treatment day, they leave behind the IV drips, the needles, the nurses and doctors to return to The Inn and, most importantly, to the comforting presence of their families and caring staff and volunteers.
The overriding philosophy at The Children's Inn is that families make a difference in the lives of their sick children. To treat a patient effectively, the healthcare team must care for the family and child as one. The emotional comfort a family gives to a sick child and the mutual support among kids and families who share the same experience together are invaluable.

## School Report/ Education Committee, Ted Hirsch

- DESE visit will be looking at English as a second language \& special needs
- $\quad$ Next week a letter will be going out to Level 1 parents informing them multi-age classes will continue. Decision made due to the feedback from parents \& former students. Some of the concerns raised were, how does a student go from multi-age to non multi-age? What would the social emotional well being be like for the students?
- 2 weekend retreats are coming up to focus on renewal, we are looking for a five year renewal
- Successful Enrollment Lottery held - extensive waiting lists - 51 acceptances out of 400 applicants
- $\quad$ Sibling priority means: a sibling must currently be enrolled in the school on the first day of school - 8 siblings did not get in
- Plans being discussed to restructure the \# of classes per level - Ted Hirsh to disseminate information in a clear and concise fashion - the result will be fewer classes - 18 classes of 22 students in K-8 to allow for approx 144 in HS to ensure that the HS remains viable - Due to restructuring there will be layoffs for next year, the budget will be finalized in March; employees will be notified ASAP.
- 100 students are currently enrolled from Randolph, payment for Randolph students has increased \$1,000 per student due to Prop $21 / 2$ override
- $\quad 3.2$ million dollars from stimulus package will be available soon and our application for funds has moved on the phase of the grant process
