State Budget Crisis – Needed – All Hands on Deck!

Each year at this time we send out letters of intent to rehire to our teachers. Yesterday was the day that they were distributed. Since the start of the school year, our economy has been in a free fall – at the local, state and national levels. Our state has not experienced a recession like this since the 1930s and 1940s. The dramatic decline in state and local revenue has resulted in many school boards approving budgets that are 10% less than this year. Because there are students from 27 different towns at SSCPS, we are more impacted by the economic downturn than most communities. School administrators and members of the Finance Subcommittee of the Board of Trustees are continuing to crunch the numbers but the figures are NOT GOOD. Because revenues continue to be down at the state level, we are building a budget that is 10% less than last year. This translates into a cut of more than **\$600,000.** Although we have made every effort to cut materials, supplies, textbook purchases, and defer some capital projects to reduce the budget, we have had to make the difficult decision to cut positions to get to the 10% reduction figure. It is important to note that about 82% of our budget is personnel. Earlier in the year, we decided to not replace our Facilities Manager when he resigned and that position is not in the budget. The Board Trustees has also decided to continue my contract as Executive Director, but it will be part-time. In addition, we are using all of the \$63,000 in the Special Education/IDEA stimulus funds for next year to fund \$32,500 of a Learning Services salary, professional development, and assistive technology (following the restrictive requirements for the use of these extra funds). Despite these cuts and adjustments, we still needed to make additional reductions. Yesterday, non-renewal letters went out to six staff members.

The revenue situation in the Commonwealth right now is awful and there is no quick fix or fairy godmother out there to rescue our schools – public or charter. Marc Kenen from our Charter School Association, emailed the following to all charter school leaders in the state on Tuesday: "However, I can't stress enough the dire nature of the state budget right now and despite all the warnings, I think people across the state will still be shocked at how deep the spending cuts go in all areas of the state budget. To think that charter schools will somehow escape the devastation is very difficult to believe but if we take a hit it won't be because we didn't make our case." One major concern for all charter schools is the \$893 per student that we receive in facility aid. If SSCPS looses its facility aid \$469,718 (526 x 893), I simply do not know how we would be able to make the staffing cuts and still survive. WE NEED YOUR HELP!

Something that you could do in the short-term would be to sign up for the **Massachusetts Charter School State House Day, Wednesday, April 29 from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m**. We will be chartering a bus. In this Update there is a flier from the Charter School Association with more information. Make your voice be heard at the State House. We want to have at least 40 parents on the hill that day advocating for our school.

Over the next few weeks, we will be communicating with you more about ways that you can contribute financially to help support our schools as well as through goods and services. These are NOT ORDINARY TIMES and we need your help in these difficult times. If you have not contributed to the Annual Fund – please do. The average amount given this year is \$150. Due to our current budget crisis, we need to ask you to donate as much as you can to our school. Its not just participation – it is dollars that we need.

K-6 PRINCIPAL REPORT

Last Friday, April 3rd all of our second, third and fourth graders, the Level II teachers, Wardie Mannix, Bill Tramontana, Nora Broderick, fifteen parent volunteers and I went to the Boston Symphony. It was a magical experience for me as I sat among our students as they enjoyed a world class orchestra as citizens of the world. Wardie Mannix had so thoroughly prepared the students. She had done this with not only

focused preparation of particular background knowledge about the types of pieces we would hear and orchestral music for this concert but through years of music classes. Well as with most things, careful preparation paid off. I was able to spend **the entire** concert enjoying the music and learning from the Boston Symphony Orchestra as they put on a truly well focused educational program that was right at my "zone of proximal development," and right at the students "zone of proximal development." We heard it as matched learners or to used less coded speech, we had achieved the "Goldilocks principle," the concert was just right for me and the students, we all were learning and enjoying. This was due not only to our music curriculum and teachers but to the incredible skill of the BSO's youth music educational program.

We owe a debt of gratitude to Stephanie Miller. Stephanie wrote a mini grant to help defray some of the cost of the trip and Harvard Pilgrim Health Care rewarded us with \$500. We also would like to thank Kristine Shipps who secured a grant of \$200 from the Yellow School bus Foundation to help our parents with the cost of this trip. Thanks to Stephanie, Kristine, Harvard Pilgrim Health Care, the Yellow School Bus Foundation and all of the parents who chaperone. You all helped make this such good experience for our children and our staff. I hope you enjoy the following examples of some third and fourth grade writing from Krista Cafourek's class about the trip.

I enjoyed the BSO and had fun. My favorite part was when I got to see two kids get to help the conductor. I loved how all the songs they played were marches and waltzes. I loved that because you only need to focus on that one thing so it will help you learn it quicker. Also, while the songs were played some of them told stories. One of them was about a man that got killed. The orchestra played a song from Harry Potter. I don't rally watch that movie but I saw it once. Last but not least, Beethoven's name was on the ceiling in front of the orchestra stage. I thought that was amazing. I want to thank the people that gave us some of the money to go.

When we went to the BSO it was so much fun. The music was amazing. The best was the <u>Imperial</u> <u>March from Star Wars</u>. The music changed my feelings, happy, sad, excited, scared, ashamed, scared out of my wits, angry, embarrassed, and energetic. I have never been so interested in music.

I loved the experience to be at the BSO. When we got there the stadium seemed bigger. Just to be there was an honor. Not many people get to go to the symphony. I liked the Imperial March. It sounded like a Fourth of July parade. I've been to the BSO before and I love going there. I wonder if I'll go next year.

I am sure you learned more about the trip from the words of students. I have transcribed their writing verbatim with the exception of four misspellings which I corrected. As all of you know who have received an e-mail from me when I have forgotten to hit spell check my first draft never hit that rate of accuracy or clarity. Joan has presented Assistive Technology at MECC and NERCOMP. In October 2006, Joan presented Assistive Technology and E-Portfolios at the annual meeting of the Association of Educational Therapists national conference.

This hands-on presentation at the SSCPS will discuss software and hardware assistive technology options available to students. Assistive technology options addressed will include text-to-speech software and speech-to-text software. Also discussed will be talking text book options such as Recording for the Blind and Dyslexic (RFB&D). Low tech options such as Alpha Smart keyboards and "post-it notes" will be discussed and demonstrated.

Grace & Nicholas Moore are raising money to donate to the Children's Inn at The National Institute of Health in Bethesda, MD. Their brother, Benjamin, spent 11 weeks receiving treatment at NIMH (National Institute of Mental Health) last April. Grace and Nicholas stayed at the Inn for 5 weeks last year. Their mom and Benjamin, stayed at the Inn for the 11 weeks while Benjamin received treatment.

The family had a chance to experience, first hand, how important a place like the Children's Inn is to families living with chronic and sometimes life threatening illnesses. The Children's Inn provides all services free of charge. Families can stay for up to 120 days or more, in some cases, while their child is being treated.

Here is some more information about the Children's Inn taken from their website: In June 1990, The Children's Inn at NIH opened its doors to pediatric patients and their families. Since then The Inn has been in continuous operation: 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year. Our doors never close. During the past 18 years, 8,684 seriously ill children and their families have made 40,000 visits to The Inn.

Children and families travel from all over the world to the National Institutes of Health (NIH) because conventional treatments have failed to have sufficient impact on their illnesses. Located in Bethesda, Maryland, NIH is the world's premier biomedical research facility. Children receive treatment for illnesses such as cancer, heart, lung, blood, bone and growth disorders, mental illnesses, and HIV infection. The warmth and camaraderie of The Inn stand in sharp contrast to the isolation of a hotel room. In the lively atmosphere of The Inn, the kids and their families can put aside the challenges they face. The Inn gives kids a place to be kids for a while, instead of patients. At the end of the treatment day, they leave behind the IV drips, the needles, the nurses and doctors to return to The Inn and, most importantly, to the comforting presence of their families and caring staff and volunteers.

The overriding philosophy at The Children's Inn is that families make a difference in the lives of their sick children. To treat a patient effectively, the healthcare team must care for the family and child as one. The emotional comfort a family gives to a sick child and the mutual support among kids and families who share the same experience together are invaluable.
