Celebrating 14 years as a Charter School and our 14th graduation

SSCPS's fourteenth graduation is a week from Saturday, June 6th, at 11:00 a.m. Members of the Board of Trustees, school administrators, faculty, family and friends will gather to honor the twenty-three members of the Class of 2009 for all of their accomplishments and wish them well as they move on to new challenges and adventures. At last year's graduation, we established a "new" tradition – recognizing students and staff who had been with the school for thirteen years – kindergarten through grade twelve. In 2008, there were four students and four staff members who had been with us since the opening of our school in Hull, Massachusetts in 1995. This year, there are four members of the Class of 2009 who have been with us since kindergarten – Alyse Algera, Kelly Garber, Carly Hayes, and Thomas (Tee) Smith. In addition to the four staff members recognized last year for their service and commitment to the school since its founding (Velma Begley, Claudia Darrow, Ted Hirsch, and Rick Small), there are three staff members this year who have been with us for thirteen years: Cyndie Connolly, Claire Overlee, and Helen (Wardie) Mannix. Dr. Gorsuch, our former K-12 principal, came up with the title, "Fraternity of Thirteen" to recognize students and staff who had been with the school for thirteen consecutive years. We have ordered plaques to be displayed in the front lobby that will recognize the "fraternity" and we will add names to these plaques each spring, after graduation.

K-6 PRINCIPAL REPORT

On Friday May 1st many people donated perennials for a new memorial garden. That afternoon The Conservation Workshop (Level IV) took those plants and put in the first stages of a Memorial Garden. The planting and work done by the students in the project went without a hitch as twelve students, their project leader, Emily Merwin, and three parent volunteers put in the garden. Now this was not a typical garden, for one thing it was designed by the students as they planted. That Friday afternoon there were leaders and independent thinkers. These students had design conversations and thoughts about some things then others; for example, special care was made about where to put the forget-me-nots. The garden was put in using a method of planting inspired by "no till agriculture," a type of agriculture where the soil is not turned prior to planting and the seeds are drilled into the ground. This method is used to minimize erosion and is a appropriate method for the "Conservation Project" to use. When the students planted the garden they merely removed small sections of sod and inserted the perennials. In the month of May we have been blessed with sufficient rain and all of the perennials that were put in are living and look healthy, some of them are blooming and many look as if they have been there for years. This garden is an example of why we believe in the South Shore Charter Public School's model of projects. The experience of working with these students, some of whom had never worked with a garden before was joyous and eye opening. One of them said, "Now I understand the reason for hard work," and another student's mother said, "I hope you are taking notes because you are going to do this at home for our garden." The work of these students will be ongoing and last for years, which is one of the models that the founders of the school felt was essential to projects. This garden will help us to remember the wonderful people who have been a part of the school and are sadly no longer with us. In time I am sure with the steady help of the students this garden will become a show place and a beautiful garden not just a wonderful learning experience and an environmentally sensitive planting plan.

Last Friday, Cyndie Connolly and I took Cathe Hayes to show her the garden. Cathe is the mother of two of our high school students, who have been at SSCPS since kindergarten. Cyndie, Cathe and I admired how well all of the plants were doing and we talked about the garden. Cathe talked about how over time a path would appear and how the garden would become beautiful. We also talked about her senior Carly and her school experiences and her plans for the future. I learned that Carly is going to study voice at the New England Conservatory and I felt great satisfaction to hear about her successes and triumphs in the demanding and highly completive world of classical music, where the New England Conservatory is world renowned.

Cathe then told me about Carly's early years in the school when she had been with me in the "Garden Project" and Cathe told me how they had been talking about that time. What Carly had remembered best about the Garden Project was dead fish. At first I did not remember any dead fish but Cathe reminded me that whenever we found a fish carcass on the beach at A Street in Hull we would bring the fish to the garden and dig the fish into the soil. We had learned about how the Wampanoag had fertilized their gardens with dead fish and we did the same with ours. It had impact as the children would ask their parents to bring dead fish to school.

This is the last week the Conservation Project can take perennial plants if you would still like your plants to be a part of the Memorial Garden.


