By August 1st, every charter school must submit its Annual Report to the Department. This year, there have been some changes in the requirements and in the format for the reports and Mr. Ashton wanted to discuss them with us. One important point that he stressed is the annual satisfaction survey and the participation rates of the faculty, students, parents and Trustees. Mr. Ashton and his team visited SSCPS in March and in their follow -up report, they noted that the parent participation rate in last year's survey was very low. Feedback from parents and participation in the annual survey is important every year but it is CRUCIAL this year because we are up for Charter Renewal. Tomorrow, Thursday, June 4, we will be emailing everyone the link to take the electronic survey about our school. PLEASE find the time to take the on-line survey. ## Senior Projects

In the past week seniors returned to campus after spending a month away from the school house. The seniors were away for Senior Project and returned to present what they had learned from their project experiences. It was impressive to see how much they had grown in the past month. The students were excited about their work on Senior Project and assured that the knowledge gained from this work better prepared them for the future.

Our seniors were involved in a wide range of projects, from internships in hospitals, businesses, science centers, and probate courts to research on forensic science. In presentations limited to twenty minutes, students spoke with confidence on their learning during the past month and all of them had trouble keeping their talk within the constraints of the imposed time limit.

It is a testimony to the progressive nature of our educational program at SSCPS that, while other schools struggle to make senior year meaningful to students, we offer our students a full-time Senior Project experience that places them in the world they will soon graduate into. Time and again at the presentations seniors spoke of the value of the projects. Whether the opportunity confirmed an educational and occupational direction, added further understanding of a professional field, or allowed students to acquire valuable experiences in the world, every senior voiced satisfaction and appreciation for the opportunity to participate in senior projects.

The 2009 Senior Project experience also highlighted the quality of the students who attend SSCPS. Representatives from South Shore Hospital took time from their busy schedules to watch the presentations of the three students who interned there. They told us how impressed they were with our students, and how our students stood out among the hundreds of hospital volunteers that work at the hospital. One of our seniors was the first student to ever do an internship at Boston Sympathy Hall. Because of her skill and poise pioneering an internship at the Hall, future students will now have the internship experience available to them at one of the premiere concert venues in the world. It is worth noting that despite these difficult economic times, half our student interns were offered jobs at their internship sites. And it is also worth noting that while students across the country suffer from "senioritis" the majority of our seniors completed their academic work at SSCPS making the honor roll.

As the school year winds to an end in these uncertain times, it is comforting to know that a progressive school, grounded in academics, service, and life, can help to educate young people who have and will continue to make a difference.
