MCAS results and improving student performance . . .

As I mentioned in my letter to parents earlier this week, under the federal No Child Left Behind (NCLB) regulations, all districts and schools are required to report their progress toward helping all students reach grade-level proficiency by 2014. Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) measures progress toward meeting federally required annual performance targets in English Language Arts and Mathematics. Determinations are issued for overall and subgroup performance. The Spring 2008 results identified 88 districts (23 percent) and 828 schools (50 percent) as schools in need of improvement because they did not make AYP for two or more consecutive years. The 828 schools are spread across 243 districts. In 2007, 82 districts (21 percent) and 672 schools (approximately 37 percent) received an accountability status by not meeting performance or improvement targets. Seventy-five (75) percent of middle schools are identified for improvement, corrective action, or restructuring. Of the identified schools, 51 percent (424 schools) are located in non-urban areas.

Late last week, Education Commissioner Mitchell Chester announced plans to restructure the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education to provide greater support to districts and schools identified for improvement based on the 2008 Adequate Yearly Progress reports. Commissioner Chester stated the Department did "not take the accountability status of any school or district lightly, but we also do not consider the schools to be failures," and he noted that "Across the Commonwealth are examples of districts and schools that have not met federal targets but have made great progress academically and, while they have more work to do, are clearly moving in the right direction." Chester said his Department reorganization plan was developed specifically to position the agency to provide greater assistance and support to these schools and districts.

We at SSCPS welcome the new Commissioner's decision to restructure his Department so that DESE can provide greater assistance and support to all schools in the Commonwealth. However, as you learned in my letter, we made some decisions last year that changes needed to be made to improve teaching and learning at SSCPS (twenty-three plus) last year and we are implementing them. As I have written in each update, the academic success and achievement of your student and our school is predicated upon a strong partnership between the teacher, student and his/her parent. We have begun the goal setting/academic planning meetings to discuss your son or daughter's academic performance and MCAS results and establish goals for the year. We believe that on-going communication and collaboration are essential to making the 2008-2009 school year the best one ever for your child.

Last November, Ted, Tom Gorsuch and I instituted Quarterly Coffee Hours. They will continue again this year with a new twist – the Level Coordinator and our Learning Services Director, Jo Feldman, will join Ted and me for the coffee hour. The coffee hours will begin at 8:30 a.m. and end at 9:30 a.m. The dates for the first Quarterly Coffee Hours are as follows:

October 6:Level IV and High SchoolOctober 20:Level IIIOctober 27:Level IIINovember 3:Level I

Ted and I will also be discussing the MCAS results at the next Parent Association meeting which is Tuesday, October 7. In addition to the coffee hours and the goal/academic planning meetings with your son/daughter's teacher, Ted, Jo Feldman and I are always available to meet with you to discuss your child's academic progress.

School Safety, Bus Safety and After-School Pick-Up

Over the past two weeks, the bus drivers as well as some parents have commented to us that some drivers are not following the Massachusetts Law that requires all motorists to stop for school buses when students are getting on/off

the bus. Not only is this the law, it is extremely dangerous for our young bus students to have cars driving past them. For everyone's safety (and to avoid the possibility of being cited by a police officer), please stop for the bus.

With so many traffic delays, road construction, and work issues, more and more parents are arriving after 3:30 p.m. to pick up their children. Again, in the interests of safety and because our teachers are often involved in parent meetings, faculty, meetings, department meetings, and working with students after 3:30 p.m., we recognize that we need to put something in place that works for families and, at the same time, ensures that there is supervision of the students "left" in the building. The problem of late pick-up began last year. This year, with very legitimate traffic problems on the roads, we have decided to assign two individuals to supervise students not picked up on time (note: ALL students MUST be picked up no later than 4:45 p.m.). This will be a pilot program through the fall and we are using funds from our budget to pay these supervisors. Of course, we expect that all school rules will be followed by the students and that they will be respectful towards the supervisors during this time. For parents who are chronically late, the administration will meet with them to discuss the situation and work out a payment plan.

Over the next week, our new Development Associate, Geri Calos, will be handing out fliers for our Harvest Road Race during drop-off and pick-up (while you are waiting in line), and introducing herself to you. Geri will be our "point person" for all fundraisers. Of course, if you can only contribute to one fundraiser this year – it needs to be our Annual Fund that supports our school budget and helps us to provide the "extras" that you do not find in your local schools. In addition to runners for the race (a 5 mile race), we need volunteers for registration, the water tables, etc. Volunteering to help us at the Road Race is a great way to get to meet other parents and students. Also, as you know, our students need to do a certain number of hours each year of community service. We need volunteers on that day and your student can earn community service hours! K-6 PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Yesterday at our first K – 12 faculty meeting of the year we had three very special guests, ninth graders, Claire Cantave Deanna Marshall, and Kathleen Poteau. These young women, along with a volunteer Stacey Zawel, created a book documenting Community Service. They came to the meeting to explain to us that the purpose of the book was to explain to new teachers and students what community service at our school is all about. These young women as speakers and as creators are a great testimony to the power of workshop and project based learning. We continue to be committed to this kind of experiential group learning/work and five members of our faculty were in Springfield yesterday at training gaining greater skills to help them with their projects and workshops.

Yesterday we also mailed home to you the MCAS scores. The MCAS is the test that we use in Massachusetts to determine how well our students are doing in learning a proscribed set of skills and knowledge. Outside experts consider it to be among the most difficult state test in the country and it is particularly difficult in the early grades. In Prue's letter we sent out on Monday she described twenty-three steps we have taken this year to improve the education that we are giving to our students. We are taking these adjustments not simply to help our school perform better on the MCAS but to give your child a better education. The changes that Prue listed have already made the school more effective. I can see it in every classroom, every day. I see children writing, thinking, and diligently working at their math. Prue and I and the Level Coordinators will be scheduling meetings and coffee hours to talk about MCAS and all aspects of the school; -please look for the dates.

One of the items on the list of 23 changes was the Core Knowledge Reading Program which our Kindergarteners and teachers piloted last year. On Monday we got the results from the pilot and our Kindergarteners scored very well, in fact they scored the highest among any of the ten schools in the pilot both in phonics knowledge/skills as well as oral language comprehension. (For those who remember their statistics, in phonics they were almost two standard deviations above the mean and in oral language they were one standard deviation away from the mean, or in normal talk they did very, very well.) We are very pleased to continue this pilot with both our first graders and our kindergarteners.
