Fall Road Race Fundraiser for SSCPS, October 18

K-6 PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

We have completed the first month of the school year and what a month it was! So much has been accomplished by our tireless teachers and staff, and by our students. Everywhere I go I see students not only engaged and interested in their studies and work, but smiling and thinking. I was sitting in my office yesterday and I heard Wardie playing music as the students from Kristin's Pod came into the music room. Well, I had to go in. I was like the children of Hamelin following the Pied Piper. Wardie then began to teach them a new song, "Jesse James." I thought "Jesse James," wow what a commentary on the goings on in our economy. There is a lyric in that song that has always been one of my favorites. It goes like this, "He'd a hand and a heart and a brain." I was eager to explain the lyric to the students not only because I like it, but because I thought it was too hard for 3rd and 4th graders to understand. However the students in the class said, "No, no we understand." The students explained the meaning of all three metaphors in that line. They told me that the "hand" meant that Jesse James helped people, that "heart" meant that he cared, and that "brain" meant that he was smart and could figure things out. This class and all of the classes I have been seeing are showing me all three values: "hand" (hard work), "heart" (caring and kindness), and "brain" (creativity and thoughtfulness.) This is a school that we all care deeply about and will continue to work hard to make even better.

We are very pleased to say the Dismissal is going well. We want to thank everyone for their patience and cooperation. It feels like we have settled into a pattern and have started to learn the cars as well as the parents; this knowledge is what it takes for the process to go smoothly. At the back door we have made a slight modification in the pick up routine and now the first 20 or so cars will be using the available parking. We tried this yesterday and it was much more effective and quieter. We also want to reiterate the policy of late pick-up. At 3:25, K – 8 students are brought to the quiet room. We will place a call to parents/guardians notifying them that their children are still at school. Each family is given two times where a fee is not required. After those two times a fee per child will be assessed. We are so pleased with how well families are able to negotiate the difficult commuting patterns and traffic and we urge everyone to keep up their vigilance.

Yesterday at a High School Special Meeting, Carmel and Jean Desgrottes came to talk with the High School students about what we as a community could do to help the people in need in Haiti. The Desgrottes explained to the students just how different life in Haiti is from life here. They said that here a teenager could earn five or six dollars an hour and yet in Haiti the average adult wage for a year was \$300.00. They also explained the extreme devastation of the three hurricanes that struck Haiti on all of the infrastructure and how difficult life had become. This was particularly compelling as the Desgrottes had been in Haiti when some of the storms had struck. They told us that there were 80,000 people who had no homes. The Desgrottes gracefully told about the people they knew and how working with them we could be assured that the help we give would get to the people in need. At that meeting it was decided that we would do three things in the near future to help the people in Haiti. The first is that the Desgrottes would pair us up with a partner school and we would send school supplies. The second is that we are collecting used clothing that the Desgrottes will send to Haiti. Please donate any unwanted clothes and place them in boxes outside of Mary Coles' classroom in the lobby. The final plan we have developed is to encourage those running in the upcoming Harvest Road Race to gather sponsors and the sponsors' money will be donated to accredited Haitian relief agencies. We are grateful to the Desgrottes for getting us started on this important work.

Join us for a fun and fast community service project to keep Nantasket Beach and its neighborhood clean. This Saturday at 10am, students, families and friends of SSCPS will gather for a Coastal Sweep at Nantasket Beach in Hull. (The rain date will be on Sunday, October 5th at 10am). Participants will gather at the Mary Jeanette Murray Bathhouse parking lot, located on Nantasket Avenue, right next to the playground. (Look for my light blue Subaru Forester - I'll have my flashers on until 10am.) The CoastSweep coordinator is expected to be there just to get us started. Please dress appropriately. Younger children usually only spend a half hour, and older children and teens about an hour or more, depending on their interest and how much debris has been washed in on the tides. All the supplies will be provided: trash bags, gloves, data cards, pencils. Students and their families and friends can work in groups of four.
