K-6 PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

As I was watching the 5 Mile race on Saturday at Wompatuck State Park, I was thinking about trees and how enjoyable it was to look at individual trees in the woods on a beautiful fall day. I thought about how knowing the different species of trees and their traits made the woods even more spectacular. I thought about how this knowledge of trees is a wonderful analogy to learning. The more we know the more we can see. I also started thinking about students and how important it is to see each one as an individual. We have been talking as a faculty on how to work together to make targets for all of our students so that they can do all they can this year. We are trying hard not to look at the forest but to see the individual trees. I have had a few individual meetings with parents at their request to see how together we can help the child learn even more effectively in school and at home. I invite you to set up a time to talk with me about how we can best work together.

Elsewhere in this Update is a description of the Collins Writing Program. We are being trained or retrained in Collins Writing or "writing across the curriculum" this year. I have already seen an impact in both the amount and the quality of our students' writing. One of the Types of Collins Writing is a Type 1. In a Type 1 there is no correct answer. I was in a Level III classroom and as you can tell from the paragraph above I have trees on my

mind. I gave the students a Type 1 prompt asking them to write 8 lines on their favorite tree in ten minutes. The students all looked at me in an odd way and then proceeded to write about their favorite trees. I was amazed at the poetic nature of their writing and in the variety. They had so many different types of favorite trees: palm, oak (3), all (because they all help the environment), redwood (2), money, apple (3), cherry, maple, willow (2), ginkgo, pine (2) and fruit. The writing was thoughtful and much of it round (by which I mean that it turned into itself.) There is great beauty in the round form. Here is one example of the writing I received and see if you too think it is round.

"I love all trees, but overall my favorite would be a willow tree. I love the way that their majestic leaves droop over and sway in the cool winds. I especially love the way that whatever the cost they will always give you a nice shady place to sit on a warm summer day. Willow trees are spectacular in the way that they grow, they look awesome when they grow with the lumps and misformations. Willow trees are my favorite tree." Written by a Level III student

ON THE LEVELS

Collins Writing

Included in this Update is an explanation of the five "types" of writing outlined by the Collins program. Teachers at all grade levels have been trained and are implementing the Collins writing program. Our goal is to foster a culture of writing at SSCPS. Central to the philosophy of the program is providing students with targeted areas for improvement. These are called Focus Correction Areas (FCAs). The result is realistic goals for students and increased fluency. Parents and students may notice that writing is not evaluated in the way they are used to as not every student error is corrected every time students write. For example, in a "type 1" piece of writing spelling is not corrected. As a general rule the higher the Collins' type the more exacting are the requirements. While some pieces of writing will go through several stages of editing, others are used for brainstorming or to check for factual information. The Collins program believes that frequent writing of all types in all subject areas especially the lower "types" are critical in developing skilled writers.

Collins Writing Program Five Types of Writing

Type 1: Capture Ideas

Type 1 writing gets ideas on paper -- it's brainstorming. Type 1 is timed and requires a minimum number of items or lines to be generated. Questions and/or guesses are permitted. Evaluated with a check (\checkmark) or a minus (-).

Type 2: Respond Correctly

Type 2 writing shows that the writer knows something about a topic or has thought about the topic. It is a correct answer to a specific question. One draft.

Type 3: Edit for FCAs

Type 3 writing has substantive content and meets up to three specific standards called "focus correction areas" (FCA). It is read out loud and reviewed to see if the draft completes the assignment, is easy to read and meets standards set for the focus correction areas. Revision and editing are done on the original. One draft.

Type 4: Peer Edit for FCAs

Type 4 writing is Type 3 writing that is read aloud and critiqued by another. Two drafts.

Type 5: Publish

Type 5 writing is a publishable quality. Multiple drafts.

For All Types

For all types, skip lines. For Types 1 and 2, label the type on the top left-hand side of paper. For Types 3 and 4, list focus correction areas on top left-hand side. Type 3 and 4 papers should be saved and used to practice editing skills.
