What a wonderful week for SSCPS!

Have you ever noticed that good news often comes in bunches or in threes? For SSCPS, we have four wonderful announcements to share with you. First, Dr. James (Jim) Connolly has accepted the position of 7-12 principal. Jim is very excited about becoming part of our community and is looking forward to getting to know and working with our parents. Jim has thirteen years of experience as a secondary school administrator and holds a doctorate in School Leadership and School Administration from Boston College. Although his official start date is Monday, December 1st, he will be here for some special events before his start date. This Saturday is the second Board Retreat and we have invited Jim to attend and meet all of the Board members. Jim will also be at the two Open Houses for future students scheduled for Saturday, November 15th and Tuesday, November 18th. The Saturday Open House is for entering students in grades K-11 and the one on Tuesday is for students entering grades 7-11 next year. We would also like to schedule a reception for Jim for parents and faculty to welcome him officially into our "family". I will keep you posted on a date and time that works for Jim.

Our second piece of good news was the great press coverage of the art work that our students exhibited at the John Kilroy Fine Art Academy in Rockland over the weekend. The theme for the exhibit was "If I could change the world." Community Newspaper reporter Mikaela Slaney, along with photographer Robin Chan, visited our students in the Art classroom. Their story was on the front page of the Norwell Mariner and the Rockland Standard weekly edition (there was also a webcast interview). Next on the good news front is the notification from the Executive Department of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the Secretary of Education, Paul Reville, that five members of the Class of 2009 have qualified to receive the John and Abigail Adams Scholarship. Their eligibility is based upon their scoring in the advanced and high proficient levels on their 10th grade ELA and Math MCAS. The Adams Scholarship entitles students to four years of FREE tuition at a University Massachusetts campus or participating state or community college. Congratulations Alyse Algera, Ryan Brenner, Kelly Garber, Jordan Kellem, and Andrew Tyler! This is the fifth year that the state has awarded these scholarships for high academic achievement. Our state college and university system is highly regarded across the country and performing well on the MCAS and getting a four year tuition scholarship are more reasons why our students need to take the high stakes MCAS tests seriously. Well done, Alyse, Ryan, Kelly, Jordan, and Andrew.

Our last announcement also comes from the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education. Last June we applied for a federal Charter School Dissemination Grant. We have learned that we are one of two Charter Schools to be awarded this grant in the amount of \$72,500. The funds from this grant will be used to provide on-going training for kindergarten and first grade teachers at the John F. Kennedy Elementary School in Holbrook. SSCPS has been meeting with administrators from Holbrook since last November and when the opportunity presented itself for us to apply for a Dissemination grant, we jumped at it. Bev Bruce, our Title I ELA tutor, will be released to work with Holbrook and our kindergarten and first grade teachers on the new Core Knowledge Reading Pilot. Since we received a tentative go ahead to apply for the grant in late June, Bev, Ted Hirsch and I have met with Holbrook staff over the summer and into the fall to plan how to best implement our "partnership". It's a pleasure to report that, after being vacant since last spring, the Fundraising Committee has new leadership. Dottie Kennedy-Brooks and Paul Carberry, both new parents, have agreed to take on this important committee. They've met several times and been in contact extensively with me, Deidre Lamoureux, PA chair, and Geri Calos, our Development Associate. Their first priority is to define and focus the mission of the committee more clearly and to gather all the necessary information on past events. They also want to collaborate closely with the Development Committee of the

Board of Trustees. And, of course, they'll need your help and will be reaching out for volunteers and support. We'll report on their **activities regularly** in the Update. Thank you Dottie and Paul for volunteering to serve as the co-chairs. Your expertise with fundraising, planning, coordinating, and executing successful events is a blessing for this school, especially at this time when we need to raise more funds than ever to support SSCPS because of the downturn in the economy and state budget cuts.

K-6 PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Three years ago the Core Knowledge Foundation came to visit our school. During this visit the head of Professional Development at Core Knowledge asked us if we would consider piloting Core Knowledge's new reading program. We agreed as long as they understood that we were a non traditional school and would be implementing the program in our own singular way. The Foundation agreed. Two summers ago many of the Level I teachers went to Virginia and were trained. Last year our Kindergarteners were among the first students in the nation to use the program. It was a wonderful success with or students' phonics ability off the charts with a median and mean score of the 97th percentile. This year we are piloting the First Grade Program and again many of our teachers went to Virginia for intensive training and we are well on our way to piloting the first grade program. The Core Knowledge Foundation was so eager for us to pilot the program because they saw the great skill and inventiveness of our faculty. This year as we use the first grade materials we see many things that could be improved as we did with the kindergarten materials last year, but one of the pieces that keeps our teachers motivated is the changes that we see in the Kindergarten program this year in the 2.0 version. It is wonderful to see the impact of our ideas on curriculum materials that will be used by so many children including one thousand kindergarteners in New York City this year.

Last spring our administrative team met with Holbrook Public Schools' administrative team and agreed to put together a Dissemination Grant proposal to share the Core Knowledge Reading Pilot with the Holbrook for their first graders and kindergarteners. We have just received notification that we have been awarded the grant. This \$72,500 grant is the largest educational grant our school has ever received and it is federal money so it is unaffected by the state' current fiscal difficulties. Bev will be working with our teachers and Holbrook's teachers to support this important reading initiative. We are all so pleased to have Bev's clarity of thought and organizational skill behind this project and I am confident that Bev's skills will help students not just in our school but in many schools in Massachusetts to learn to read with accuracy and with understanding.

In the past week we have had 14 teachers and administrators from Holbrook receiving Professional Development from Bev and our Kindergarten Teams. They have been visiting classes and have been uniformly excited about our school. It is so uplifting to hear other educational professionals see the quality of our students' work. This morning I went in the Velma Begley's Pod to work with her on an agenda for the November 4th Professional Development. All of Velma's students were working independently and Velma and I completed our planning. I then had the joy of staying in Velma's Pod and teaching a First Grade Core Knowledge Lesson. The quality that the Holbrook teachers talked about was evident in Velma's students. The children were focused on their work and when they showed their work to a teacher for feedback they received the feedback on how to make it better with eagerness and pride. What was even more impressive to me was to see their follow through as they went back and made the suggested changes.

In Velma's Pod the first graders read with concentration and thought, while the second graders wrote with focus and pride. The first graders worked in pairs and each pair knew how to support their partners and how to get adult support when it was needed. There were two moments in the half hour that stood out for me. The first moment was when a student saw a squirrel at the bird feeder. He impulsively called out to everyone in the class. My first instinct as a teacher was to quiet the child down and tell everyone to get back to work. That was not what Velma choose to do she had a much better reaction to the situation. What Velma did was to turn this situation into a teaching moment. She had everyone look at the squirrel for a short period of time. There was a discussion of how the squirrels presents explained why the feeder had once fallen down and how all animals needed to eat. Soon all of the students were back hard at work and they knew their teacher cared about many of the things that they cared about and that she cared about them. The second event that was memorable for me was when a first grader came up to me to ask about a question in the First Grade Core Knowledge Workbook that had confused him. He wanted to know what to do as his memory of what had happened in the story did not match the question. Soon he was taking my advice to reread the story and making this learning strategy his own. I thought about how much pride he had in his work and how the suggestion to reread a text seemed to be already so much a part of his typical working methods. It was not yet an independent skill but it was part of his learning repertoire. This kind of teaching and learning is going on in every classroom in our school and I am sure that is why we have been honored with this Dissemination Grant. We look forward to our collaboration with Holbrook and the fulfilling of the goal of having the lessons learned in charter schools being an engine that helps all children in all schools.

ON THE LEVELS

Collins Writing

Included in this Update is an explanation of the five "types" of writing outlined by the Collins program. Teachers at all grade levels have been trained and are implementing the Collins writing program. Our goal is to foster a culture of writing at SSCPS. Central to the philosophy of the program is providing students with targeted areas for improvement. These are called Focus Correction Areas (FCAs). The result is realistic goals for students and increased fluency. Parents and students may notice that writing is not evaluated in the way they are used to as not every student error is corrected every time students write. For example, in a "type 1" piece of writing spelling is not corrected. As a general rule the higher the Collins' type the more exacting are the requirements. While some pieces of writing will go through several stages of editing, others are used for brainstorming or to check for factual information. The Collins program believes that frequent writing of all types in all subject areas especially the lower "types" are critical in developing skilled writers.

Collins Writing Program Five Types of Writing

Type 1: Capture Ideas

Type 1 writing gets ideas on paper -- it's brainstorming. Type 1 is timed and requires a minimum number of items or lines to be generated. Questions and/or guesses are permitted. Evaluated with a check (\checkmark) or a minus (-).

Type 2: Respond Correctly

Type 2 writing shows that the writer knows something about a topic or has thought about the topic. It is a correct answer to a specific question. One draft.

Type 3: Edit for FCAs

Type 3 writing has substantive content and meets up to three specific standards called "focus correction areas" (FCA). It is read out loud and reviewed to see if the draft completes the assignment, is easy to read and meets standards set for the focus correction areas. Revision and editing are done on the original. One draft.

Type 4: Peer Edit for FCAs

Type 4 writing is Type 3 writing that is read aloud and critiqued by another. Two drafts.

Type 5: Publish

Type 5 writing is a publishable quality. Multiple drafts.

For All Types

For all types, skip lines. For Types 1 and 2, label the type on the top left-hand side of paper. For Types 3 and 4, list focus correction areas on top left-hand side. Type 3 and 4 papers should be saved and used to practice editing skills.
