Board Retreat, Charter Renewal and Long-Range Planning

Last Saturday the Board of Trustees, school administrators and faculty representatives met with consultant Janice Kinder to review our mission, academic achievement goals, our financial viability, and board development. This was a follow-up to our full day retreat in July. While we accomplished much over the two days, there is still much to do for the Board, school administration, faculty, and parents as we prepare for our fourth charter renewal. By law, the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) conducts ongoing performance reviews of each charter in the fifth year of the school's charter term determines whether or not to renew the school's charter. The DESE's decision is based upon our faithfulness to the terms of our charter, the success of our academic program, and the viability of the school as an organization. Our charter renewal application is due no later than August 1, 2009.

Over the next few months, the Board, school administrators and staff will be preparing our application and we will be looking for feedback from you. An important part of the process is the role and involvement of parents in our school. One way to get feedback from everyone on how we are doing and our faithfulness to our mission and charter is to survey all of our stakeholders. Normally we do this at the end of the year as part of our Annual Report. This year, we plan to do two surveys: one in January and one in June. Over the past several years, parent response to our survey has been extremely low. Just as we need to get to 100% participation for our Annual Fund, we also need to get a better response from all stakeholders on our important surveys. We will do the surveys electronically and I will not only include an announcement about the survey in the Update, I will also use ALERT NOW to remind everyone to participate.

Another "election": Proposed By-Law Changes and Ballot

No matter which candidates we voted for in yesterday's election, we should all be so proud to be Americans. What a record turn-out in this state and across the country. From the news reports last evening and this morning, I learned that record numbers of citizens around the world followed our election results on radio, television, the worldwide web. It is truly wonderful to see democracy in action.

Which leads me to SSCPS's own ballot that you will be receiving electronically or by mail today or tomorrow. Last spring and over the summer, members of the Board of Trustee's Governance Subcommittee have been going over our school's by-laws with a fine tooth comb as we prepare for our charter renewal. Many of the proposed by-laws changes were discussed and voted upon by the Board of Trustees in April and, due to the refinancing of our loans, we were unable to include the proposed changes in last spring's ballot to elect trustees. In keeping with our "Go Green" initiative, we will be electronically emailing most of you the ballot to download and print up. We will also mail the printed ballot to those parents that do NOT receive the Update electronically. There are ELEVEN proposed by-law changes. Please follow the directions and RETURN the HARD COPY of the ballot to us. All ballots must be received by noon on Thursday, November 20th. As Ted and I keep writing in the Update, parent involvement is a key part of this school and we need you to exercise your right to vote and have a say in what goes on at SSCPS.

Update on Executive Director Search

Jo Loughnane, Chair of the Personnel Subcommittee and Board of Trustees member is overseeing the Executive Director Search Process. We received twenty-eight applications and the fourteen member Search Committee has identified three candidates to interview. The semi-finalists are being interviewed this week and next. Many thanks to Jo, Board member and Vice-Chair, Jeff Seglin, administrators, parents, faculty, and students for agreeing to serve on this most important committee.

K-6 PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

On Friday I met with the Level I students at their "All Pod Meeting" and talked about the upcoming election. I told them that, whatever the outcome, the idea and beauty of our country was far greater than any one president or office holder could ever be. I told them that in my life sometimes a candidate I wanted to win an election would win, and that other times they would lose, and that I had even at times cried about the outcome of an election. They thought that was odd and gave each other looks of puzzlement. Then I told them that I hoped that one day one of them might be President. When I said that there was a reaction among 140 young children I had never heard before. Immediately there was a buzz that began; I heard the quiet focused sound of students talking to their neighbors about the possibility of being President. They were quiet and serious and of course as the oldest child was eight, their understanding of what it is to be President was incomplete. But from what I have read everyone's understanding of that office is incomplete until they take the oath.

Two months of the school year have passed and most of us spent yesterday working together in teams to improve our work. It was a great day, a day of teamwork and collaboration and achievement on the part of the staff. One of the plans that the faculty and administrative team made last year was that this year we would spend much of our professional development on professional work. The previous two years with outside consultants we had work on developing a common language of teaching and that we needed to solidify that work in our own practice by using our professional development time to work collaboratively on our teaching. Yesterday many of us worked on one of our most pressing needs as a school – the development of "formative assessments." Over the past few years research has shown the value of "formative assessments" in improving students' performance and learning. Many people who study schools believe that these types of assessment (where that goal of the assessment is to measure students on their learning and not to evaluate or rate their work) is a very powerful tool to guide instruction and keep our focus on not simply what we are teaching but more significantly on what the students are in fact learning. Yesterday we made great strides in that task and we will be giving our first assessment in the next few weeks.

I have found that the meetings that I have had with parents to discuss the academic direction of our school and the success of their children in school has helped me think about how our school could be better. This summer Prue and I in our communications with you consistently stated that we wanted to make sure this South Shore Charter was a school of collaboration between parents and teachers. I urge you to call me and set up a meeting.


