### Honoring Excellence

Last Friday was a very special day at SSCPS: we inducted seven new members into the National Honor Society and recognized Level IV and High School students for their academic achievements. At their respective town meetings, almost 50% of the Level IV and High School students were recognized for making either the regular or high honor roll. This is a first for SSCPS. As you know, last spring the school administration and School Council recommended that the passing grade for Level III, IV and the high school be raised from 60 to 70. While the faculty and staff knew that we were doing the right thing for our students by making this change, we did not know how what the first quarter grades would be with the new requirement. Kudos to all of the students for their hard work and thank you parents for your encouragement and guidance of your sons and daughters. The three legged stool at work!

In addition to announcing the honor roll, we had the Induction Ceremony into the National Honor Society for this year. As I stated in my remarks to the inductees and the student body, "this Induction Ceremony is one of the most important events at SSCPS because membership is truly an honor and an achievement. Members are selected by the faculty committee based not only upon their outstanding scholarship, but also on their character, leadership, and service to the school and larger community." Kathy Campbell, Honor Society advisor, coordinated and hosted this special event. ### Monitoring, Measuring and Assessing Student Progress

Over the past several weeks, teachers in Levels II, III, IV, and the high school have been working together to develop formative assessments in English and math. We devoted much of the November 4 professional development day as well as some time during Level meetings for our teachers to learn more about formative assessments and then work together to design the first of four quarterly assessments. Before we wrote the tests, all of the staff reviewed three articles on the purpose of formative assessment. There are two major types of assessments used in schools today, summative and formative. As a staff, we used the following definitions: "Summative Assessments are given periodically to determine at a particular point in time what students know and do not know. The key is to think of summative assessment is part of the instructional process. When incorporated into classroom practice, it provides the information needed to adjust teaching and learning while they are happening. In this sense, formative assessment informs both teachers and students about student understanding at a point when timely adjustments can be made. These adjustments help to ensure that students achieve targeted standards-based learning goals within a set time frame. …"

This Monday, students in grades five through ten took English and math formative assessment tests designed by our teachers. The test questions were based upon the material that the students have been studying this fall and the test design mirrored the MCAS – multiple choice and open response questions. Over the next few days, teachers will discuss the test results with their students and conference with them. Equally as important, the teachers and Level Coordinators will use the test results to make decisions about what topics and skills they need to emphasize more (or less) this marking period and identify which students may need additional instruction and support to succeed. While the teachers will be "scoring" the results and the information from the assessments will be used to track individual and whole group progress throughout the year, teachers will be discussing the importance of formative assessments, why so many schools use them, and why we believe that, in the long run, these assessments will help our students perform better on the MCAS tests at the 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter Coffee Hours.

#### K-6 PRINCIPAL REPORT

Later this evening I will get on a plane and fly to California to attend and speak at the 20<sup>th</sup> Annual Core Knowledge Conference. One week ago I was on a beach in Scituate gathering seaweed with a group of second graders from Elise Lovejoy's Garden Project. We were gathering the seaweed to put on the students' garden at Holly Hill Farm. We gathered two pick-up trucks of seaweed. The adults did lift the barrels into the trucks but nearly every bit of the gathered seaweed that filled those two trucks was picked up by seven and eight year old students. It was a glorious day of work and accomplishment.

Many people from the outside have not understood how the ideas in the preceding paragraph go together, but at South Shore they fit perfectly. Those of us who send our children here and teach here understand the connection of Core Knowledge with Projects because we have experienced the power of both. It is only from a narrow view or categorization of their pedagogical/ideological positions that they seem to be polar opposites, Core Knowledge as very traditional and projects as progressive. I would like to describe why I see these to two elements of our school as seamless. Both the project based model and the Core Knowledge model strive to teach students about the world. Both are attempts to engage students in the world that is; attempts to teach children to know the world and to love the world. At SSCPS we do not attempt to protect children from and shield them from work and toil or the realities of life. Both ideas of education, when successful, contextualize learning so that children feel empowered and important. Core Knowledge is a connected series of narratives that explains the world to children. From the start in Kindergarten we teach students about the realities of life, whether that reality is how milk comes from a cow, or that when Columbus came to these shores it was not all good. These stories are told in ways that make moral and ethical choices a part of the narrative. They are also told as connected stories because it is through stories and connection that we remember. The joy begins in the relationships between the students and the caring but it is also the inherent interest of what we are teaching that makes school fun.

In closing I want to tell a small story about the lunch I had a week ago after gathering seaweed with Elise Lovejoy's students. Bill Tramontana, the second graders and I were sitting in an area protected from the wind under olive trees when my father in law Ben Lacy walked by. The students had helped Ben by bringing seaweed to Ben's garden. He came by to thank us for our work. After he left, I told the students that Ben was 82 years old, though he looks far younger because of his exceptional health. Soon the conversation among us turned to death and people the students had known who had died. The children were earnest, respectful and eager to learn from each other. We talked in stillness and mutual interest for about twenty minutes. To me the value of the project model became manifest by that conversation and was highlighted when a boy who had worked with diligence and energy said how sad he was for his father because he had lost his father when he was a young boy. We want our children to appreciate the world, each other and their own effort and accomplishment and on this day we certainly did all three. *Ted Hirsch - (781) 982-*


