A great opportunity to get to know Jim better is next Tuesday's **Level IV and High School Quarterly Coffee Hour**. The **December 9**th coffee hour will begin at 8:30 a.m. Please come and join the Level Coordinators, Jo Feldman, Jim, and me for some lively discussion next Tuesday morning.

K-6 PRINCIPAL REPORT

December is upon us and the days are shortening and the night is lengthening. We have a new President and now I am so pleased to have a new partner here at school, Dr. Jim Connolly who is our 7 - 12 Principal. Dr. Connolly brings to us years of worldly and school experience and I am sure that in the course of time he will help us make this school not only the wonderful school that it is but the school of our visions.

Two weeks ago I was off to the Core Knowledge Annual Conference and I heard one thing that many of us have always known but is of great importance to a school – that is the importance of stories and story structure. At the conference I went to hear a presentation by cognitive psychologist, Dan Willingham titled, "Why Don't Students Like School More?" One of the disappointing things about education reform is how little schools have been influenced by break throughs in cognitive psychology. The field of cognitive psychology now knows a great deal about how we learn and how we might teach more effectively. Dr. Willingham is a rare exception because he is a cognitive psychologist who has entered the fray of education reform. His message at this presentation to the teachers and administrators was why humans tend to dislike academic situations. He distills the situation into the following list:

- a. We (humans) are good at vision and movement.
- b. In contrast to these functions, thinking is unreliable, slow and effortful.
- c. Given the opportunity we will usually avoid thought.
- d. Instead of thinking we rely on memory.
- e. But this is not the whole story because sometimes we do like to think.

Dr. Willingham suggested ways to increase the times that learning and thinking can be pleasurable to people. His idea is to present learning in ways that make the solution or the learning solve problems, or to present learning in the same way that a story is traditional presented with characters, problems and solutions. We as a school have much to learn from Dr. Willingham but we are a place where students, for the most part, want to be. Most of our students do like school.

Part of the reason that this is such a wonderful place is that we are often in that *sometimes* position, *where we do like to think*. Yesterday I was taking a teacher from another school on a tour of our school. The goal of her visit was to learn more about us so she could tell parents who were thinking of applying here about us. While on that tour I saw a Level III student who was in tears because her mother was picking her up early and she had to leave in the middle of "Project." The mother promised her daughter that she would do her best to never pick her up early again. I was proud to see this love of school and the visitor and I took the opportunity to see what the girl was missing. We went into Dan Falkner's Drama Project where they were rehearsing a scene that was written by the students and contained two songs. The group was being led by one of our fabulous music teacher Lucille Butler. The students took the opportunity to perform for us as we represented

a live audience. There were two things that I noticed while the students did their run through. The first was just how expressive they were, their personalities shown through in their every word and gesture. The second was how clear Lucille was as a teacher. Twice during the performance, Lucille stopped to work with the students on their attention and focus. Both times she stopped them, the students understood what was wrong and quickly corrected their work. I thought how that is wonderful communication and that it was thinking and learning in action. Lucille and Dan had created a situation where thinking and learning made purpose for the students; it was something the students liked.

These students and many others will be performing in the upcoming Winter Concert at 6:00 in Hingham High School on December 17. Please come and please stay for the whole show. Please put it on your calendars and I look forward to seeing you there.

7-12 PRINCIPAL REPORT

In my new position as 7 - 12 Principal at SSCPS, I am pleased to write my first piece for the Update. This has been a very busy week for me, as I work to understand the machinations of our school. One thing is very clear, SSCPS is no ordinary school.

My previous experiences were in traditional public school settings, where my focus was to engage a school community in working to bring about changes to improve learning experiences for all students. As I study the philosophy behind SSCPS and look at the programs and structures that exist here, I am struck by how close this school mirrors the school I was working to create in the traditional public schools in which I worked. At my previous school, I formed a committee, the Future Directions Committee, and charged them with brainstorming on ways our school should look in five years in order to better prepare students for the 21st Century.

This standing committee was open to everyone. Students, parents, teachers, administrators, and citizens from the community at large met weekly for two years to study research and develop proposals. The committee designed seven proposals for the school: an advisory program, a personal education plan for each child, divisions (two grades per division), a demonstration of mastery requirement, senior projects, internships and mentorships, and improved school, parent, and community relations. After two years of work, we had put in place two of the proposals and had plans for two more. I am pleased to see that variations of these seven proposals exist at SSCPS now, and the school offers so much more.

From the eyes of an educator new to SSCPS, I can attest to the uniqueness of this school. All of us, students, parents, and educators, have a responsibility to act as caretakers of our school in order to nurture and ensure the continued growth of this special educational institution.

As we work to prepare students for this rapidly changing world that requires, among many skills and abilities, that individuals are able to think creatively, work collaboratively, and use technology to find solutions to complex problems, it is clear that schools must change. SSCPS is a very different school, because, since its founding in 1995, it has attracted students, parents, and educators who understand this need for change. I am very excited to be part of the SSCPS extended family, and I look forward to working with all of you.
