## E.D. Hirsch, Jr. presentation on Core Academic Knowledge

Last evening, Ted, Jim Connolly, and Jo Loughnane, Board of Trustees member and one of SSCPS's founders, and I attended a special two hour forum in Boston sponsored by The Center for School Reform at the Pioneer Institute, the Program on Education Policy and Governance at Harvard University, and MassInc. The program included brief remarks from former State Senate President Tom Birmingham and a panel of educators that included former Board of Education Chair, James Peyser, and Sandra Stotsky, current member of the Board of Education. The highlight of the evening and keynote speaker was Ted’s Dad, E. D. Hirsch, Jr. In his remarks, Dr. Hirsch commended Massachusetts' for its high standards and content rich curriculum frameworks. He pointed out that our students have consistently ranked in the top three in reading, mathematics and science on national tests such as the NAEP (National Assessment of Educational Progress) and TIMSS (Trends in International Math and Science Study).international tests. Dr. Hirsch attributed much of Massachusetts’ success to having developed standards-based state-wide frameworks and assessments (MCAS) that test students on their knowledge of those content standards. It was wonderful to hear Ted's Dad speak again on a topic that he is so passionate about--the importance of core academic knowledge.

## Ipods, Nintendo DS Devices, Play Station Portables (PSPs)

The proliferation of electronic devices such as Ipods, DS, MP3 players, and PSPs is becoming a problem and a distraction at school. Teachers and Level Coordinators are concerned that more and more of their time in Levels III, IV and the High School is being taken up with dealing with issues relating to these devices. Today, a staff member asked me if I could alert parents about this problem and make a request that the students leave them at home. We would really appreciate it if you would have your son or daughter leave these entertainment devices at home. Unfortunately, if the problem continues, we may have to recommend a complete ban on all of these devices at the next School Council meeting. Last week, Claire Overlee, Level III Coordinator, and Angie Pepin, Level IV Coordinator, attended a MARC Conference on Cyber bullying last week. They both were so troubled by what they learned about the problem in this state and across the country that they are working on a program for all Level III and Level IV parents on Cyberbullying and other issues pertaining to electronic devices. The evening program will be in mid-January. Look for the date and more details in the January $7{ }^{\text {th }}$ Update.

## 7-12 PRINCIPAL REPORT

Last Wednesday afternoon Level IV and high school faculty met with Jerry Morris for the final Writing Across the Curriculum training session. Jerry has been working with all teachers at SSCPS this year training staff on the five types of writing outlined in the Collin's writing program. Type One writing is used to get students to think and put their ideas on paper; type two writing is used to check for understanding; type three writing employs focus correction areas (FACs) to develop specific content knowledge and specific writing skills; type four writing uses peer editing for correcting writing; and, type five writing requires students to produce quality writing, writing that is publishable and can go outside the classroom without explanation or qualification. Through three formal presentations and numerous classroom visits, where Jerry modeled writing lessons for students and teachers, all teachers have been taught how to use these types of writing assignments in their class instruction.

By adopting a writing program $\mathrm{K}-12$, faculty and staff at SSCPS now have shared guidelines to aid all our students in improving writing skills. All teachers will use writing assignments in their classes to help students to develop clarity in their thinking and communicate efficiently and effectively.
Tuesday, December 23 is an early dismissal day at SSCPS. Besides a shortened day, high school students, faculty, and staff will experience a changed schedule, as we rotate through a morning of health awareness workshops. Five workshops will be available. The workshops will be on AIDS Awareness, Nutrition Awareness, Harassment, Stress Management, and Net-Etiquette. Students will choose four from the five workshops to attend.
