## K-6 Principal Report

Schools are inherently complex organizations. The complexity/difficulty of the basic task of becoming an educated adult is acknowledged by our understanding that it typically takes thirteen years to graduate from high school and to be ready for independence. There are so many things to learn. Most of them are best taught directly but some others are best taught obliquely. Over time our school has built itself on the notion that a combination of classroom instruction and purpose filled Project and Workshop work help our students and the school meet the goals of both individual and institutional citizenship. We have benefited from the guidance and feedback that we have gotten from students, families and professional educators over our founding years. Like a student in their Sophomore year of collage we are just about grown up. The typical goal of American schools is to produce "life long learners" and we are now entering a new phase of our institutional life, a mature school. As a maturing institution we too need to be 'life long learners,' never being complacent and always coming up with ways by which we can be better, and doing that while taking pride in our students, teachers and families and our accomplishments.

We as an institution have learned so much over the course of fifteen years. Over the past three school years we have been led by Prue Goodale and during that time the school has been remarkably focused and driven to improve teaching and learning. Prue's determined, experienced and unwavering leadership has made these three years exceptional. Tonight the Executive Director Search Committee will be meeting. The purpose of this meeting is to review the feedback that the various constituent groups have made on what the school should be looking for in Prue's successor. We will also begin the process of reviewing the more than seventy applications for the Executive Director position. Those seventy applications are just another piece of evidence that as Prue says, the word is out-we are an exceptional school.

As we mature one thing that we will need to do is to continue to give each other encouragement and feedback. This school was founded by adults who wanted a vibrant educational experience for their children. Feedback will help us evaluate our progress, as an institution, in meeting our goal of "inspiring every student to excel in academics, service and life?" One way we achieve this goals is to try to listen. These past weeks we have had morning coffees where we met with families and gathered feedback on how we are doing. These forums are very important and influence our thinking about how the school should evolve and develop. There are still three more meetings and we very much hope that you can come.

## School Report - Prue Goodale

## Special Report - Mr J ackie Poteau: Update on Crisis in Haiti

Jackie delivered a presentation that provided a general overview of Haiti, its location and population, and the terrible destruction incurred by the earthquake in January. Jackie also described FATEM, an organization that provides support to the city of Mirebalais, which is located approximately one hour from Port-au- Prince. FATEM primarily supports education and technology programs, with the overall objective of improving general economic development of the region. It is partnering with several other organizations in these efforts, including DePaul University through which a teacher training program is underway. ## Update on Executive Director Search

Paul Carberry and Deb Cerilli provided an update on the search for a new executive director. The search committee is chaired by Bob Gass and includes several parents, faculty and staff.
