## Marilee Cantelmo

A graduate of Mankato State University in Minnesota, Marilee has a Master of Science degree from Lesley University. She has also taken a number of courses at the Harvard Graduate School of Education. Her administrative experience includes principal of the Joseph Osgood Elementary School in Cohasset, Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum, Assessment and Professional Development for the Whitman Hanson Regional School District, and K-12 Director of Curriculum for Foxborough Regional Charter School. Ms. Cantelmo is currently an educational consultant.

## Sonia Diaz

A graduate of Kent State University in Ohio, Sonia has a Master of Arts degree from the University of Pennsylvania, a Master of Education degree from Harvard University, and a Doctor of Education degree from Harvard University. Her administrative experience includes Deputy Superintendent of Schools in Miami/Dade Florida, Superintendent of Schools in Bridgeport, Connecticut, Superintendent for Community School District One, in New York City, and Chief Academic Office for Baltimore County Public Schools. Dr. Diaz is currently the Executive Vice President for Curriculum and Assessment, The Center for Educational Leadership and Technology.

## 7-12 PRINCIPAL REPORT

The incredible accomplishment of Sarah Roberts, Bill Tramontana, and their students go far beyond the possibility of winning a hybrid bus in the America's Greenest School contest. All around the school I see students, teachers, staff, and parents excited about the recognition that our school is receiving and geared up to spread the word about SSCPS. The contest has brought our K-12 community together in the effort to win. Each morning Sarah has attended High School morning meeting, both to praise student efforts and to encourage them to continue to use their vast social networks to get the word out. Her continued recognition has helped them see how their efforts are paying off in more votes and an increased prospect of winning. Students across the school have made posters, made phone calls, and used to internet to solicit more votes. Mark Flanagan, our facilities manager, ended our day on Tuesday with a pep talk over the PA system encouraging everyone to continue in their efforts. Everyone is involved. While at times we struggle with the complexity of being a K-12 school, this contest has helped us see the many benefits of working together and strengthened our internal connections.

Millions turned off lights and appliances for an hour on Saturday, March 27th in a gesture to highlight environmental concerns and to call for a binding pact to cut greenhouse gas emissions. This year's was the
fourth annual Earth Hour, organized by the World Wildlife Fund. SSCPS students in the Biology Research Workshop at the High School and in the Conservation Project on Level IV wanted an opportunity to recognize the event at school. Students suggested activities that participating classes could engage in during an hour in the dark without computers or appliances at the end of the day Friday. Many students in grades 312 had the opportunity to participate. Level II students paired with High School students to participate in a "green" scavenger hunt. Our third and fourth graders got to know some of our high school students as they worked toward a common goal. One high school student approached me following the event looking for more opportunities to work with the younger students. This is yet another example of cooperation among levels furthering the education of our students.

## Chair

- The Chair will have previously held a PA office or have attended a majority of the year's regular PA meetings.
- The Chair will plan the agenda and chair PA meetings.
- The Chair will have monthly meetings with the Executive Director to coordinate some of the PA activities and initiatives
- The Chair will write a monthly report to the parents to be submitted to the Update (the official SSCPS communication vehicle) at the end of each month.
- The Chair will coordinate all PA committee activities.
- The Chair is the official spokesperson for the PA and as such will make reports to the SSCPS Board of Trustees.
- The Chair will write a year-end report in May and submit it to the incoming Chairperson.

Vice Chair (VC)

- The VC will assist the Chair with meeting organization and appointment of chairs.
- The VC will write a year-end report in May and submit it to the incoming VCs.
- The VC will preside at meetings in the absence of the Chair or if the Chair decides to participate in discussion as a parent only.


## Secretary

- The Secretary will take minutes of the meetings (to be approved at the subsequent meeting), post minutes, post meeting times, and reminders to the Executive Directors office for posting in the SSCPS Update.
- The Secretary will write a year-end report in May and submit it to the incoming Secretary.
- The Secretary will help the Chair write the monthly reports.

Treasurer

- The Treasurer will keep the books of the PA and make monthly reports to the PA.
- The Treasurer will write a year-end report in May and submit it to the incoming Treasurer.
- The Treasurer will assemble and Chair the PA Grant Task Force for the purpose of disbursing PA Funds.

Arts \& Music Committee
Acts as an advocate for all of the Arts in the school curriculum: drama, literature, music and visual arts. Sets up visiting artist schedules, art-related field trips, and works to find grants to fund arts in the school.

## Community Service Committee

Establishes and maintains ties between SSCPS and various community groups, with the purpose of guiding our students towards opportunities for fulfilling their community service requirements. Looks for grants to fund community service programs.

## Fundraising \& Events Committee

Organizes the parent fundraising activities and social events at the school. Each event may have a separate leader to orchestrate activities.

## Health \& Safety Committee

Guides the development of the health curriculum, safety policies and relations with various medical centers, adherence to related health laws, anti-smoking programs, drug prevention programs, medical policies and procedures.

## Library Committee

The Library Committee participates in all aspects of maintaining the school's library including ongoing management of the library collection, fundraising to acquire new materials, writing grants, supporting students and teachers in their use of the library, and participating in the creation of an expanded library/media center. The goals for this school year are to update the current collection using a new computerized cataloging system and to partner with community libraries to introduce library skills to our students.
Volunteer Coordinator
The Volunteer Coordinator aids parents in the completion of volunteer requirements and assists Level Coordinators in filling their volunteer and chaperone needs.

## Welcoming \& Events Committee

Contacts families of new, incoming SSCPS students, to welcome them into the school community, and to provide them with information about the school and the Parents Association.

## Grade Representatives

Communicates with the Level Coordinators and provides report to the PA at the monthly meetings.

## Approval of Minutes

The minutes from the February meeting were approved.

## School Report - Prue Goodale

Prue reported on several topics.
School lunch pilot program: The two-month trial period for DoorKnock Dinners has now ended. A second potential vendor has been identified and a trial period will be initiated starting in April. This vendor is a non-profit foundation and lunch prices will be significantly less than DoorKnock Dinners. A variety of lunches, including hot meals, will be provided. This vendor hires special needs adults to help with food preparation and has worked with other charter schools.
It was suggested by a parent that the school solicit feedback on DoorKnock Dinners soon, while parents' impressions are still fresh in the mind. The Nutrition Project at school has surveyed students. Some general impressions of DoorKnock Dinners were offered and included: more food appeared to go wasted, especially on the lower levels; some older students found the portions too small; some meals were not significantly healthier than those provided by the current lunch vendor (eg, breads used in the sandwiches). Prue stated that the goal is to have a final decision on the lunch vendor by the end of the school year.

School Budget for 2010-2011: Budgeting activities are well underway. A preliminary budget will be presented to the Board of Trustees (BOT) at the April meeting. There is some uncertainty as to whether and/or how much local aid may be cut at the State level.

Admissions Lottery: The annual admissions lottery was held on February $13^{\text {th }}$. There were a total of 423 applications received. Of the 40 students entering the kindergarten class in the Fall, 32 are siblings of current students. There were five vacancies at other grade levels filled by the lottery.

Heritage Day: On Thursday, May $6^{\text {th }}$ (an early release day) the school will host a Heritage Day The event is being led by the high school Spanish teachers. Students at all levels will be invited to share their heritage with others in the form of food, dance and other cultural representations.

## School Report - Angie Pepin

The student Ski Trip will take place on Friday. On Thursday, the students are hosting a Health and Fitness Day for Level IV students. There will be fun and healthy activities/sports and healthy snacks to educate and encourage students to adopt healthy habits.
During the professional development day next week (Friday, March 12), the staff will be working on formative assessments of all students.

## School Report - Ted Hirsch

Ted was delayed due to another commitment and did not provide a formal report.

## School Report - Jackie Perry

Jackie reported that the high school will be holding a Day of the Arts. This will include art and poetry expressions, among other things. It will be a community building day. The Social \& Political Action workshop is sponsoring the event.

## Committee Reports

## Fundraising:

Maureen Hebert announced that the Auction Committee has a new ticket option for those who wish to attend the Auction but are unable to join for the dinner. The "Fashionably Late" option will allow attendees to purchase an admission ticket for $\$ 15$ ( $\$ 20$ after the early bird deadline) and to join after 6:30 pm for drinks, dessert and auction bidding. There are plans to extend the entertainment after the bidding concludes, for a fun and memorable year-end celebration for all.

Maureen also announced that the first 100 registrants will receive a free gift. So book your tickets soon!

## Welcoming (Kerry Griffin):

The Welcoming Committee is organizing several upcoming events:
The annual Level I \& II social will be held at the school on Saturday, March $20^{\text {th }}$ from $3-5 \mathrm{pm}$. Peanut-free snacks are requested.
Karaoke Night is scheduled for Friday, April ${ }^{\text {th }}$ starting at 7 pm at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Rockland. The school was given a small grant that will be used to defer some of the costs of the food (prepared by KT Leary and Kerry). There will also be a "Charter Chili Championship" held in conjunction with the event. For those who fancy foods other than chili, donations of appetizers and desserts will also be appreciated. Tickets may be purchased for $\$ 5$ per person; proceeds will go towards supporting our school-wide community service efforts in assisting Troops abroad and also the relief efforts in Haiti.

## SEPAC:

There was no formal SEPAC report. Bev Bruce reported that a community-wide International Night was held for Title I students at St. Mary's church in Randolph. The event included special dishes from lands far and wide and also an international fashion show. Special thanks to Michele Moise, parent liaison, who helped organize this event.

## Library (Beth Toma):

No report.
Deidre Lamoureux announced that it is time to start planning for next year's Parent Association elections. Anyone interested in learning more about holding an office or serving as a committee chair or grade representative, please contact Deidre or the individual currently holding the post.

## Grade Representative Reports

In order to allow adequate time for review of the budget proposal, grade representative reports were omitted.
It was noted that the $8^{\text {th }}$ graders are excited about their trip to New York City. They are serving healthy breakfast foods through the end of March, to help raise funds for this trip.

## Treasurer's Report (Elissa Dennis)

The disbursement requests were reviewed by a volunteer team that included Ted and Angie for part (but not all) of the discussions. The final list of proposals for spending was distributed at the meeting and discussed.

One rejected proposal that generated high interest was the Lego Robotics project. Ted indicated that it's possible the school could move this forward, even in the absence of PA funding.

Prue mentioned that they are building extended day expenses into the school budget. The goal is to offer more programs, with modest fees.

There was discussion regarding funding for the publication of the school directory. Several parents expressed that this directory is a very valuable tool, especially as we are a regional school with families spread across so many towns. The 2009-2010 directory was printed and sold for a small fee, and there were quite a number of extra copies - suggesting that perhaps the demand is not so high, or that the fee was cost-prohibitive. It was agreed that given
that two-thirds of the school year has now passed, the school will plan to issue another directory for the 2010-2011 academic year, and will aim to publish it as quickly as possible after the start of the year.

The proposals were accepted, and the disbursement package will be voted on at next month's meeting.

## Old Business / New Business

A question was raised regarding the 'bubble' (increase in student numbers) that Level II will experience next year. Ted stated that there are plans to hire an additional teacher to work with small groups of children, but not to create an additional classroom.

In conjunction with the roof replacement project, the school is working with an architect to consider other improvements/changes to building to accommodate the shifts in student/grade populations that the future will bring. As with Level II, the high school class size is growing and the school needs to optimize the layout of the building to support classroom space needs. Creative ways to best utilize the space we have are being explored. In the future, the school may also consider offering 'virtual' high school, with online offerings.

There was extensive discussion on bullying at the school. A parent whose child has experienced bullying at the school suggested the school consider a Hazelton-based training program for students and staff. Another parent suggested that particular program may not be worthwhile, given its high cost. Bullying programs have been conducted at the school in the past, both for parents and for staff. Other options exist. The Lunch Buddies program at school has been well-received by many families and this was suggested as a possible tool to help with any bullying situations. Several suggestions were put forth, including utilizing the high school students as peer support for the younger students. It was also suggested that a task force be established to address this topic. One parent suggested a guest speaker from Restorative Justice and agreed to help arrange for that. The school's code of conduct covers bullying. It was suggested that the school develop a better policy on bullying.

A motion was made and approved to allow the above discussion to continue beyond the scheduled meeting closure time.
