



## Safety and Security

Last year the members of the school's Crisis Team discussed the need for us to have a practice lock down drill. As you all know, it was a busy and eventful year and the plan to do the drill in the spring was moved to the fall. Like so many schools, we periodically conduct fire drills so that everyone knows what to do in the event there is a real fire in our building. The lock down drill is sometimes referred to as a critical incident drill and it prepares our staff and students for an emergency in the building that would require us to "lock down" the building by securing all classrooms and offices. Just about every public and private school in the area schedules at least one lock down drill a year with their local police department.

To prepare for the practice drill, we contacted the Norwell Fire Department and asked them to help us plan the drill. In addition, members of the Crisis Team contacted other schools in the area and obtained helpful printed information/tips on lock downs. On our September early release day, the faculty practiced the drill without students. Early next week, our students will receive instructions and training from their teachers before we conduct an actual drill. Once we are confident that everyone understands their roles and how they should respond during a real emergency, we will conduct the simulated "lock down" drill in conjunction with the Norwell Police Department. At this time, we anticipate conducting the drill sometime in October.

We need your assistance in order to get the maximum benefit from the drill. It is extremely important that students take the drill SERIOUSLY and follow all directions during the drill. Students should not use cell phones to make calls or to text message during the drill (Note: they should not have cell phones on their person during the school day per the Student Handbook). In a real emergency, cell phone use can actually hamper rescue efforts because they can rapidly overload police response lines. Parents responding to cell phone messages can cause traffic problems and prevent emergency vehicles from entering or leaving a school. Students can also use text messaging and calls to spread inaccurate information and/or rumors that make it more difficult for police and fire personnel to respond to an emergency situation.

How can you help? We need you to tell your student(s) to take this drill seriously. Instruct them to follow directions and not to use their cell phones. No one would ever tell students that they should not take fire drills seriously. We need the same approach for the planned lock down. As a school, we always stress safety and this drill is an important safety tool that will prepare our staff and students to face any emergency that might occur in our building.

## Nutrition and School Lunch Program

Last spring, high school student Jackie Perry presented a nutrition survey that she had conducted to our Board of Trustees. As one might expect, the survey results indicated that the eating habits of many of our students were not healthy. At the same time, a group of parents approached SSCPS Business Director Kristine Shipps to discuss the school's lunch program and ways in which it might be improved. In this week's Update, we have a link to a **web-based lunch survey** that we would like all parents to take. The link to the survey is also posted on our website, <u>www.sscps.org</u>. This Update's focus on safety and security and the lunch program replaces this week's Spotlight. Next week's Spotlight will focus on the prevalence of caffeinated and high sugar beverages in our school and their impact on the health and well being of young adults.

## K-6 PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Last week I was fortunate enough to attend a Level II Special Meeting where the students delivered campaign speeches for Level President, Vice President and two Treasurers. More than half of the students ran for office. Of those students more ran for President than for any other office. In our renewal work the Accountability Committee came up with a new Mission statement for our upcoming charter that goes "Inspiring every student to excel in Academics, service and life." What we mean by "life" in this proposed mission statement is that we want students to feel and believe that they can make a difference right now to make this a better school and a better world. The number of speeches delivered by students and the message of those speeches demonstrated to me that the message is getting through.

The candidates spoke about how they could help make the level better and that they would help kids with difficult situations. The teachers had asked that the audience hold its applause until the last speech for every position but that was not possible as the candidates spoke with such passion that the audience frequently spontaneously applauded. (I have to acknowledge that I was not much better than the students at being quiet and forgot at times to withhold my applause.) I sat with great pleasure as I listened to the students and heard their articulateness, passion, and sense of purpose. I admired the support that was coming from the group but I worried – there were only four positions and more than forty candidates and all of the forty were explaining why they would do a good job and I believed them. That meant there were going to be many, many worthy candidates who would not be selected and I thought, it is going to be painful. In an attempt to lessen their sadness I got up and spoke about how the citizen was as important as the President and how the collective wisdom of the group was what made good government and that they were all winners in this process. I may have been speaking over the level of third and fourth graders but I though they might believe me.

This week I received many beautiful and happy letters from these same third and fourth graders explaining what school is like. These were happy letters about kind and caring teachers and excitement about what they were learning. Students spoke of the love of being challenged and the glory of learning new things and making friends. Several of the letters spoke about the election. In these letters there were comments about the election; one from a child who had won, another from a candidate who had lost, and a third from a child who had voted. For at least these three children the election had done everything that we would hope.

I was also pleased because there were third graders who were running for every position and I thought back about the child many years ago, now entering the  $12^{th}$  grade, who was incensed when third graders were not allowed to run for President and he had worked to get the rules changed. In the three legged stool that is SSCPS, students are a vital force. We want to give them the message that they can, and that they have value for achievement in the here and now, in our words, that we want to be inspired to excel at life.

## Announcements

Other Announcements:

- Volunteer Coordinator, Melissa Freitas, announced several immediate volunteer opportunities, including the need for Pod Parents for Levels III & IV, assistance with making globes and with library activities in Level 1.
- Ted Hirsch announced the resignation of Level I teacher, Cindy Connolly, who will be dearly missed by all.
- Paul Carberry provided a brief overview of the Annual Fund and its importance to the school. All families will be receiving a letter and contribution envelope; donations of any amount are appreciated.

General introductions were made by all attendees.

## School Report/Prue Goodale

Prue reported that the school had a very smooth opening.

Prue shared with parents the newly revised mission statement for the school, which emphasizes academics, service and life. In support of 'service', this year Jo Feldman will serve as service coordinator. Students' service hours will be documented for their full academic career at SSCPS.

Prue shared with parents her goals for the coming year, which will focus on culture, climate and community. Efforts are ongoing to create a 'clean' school, and also a 'green' school.

The charter renewal process is underway and several important documents were prepared and submitted over the summer. As part of the charter renewal process, the department of education will be making a 4 day visit to the school and meeting with faculty, staff, students and parents.

The administration was pleased with the MCAS scores achieved this year. Individual student results are expected to be available shortly.

Prue encouraged parents to attend the hearing on proposed charter school legislation at the State House on September  $17^{th}$ .

## Principal Report/Ted Hirsch

Ted requested that parents label their children's clothing to avoid losing items. This will also help support the goal of creating a clean school.

Ted reviewed the open faculty and paraprofessional positions. Recruitment is ongoing.

## Principal Report/Jim Connolly

Jim reported that the school opening has gone smoothly.

#### Treasurer Report/Elissa Dennis

The PA has approximately \$10K in funds available to distribute the school community. Requests to fund projects, events or items/supplies are due by September 21<sup>st</sup>. Volunteers are needed to sit on a committee that will review and decide on which proposals to put forth to the PA. Proposals selected by the committee will be presented at the October PA meeting. At the November meeting, a vote will be taken. One vote will be taken for the full portfolio of projects.. Dispersal of funds will occur in December.

#### Brainstorming/Open Discussion

The floor was open for general discussion.

Heather Dans reported on the Charter School Conference she attended last Spring. Many of the talks and workshops focused on the 'how to' of starting a charter school, and grant writing to support charter schools. Heather was struck by how advanced SSCPS is compared to many of the other schools represented at the conference. Prue indicated that SSCPS intends to share its experience and make a presentation at next year's conference.

Pledge of Allegiance: a parent inquired if the school has a policy on this. There is no formal policy or requirement. Ted agreed to re-visit this topic. There have been programs in the past that introduced students to various forms of patriotic expression.

Community Service: the question was posed about community service requirements, what they are and how they are documented. Requirements and documentation will vary with the Level. In general, community service is to be performed outside of school.

After school programs: the lack of an after school program for children in grades 7 and above was noted. It was noted that the Parent Association could make a meaningful contribution by organizing some form of extracurricular activity program for these older students. If anyone has any good ideas to share or is willing to organize a program, please contact Maureen Hebert, Kim Engle or Gema Gray.
