FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Thank you, Dr. Connolly

Although Dr. Connolly will be with us until December 1st and there will be plenty of time to say goodbye and wish him well, I wanted to take this opportunity to acknowledge and thank him for all that he has accomplished in such a short span of time as SSCPS's 7-12 principal. Few principals in their entire career experience as many incidents, unexpected developments, Department of Elementary and Secondary Education visits, and major report submissions. Dr. Connolly had to deal with serious student and staff situations and, at the same time, prepare and submit a reduced budget for grades 7-12 for FY10 by late February. As a result, he had to make difficult staffing decisions after being "on board" for only a few months. Many people refer to the high school as the flag ship of a school system. Although we are a K-12 school, most of the unexpected issues that happened last year involved grades 7-12. When Dr. Connolly took over the 7-12 "ship," there were serious storm clouds on the horizon and he had little time to settle in and really get to know our school. Even when we all thought that everything was back to "normal," another unexpected situation would occur. So much of what an administrator does is done behind the scenes and with little fan fare. When serious situations arise, administrators cannot go into extensive detail about them and how they were handled due to confidentiality and legal issues. Suffice it to say, we got through all of those storms and we have Dr. Connolly to thank for much of this. As Dr. Connolly wrote in the recent update, the most difficult part of his job this past year has been the fact that his wife and two teenage boys were living in western Massachusetts. He would be away from home from Monday through Friday. Over the summer, we talked about how difficult the separation had been for him and his family. I respect him for his decision to move on and for putting family first. On behalf of all of us at SSCPS. I thank him for what he has done over the past nine months to help us move forward as a school.

Announcement of Interim 7-12 Principal

I am pleased to announce that on December 1st, SSCPS's Interim 7-12 principal will be Angie Pepin. Angie is well known to our entire school community – she has been a member of the SSCPS faculty for six years and has taught in Level III and Level IV. Before coming to SSCPS, Angie was part of the *Teach for America* program and taught in New York City. For the past two years, in addition to her teaching responsibilities, Angie has been the Level IV Coordinator. From 2005-2009, Angie, along with Level III teacher Dan Falkner, served as a faculty representative to the Board of Trustees. In her "spare" time, Angie has been enrolled in Bridgewater State College's Certificate of Advanced Graduate Studies program in Educational Leadership. By the end of the summer, Angie will have completed all of the requirements for this degree! As part of her program, Angie has been conducting a study focusing on teaching diverse populations. Our teachers participated in the study along with teachers from 7 other schools on the South Shore. We are all looking forward to reading the results of the survey and her research.

When Angie is awarded her degree in the summer, she will also be certified as a secondary principal. A master teacher, Angie has done a fine job helping us to fulfill our mission of "inspiring every student (that she has taught) to excel in academics, service, and life." She truly loves learning and investigating new approaches and methods of teaching and administrating. Two years ago she represented SSCPS at one of the first Charter School Study Tours and she shared many of the promising practices that she observed at Roxbury Prep Charter School with us when she returned. Last fall, she and Ted Hirsch presented what they had learned from the tour at the Charter School Conference in Worcester. This past spring, Angie accompanied Ted Hirsch and Dr. Connolly on a second Study Tour, visiting Boston Collegiate Charter School to learn more about their successful model of supervising teachers and providing them with timely feedback and support and guidance. In June, Angie was a member of the five person team representing SSCPS at the National Charter School Conference in Washington, D.C. Again, Angie returned with lots of ideas to share with us and a recommendation that we will act upon: SSCPS should submit a proposal to present at the next conference which will be in Chicago in June 2010. We will submit at least one proposal and I am certain that we will be accepted!

I hope that all of you are as excited about Angie moving into the Interim 7-12 Principal position as I am. I know that all members of the faculty and administration will do everything that they can to support Angie as she takes on this new role and to ensure a smooth transition for her and her students. Over the next few weeks, we will be interviewing candidates to fill Angie's teaching position. Rest assured that Angie will be chairing the interview committee and she will make certain that her "replacement" has the "right stuff" to challenge and engage her students. In addition to overseeing the selection process for the new Level IV history teacher, Angie discussed with me her interest in continuing as the Level IV Coordinator along with her new responsibilities as the 7-12 principal. We agreed that this would be doable, so Angie will continue on as the Level IV Coordinator.

SPOTLIGHT ON THE SSCPS LIBRARY - Submitted by Bev Bruce, Title I Reading Specialist

"A school without a library is like a body without a soul." -Cicero-

Following the school's move from A Street in Hull to our current location, this quote hung outside the room storing our boxed-up library collection as an inspiration to begin to rebuild the library in our new setting. Although the school now has a working K-8 library filled floor-to-ceiling with books, Cicero's words continue to define the mission of the Library Committee. The committee, which is an arm of the Parents Association comprised of both parents and teachers, is committed to creating and maintaining a space that reflects the pulse and culture of SSCPS as well as our school's commitment to literacy. Our vision was to create a collection of books and other materials that begged to be picked up, read, and enjoyed.

Building on the previous work done by Level I coordinator Velma Begley and her Library Committee at A Street, the newly formed committee set to work unpacking, culling out tired and tattered books, stamping, affixing barcodes, covering, and labeling hundreds of books. Executive Director Prue Goodale dedicated a space behind Level I to house the K-8 collection, and the library held its grand opening in the fall of 2008. Now each week, teachers in Levels I-III bring their students for a library visit with parent volunteers assisting in checking out and reshelving books; and Level 4 students and teachers visit during their project time or in small groups. It is indeed a place that is alive with energy!

Our library collection continues to grow. We have received donations from the Tori Wightman Foundation, SSCPS staff and families, author Marc Brown, and local town libraries. Profits from the annual fall Book Fair sponsored by the Library Committee are used to update the collection. The library recently acquired biographies on influential people such as Rosa Parks, Gandhi, President Barack Obama, the late Senator

Edward Kennedy, John Lennon, Cesar Chavez, and Marion Anderson as well as popular fiction chapter books for younger readers (such as <u>Diary of a Wimpy Kid</u>) and fiction series for our older students (such as <u>Warriors</u> and <u>Twilight</u>). The work of the committee continues in new areas, with our current challenge being the development of an automated cataloging system to manage the flow of books in and out of the library.

The Library Committee will host the **Fall Book Fair on Thursday and Friday November 5**th **and 6**th, and we are pleased to again partner with independent bookstore **Storybook Cove** in Norwell. Their bookseller works with our staff to tailor the selections and offer SSCPS families a wide range of high quality books and the latest "new reads" for children and young adults. This Book Fair combined with the Scholastic Book drives offered by each level throughout the school year give families many ways to discover new books and encourage their child's reading outside of school.

Some things you can do to promote your child's literacy and support the work of the library:

- 1) Dedicate a quiet time each night for 15-20 minutes of reading with your children.
- 2) Bring your family to the **K-6 Literacy Night on Thursday November 5th from 6-7 pm** (guest readers will share stories with our children...more news to come!)
- 3) Begin your holiday shopping at the upcoming **Book Fair- November 5**th and **6**th. The fair will be open during the day and in the evening of Literacy Night.
- 4) Donate new or lightly used books for the library (see weekly 'Update' for specific titles needed).
- 5) Volunteer to read to students in classrooms or the library. Contact your level coordinator or Beth Toma, Library Chairperson (<u>jtoma85103@aol.com</u>).
- 6) Eat. Sleep. Read.

7-12 Principal's Report

We are in the midst of a very busy week at SSCPS, busier than our typical, normal busy week. We are hosting a team from Class Measures, a company contracted by the state to conduct our renewal site visit. Months of work were involved in the renewal application, and this week a team is here to report whether we do what we say we do, and, if we do what we say we do, how well do we do it.

Along with the renewal site visit this week we have begun our first round of formative assessments for the school year. There is general consensus in the school community that some of the credit for our greatly improved MCAS scores this past year is tied to our work with formative assessments. The assessments offer many benefits. Among the benefits is that they give students an opportunity to practice taking MCAS-style tests. It makes sense to give students practice on the tests and to help them understand how the tests are scored. Last year students took English and math tests. This year students are taking English and math tests and students in grades 5, 8, and 9 are taking science tests. Another benefit of the formative assessments is that they help teachers determine what areas of the curriculum students have learned and what areas of the curriculum may need to be taught again. A third benefit of the assessments is that they help teachers understand individual students' strengths and weaknesses, helping us to personalize educational experiences for every student. Finally, the formative assessments give educators at SSCPS opportunities to discuss teaching and learning with their peers. Our teachers have a great deal of knowledge about teaching and learning that they can share with each other. Often professional development for educators involves bringing in outside experts or sending teachers out to attend workshops or take courses. What we sometimes overlook are all the experts that work with us on a daily basis. By creating time for teachers to meet and discuss student learning, we are creating a collaborative environment where teachers can learn from each other fellow experts who work with the same population of students and are engaged in the practice of teaching every day.

It is interesting to note that we are mired in a week of assessments. The state is here to assess whether, as a school, we fulfill our mission and deserve renewal, and we are assessing whether the knowledge, skills, and concepts we have been teaching students for the past two months are being learned. It is good practice to take time to assess the effectiveness of our work and to reflect on how we might improve our practice by redirecting our efforts. We are busy working every day at SSCPS on teaching and learning, and regularly assessing how we are doing in this work and making adjustments when needed is an extremely important part of the process of the school evolving and becoming the best school we can be.
