FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Literacy Grant

On Monday, November 9th, we received some wonderful news from the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education – we were successful with our grant application for K-12 Literacy Professional Development. There were a number of requirements and specifications for districts including partnering with another school district and a literacy provider. SSCPS again partnered with Holbrook and the reading consultancy group that will be providing us with the training is from Massachusetts General Hospital – the Hansen Initiative for Language and Literacy. Our teachers have worked with one of their consultants in the past and we received positive feedback from them. We were entitled to up to \$10,000 for the grant and Holbrook was entitled to \$20,000. Both districts were awarded the grants and SSCPS is the lead partner. The training will be for teachers in grades 3-6 and for SSCPS, the focus will be on reading in the content area (science and history). We are pleased to receive this grant and to be able to provide specialized training in reading for our Level II and Level III teachers and to continue our work with Holbrook teachers.

November 11th: Honoring Those Who Have Served and Serve Our Country

On Wednesday, November 11th, communities across the country had celebrations and parades to honor those men and women who have served our country. This year, our school community has chosen as SSCPS's service project **Supporting Our Troops**. Jo Feldman, our Learning Services Director, will be spearheading this initiative. Although we most likely will be sending items to our troops stationed abroad, we plan to find ways to help our service men and women who are now home but need support, encouragement, and our thanks. Jo is reaching out to veterans' agencies and hospitals in the area to learn more about how we can help our veteran's transition from the trauma of serving abroad and being away from family and friends and show them our appreciation for their service to our country. Last spring at the Level Coordinators meeting and this fall at the Parents Association meeting, we discussed our school's history curriculum and I learned about the patriotic curriculum that was developed for the lower levels when the school was in Hull. Unfortunately, during the transition and merging three schools into one, the curriculum was not fully implemented in Norwell after the move. In early October, I asked the Level Coordinators to revisit the history curriculum that teachers had developed and we agreed that students would have the opportunity to say the Pledge of Allegiance each week at their Level town meeting. Across the school, students on each level are leading their classmates in the Pledge. Also as a result of my discussions with the administrators, Level Coordinators, and the PA, we have ordered flags for all of our classrooms and standing flags to be shared by the Levels for the town meetings. The flags have arrived and they were installed in most classrooms earlier in the week. They should be in all classrooms by the end of the week.

Service to others and a time of Thanksgiving

At this time of year, families and friends come together from near and far for thanksgiving. Although this past year has been very difficult for many families due to the on-going recession, we do have so much to be thankful for. This week our school psychologist, Sarah O'Loughlin, has written a most appropriate piece for our Spotlight story, "It is good to be grateful."

SPOTLIGHT ON SSCPS SUBMITTED BY SARAH O'LOUGHLIN...

It is good to be grateful. That is what a body of research in the field of positive psychology tells us: those who spend more time recognizing and expressing feelings of thankfulness tend to reap important benefits. Studies have shown that people who experience gratitude feel increased positive emotions (joy, love, happiness), have fewer negative emotions (bitterness, envy, resentment), have improved relationships, gain more satisfaction from work, feel more energetic, and enjoy better physical health.

Gratitude is an attribute that may be fostered at home and at school. The adoption of gratitude in our daily lives requires some effort and practice. It is a behavior that children learn from adults through teaching, modeling, and reinforcement. For instance, we teach children to say "thank you" in response to an act of kindness from another person. Other ways that parents and teachers may enhance feelings of gratitude in children include the following actions:

- *Provide structured opportunities* for the expression of gratitude. Older children could keep daily gratitude journals, while children of all ages could be asked to share one thing for which they are grateful each day at a mealtime.

- *Model thoughts and feelings* of gratitude by expressing them out loud, including the active appreciation of people, nature, health, a piece of music, an athletic maneuver, or the rights and freedoms that we enjoy in this country.
- *Encourage awareness* of the expression of gratitude by helping children to identify who helped them in a particular endeavor. Suggest that the child thank people in person or write a thank-you note. Watch for expressions of appreciation by children and let them know that you have noticed.
- Use visual reminders by writing notes of appreciation to children or by e-mailing or texting reminders of gratitude to them.

From my office at school, I am fortunate to be able to hear Wardie and the Level II students practicing "What a Wonderful World," a song of gratitude. We are approaching Thanksgiving, a season of gratitude. Let us all commit to a daily practice of gratitude, and we will be improving the quality of our lives at the same time.

Flu Symptom Checklist for Families and Schools

The main symptoms of influenza (flu) include fever and cough and/or sore throat. Some people also have a runny nose, body aches, headache, chills, and feel tired. Some people also have diarrhea and vomiting. The most important thing that you can do to keep flu from spreading in the community is to keep your sick child at home when they are sick.

Keep your child home for at least another day to observe for additional symptoms. Then use the checklist questions again to decide whether you should continue to keep your child home.

7-12 PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

It is an exciting day today at SSCPS. Today we celebrate a group of students who made First Honors and Honors for Quarter One and a group of students who were inducted into the National Honor Society (see Shout Out below) for exemplary academic work, leadership, service, and character throughout their high school years.

In a society all too often focused on immediate gratification and the quick and easy fix these students have been rewarded with the knowledge that through hard work and perseverance goals can be achieved. It is important that as a school community we take time to recognize and celebrate their accomplishments, as they have excelled in the tasks we have asked them to do. These students are using the skills, traits, and characteristics in school that will help them to find success in life. In this new and expanding global economy, the competition pool grows, and, as the competition pool increases in size, it becomes more and more difficult to stay competitive.

For over a quarter century, this nation has been warned that we are at risk, that our schools must do a better job preparing students for this ever changing world. Schools, like many large institutions, have been slow to grasp the need to change and to change. Thankfully, leaders in the state of Massachusetts, through the Education Reform Act of 1993, heeded the call to change. Along with student and teacher testing, the 1993 Act allowed for charter schools. SSCPS was one of the original charter schools begun in the spirit of piloting new and innovative ways to teach our children. Embedded in the plan to establish charter schools was the notion to instill competition in the marketplace of educating young people in the public school setting. One only needs to look at the 2009 MCAS tests results to realize that charter schools are competitive, often at the top of the rankings of schools on MCAS tests results.

While this should be cause for celebration, opponents gather in Boston and try to limit the cap on charter schools. Fortunately, the administration in Washington D.C. supports innovation and is using money to influence states to allow for the growth of more charter schools.

It is right to take time to celebrate our students' and our school's successes. Massachusetts has some of the best public schools in the country, and charter schools, like SSCPS, are some of the best schools in the state, and these students receiving Honors and National Honor Society recognition are some of the best students in our school, but we should never grow complacent. A quick look at our economy, the state of Massachusetts, and dropout and graduation rates in our schools, indicates that there is much work to be done, and that the time to do the work is now, because, as we all know, the world will not wait.
