FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Welcome, 7-12 Principal, Angie Pepin

It's now official and our own Angie Pepin is two days into her role as 7-12 principal. As expected, Angie is off to a great start and her high energy level continues to impress us all. In the principal section of this week's Update, Angie will introduce herself to you and why she is so excited to be our new 7-12 principal! Early next month, we will be scheduling a coffee hour (8:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m.) for families of students in grades 7-12 to meet with Angie and discuss Level IV and high school programs and possible plans/ideas for the future. We will publicize the date in the December 9th Update.

New After-School Fee-Based Supervision Program for Grade 7-10 Students

Until this year, the local YMCA sponsored fee-based after-school activities for elementary and middle school students at SSCPS. Last spring, the Y informed us that they would be discontinuing the middle school program due to budget cuts. At the September PA meeting, parents asked the administration to look into offering some type of after-school program for middle school students. Since that time, we have reached out to the Y and other local providers to see if they would be interested in running a fee based program for middle school students at SSCPS. Unfortunately, we have not been successful, but we will continue to look into However, because a number of parents have a definite need for the school to outside program sponsors. offer some kind of late pick-up program, we will be implementing an after-school, fee based program beginning next Monday, December 7th. From 4:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, there will be an after-school assistant to supervise students in grades 7 through 10 for a fee of \$3 a day (per student). Families interested in signing up their son/daughter for this program should contact Kristine Shipps, our Business Manager. This program needs to be self-supporting since after-school supervision was not included in our budget. Ideally, parents will reserve a spot and pay in advance for their student to participate. In an emergency, parents/guardians can contact the school prior to the end of the school day to notify us that their son/daughter will be staying late. Please note that the fee is a flat rate of \$3 for the 90 minutes – a real "bargain" if you compare this fee to what is charged by other after-school programs. If you need further information about this new program, please contact me or Kristine Shipps.

Save the Date: Wednesday, December 16th

This year's music concerts will be at a new location: Notre Dame Academy in Hingham. Although we appreciate the willingness of the Hingham Public Schools to allow us to rent their auditorium for concerts and plays over the past few years, there have been some complications. Understandably, SSCPS is at the bottom of the priority list to book events to accommodate the needs of the Hingham schools first. As a result, we often have to wait until the last minute to confirm the date and the available dates are not always the best ones for us. Another issue has been parking – with sporting events going on at Hingham High School, parking has always been at a premium. Because of this limited parking, some parents have parked on the street and received parking tickets from the local police. Last spring, I raised these concerns with the Board of Trustees and they approved my approaching area private and parochial schools to see if we could rent their auditoriums. Notre Dame Academy, which is off Route 228 in Hingham, was available. The school has lots of parking spaces, a large auditorium, and has more available dates than the public schools in the area. The two concert events will be a pilot and we will be looking for feedback from our parents, students, and staff on whether this change has been an improvement. The winter concert is Wednesday, December 16th and it begins at 6:00 p.m. We hope to see everyone there!

SPOTLIGHT ON SSCPS the Spanish Program "Better Communication in a Global Society"

Today's students are entering into a world vastly different from that of the 20th century. Schools and communities need to prepare their young people to succeed in this new global environment. We at SSCPS must strive to cultivate the knowledge, skills and passion in students that will enable them to recognize the challenges and opportunities of an interconnected world. The Spanish Department has been addressing this issue of global significance by strengthening the entire K-12 program and implementing better approaches to teaching and assessing students' work at all levels.

Kindergarten: This year Kindergarten Spanish meets twice a week for 30 minutes. During the course of the year, students will learn and practice various classroom commands, such as listen, raise your hand, sit down, stand up, etc. Also students will learn greetings, numbers 1 -10, colors, body parts, and food among other topics. We will compose, illustrate, and take home "minibooks" to read to parents. Each topic learned by the students is accompanied by songs. Several simple children's books will be read to students. We will sing and dance. By the end of the year, students will be able to recite a poem and sing songs in the target language.

Level I: This year Level I Spanish meets twice a week for 45 minutes. During the course of the year, students will learn and practice classroom commands, greetings and introductions. We will sing and dance. Also, students will review and learn more numbers 1-30, colors, classroom vocabulary, food, clothing, etc. Students will be able to express orally personal likes and dislikes about colors, food, etc. We will compose, illustrate, and take home "minibooks" to read to parents. By the end of the year, students will be able to recite poems, sing the alphabet and many other songs in Spanish.

Level II: This year Level II Spanish meets twice a week for 45 minutes. During the course of the year, students will learn and practice introductions and greetings. Students will review and learn numbers 1-60, colors, classroom vocabulary, days, months, family members, objects in a bedroom, food vocabulary, etc. They listen to and read stories and answer questions to build their own stories. The main resource used is ¡Vale!. By the end of the year, students will be able to make polite requests in Spanish, such as "May I got to the bathroom" and "I need a pencil, please". We will sing and dance doing gestures to demonstrate meaning. Students will act in mini skits, and retell stories. Students will recite poems, and sing many other songs in the target language.

Level III: This year Level III Spanish meets twice a week for 45 minutes. During the course of the year, students will learn and practice introductions and greetings. Students will compare and contrast greeting customs. Ask each other questions. They will learn numbers 1-200, classroom vocabulary, days of the week, months, time, subject pronouns, AR-ER-IR verbs, etc. They will listen to and read stories and answer questions to build their own stories. The main resource used is ¡Vale!. By the end of the year, students will be

able to make polite requests in Spanish. They will act in mini skits, recite poems and sing songs in the target language.

Level IV

This year 7th graders in Level IV Spanish meet four times a week for a total of 3 1/2 hours. Students will review and learn introductions, school vocabulary, family, hobbies and sports among others. Students will build their conversational and listening skills through a variety of activities including group and individual oral presentations. With the purchase of new headsets, our computer lab has now become a language lab, allowing students to do a variety of listening activities as well as responding to different commands. Students will also learn about the culture, geography and history of several Spanish speaking countries.

This year 8th graders in Level IV Spanish meet four times a week for a total of 3 1/2 hours. Students will learn vocabulary related to vacations and travel, shopping, daily routines, food and celebrations. We will focus on conversational skills using different forms of verbs, such as irregular verbs in the present tense, the present progressive and the preterit. Students will apply what they have learned by creating skits and oral presentations. They will also learn about the geography, history, culture and current events of several Spanish-speaking countries.

High School- Spanish 1:

Students meet five times a week, for a total of 4.5 hours. Students are introduced to the customs, traditions, and histories of the Spanish-speaking countries, in addition to the foundations of the Spanish language. Students will build and reinforce their mastery through a variety of activities and mediums. These mediums will include the study of and recitation of poetry, songs, listening activities, web-based activities, role-playing, and performing skits. By the end of the school year, students will be able to speak about themselves and others, describe their daily routines, their favorite pastimes and celebrations, as well as the weather. Both the Present and Past tenses will be studied.

High School- Spanish 2:

Students meet five times a week, for a total of 4.5 hours. Students will continue to build and reinforce their knowledge of the Spanish language, in addition to the customs, traditions, and histories of the Spanish-speaking world. Students will study and recite poetry, study songs, engage in listening and web-based activities, and perform skits and role-plays. By the end of the school year, students will be able to speak about past events, what they were like when they were younger, and begin to speak about future events. The Present, Past, and Future tenses will be studied.

High School- Spanish 3: Students meet five times a week for a total of 4.5 hours to improve upon the four skills: writing, reading, listening and speaking. They are using the knowledge they have acquired in the previous years by creating meaningful paragraphs: about families, things that they used to do as a child, describing an incident, talking about the environment. Students also write and present dialogs using vocabulary related to Latin cultural situations. Students work everyday in their communication skills by speaking to each other, answering questions using the new vocabulary, engage in web-based activities and listening to real life situations and cultural capsules online. Students make connections with the global world, by choosing and researching a Hispanic country of choice, talking about interesting issues, sharing food of the country, and making a mural.

High School- Spanish 4: Students meet five times a week for a total of 4.5 hours. Students are working to improve their writing skills, polishing sentence constructions and grammar, creating meaningful paragraphs, engage in web-based activities, writing for real life situations, such as job interviews dialogs, reading several newspaper articles from different Spanish countries, and analyzing poems of Latin writers. Students are improving their oral skills, by learning new vocabularies, speaking daily in class and communicating through interviews and games, presenting skits, listening online to dialogs and conversations from native speakers and understanding their culture and history.

At the end of the Spanish Program, our students will be able to speak fluently in Spanish and use the target language to have a conversation with native speakers, ask and answer questions in an interview, and share opinions on different subjects. Students will be able to write in correct grammatical constructions a letter, an

email, an essay, an opinion and a critique of a literary work. Finally, students will also be able to apply the knowledge of the target language as they pursue their future careers in the global world.

In order to foster communication, celebrate diversity and create opportunities of leaderships in our global society, we have formed within our school, two associations: **The Caribbean Diversity Association** and **The Cultural Latin Connection Association**. Students have taken active roles in both associations and their efforts will soon be noted within our school and our community at large.

Some people also have diarrhea and vomiting. The most important thing that you can do to keep flu from spreading in the community is to keep your sick child at home when they are sick.

7-12 Principal's Report

I am excited and honored to have officially entered my role as the Interim 7-12 Principal this week. I am enjoying my new routine, though must admit that I miss all of the Level IV students I no longer see in class. Luckily many of them have stopped by to check out my new office. This week, I have had the opportunity to hear from students and staff and to peek in on several classrooms. I've particularly enjoyed meeting the high school students I hadn't taught on the lower levels and seeing how far those I have taught have come since the sixth grade. The way that I have been welcomed by faculty, staff, students, and parents alike is evidence of what a wonderful community this is. I am proud to be a part of it.

One initiative taken up by the high school this year is an emphasis in writing across all subject areas. On Tuesday Jerry Morris from the Collins Writing Program provided demonstration lessons in several of our high school classrooms. He will visit classrooms on Levels II-IV today. During his time with the high school, Jerry was able to share strategies for incorporating writing into math and science, as well as methods for tackling open response questions on standardized tests. High school teachers will continue the work on writing they've begun during the early release time on Thursday, December 10th. It was such a pleasure to debrief Tuesday's sessions with Jerry and to hear him describe how focused, engaged, and respectful our high school students are. Judging from my travels this week, I agree with him wholeheartedly. I look forward to learning more from the students and staff as the year progresses.

K-6 PRINCIPAL

Last week was Thanksgiving. For the past 15 years or so my immediate family has taken the trek from the South Shore up to Lexington to visit with and eat with family at my wife's sister's house. It is a big gang, too big for one room and there has grown to be an adult table and children's table, though half of the children are now adults. At the children's table they always take a moment to state what they are thankful for and I want to take this opportunity to give my bit of thanks and express my gratitude.

First I want to thank the volunteerism that built this school and keeps us going. There have been so many efforts that have been so sustained that they have become the school. The original authors' children have gone on to college but their work persists. And there are recent and current efforts that make us a fuller and a better school. I would like to highlight two. One of them is the library. The volunteers that have staffed and established our library are making such a difference in opening up the great world of books to our children. Thanks to all the folks who have made this library real. I hear stories of other schools where fully stocked school libraries have locks on their doors because the staff position has been cut, not here, thanks to you. Another act of volunteerism is the work of a parent, Stephen Gallagher, who came in last night for most of a night to repaint the lines on our pavement. Ever since Stephen repainted the lines I am certain that pick-up has been smoother and more efficient, many thanks to Stephen (please admire his lines) and all of the volunteers of the school who make this such a community.

Second I want to thank the faculty and staff who work here and I would like to share with you some of the words that I wrote to them over the break.

HI Everybody,

I hope you are having a good Thanksgiving!

I wanted to take this opportunity to thank everyone at school and express my gratitude for the work we are doing together. I am reading a book about how difficult school can be for children and how the wounds that develop in school do not always heal. I know that, for the vast majority of **our students**, that is not the case as they are happy and joyful at school. We are a school that has been designed from its inception to put he needs of the children first. That design has typically meant more work for the adults and an inefficient but **effective** education for the students.

I am sure that we will never hit a period where we have figured it out and the school will be so well organized that it will be still designed for the students and no more difficult for the teachers than a typical school. It is with deep gratitude that I say thank you and I think about how you make our small piece of the world a happy and loving place. As a school founded in love I am so glad that we still strive to put love at the center of all of our work. See you all on Monday Ted

Well Monday has come and gone but the work is ongoing. Schools are inherently complex and insoluble puzzles but puzzles where with cooperation, goodwill and energy, good things happen everyday. Thanks for sending us your children and thanks for making this little bit of schooling better than it was the year before. I know that Principal Jim Connolly left this school better than he found it. I am looking forward to working with Angie Pepin as the new 7 -12 Principal and I know that Angie Pepin will make this a better school. I am so excited to think of all the things that Angie will do. I remember that first class I ever saw Angie teach and I know that at this time next year we will be an even better school and to that prospect I am most grateful.
