HIGH SCHOOL ENVIRONMENTAL WORKSHOP NEEDS YOUR VOTE!

The High School Environmental Workshop's veggie van group continued to work on their alternative transportation goals for the school this year. They wrote a proposal that not only would launch a shuttle system at SSCPS, but provide a new veggie van for field trips and produce up to \$30,000/year in profit for green activities at our school.

The group searched for grant opportunities and Robert Eloi, on his third year in the workshop, entered the group in a grant competition through Samsung USA. The group was selected as one of 50 finalists, and less than a week later they received a free camcorder, Adobe software, and laptop. Under the leadership of Jonathan Jackson (junior), Robert Eloi (junior), Jonathan Boyle (freshman), and Kayleigh Wright (freshman), a 2 minute video proposal was created. Monday, we learned that they are now one of 10 school groups to make it to the third round.

The group has already won over \$1,000. In order to progress to round 4, they must be one of the top five scoring teams. Their score is comprised 40% of public votes and 60% by private judges. All of the top five teams win grant money (up to \$10,000) from DirectTV as well as technology from Microsoft and Samsung. The grant money would be used towards fulfilling the Environmental Workshop's proposal, but the technology would be shared by the school.

Voting takes place from January 17th to February 18th. All voters must register with their e-mail the first time they vote. You will then receive a link you must click within your e-mail. After you register, you may vote up to five times/day. You may place all five of your votes in the same session, too!

7-12 PRINCIPAL

Yesterday I had the great pleasure of judging the Poetry Workshop's Poetry Slam Exhibition of Mastery. The Poetry Slam set two teams of students against one another as they shared the poetry they worked on over the course of the semester. We judged student performers not only on the quality of their poetry, but on their performances. It was remarkable to see students transform themselves into the characters from their work, complete with facial expressions, hand gestures, and accents. Perhaps most impressive was the ability of some students who are generally quiet in class to come out of their shells in the Poetry Slam venue. The work produced by these students is top-notch and just further evidence of the incredible talent in our high school student body.

Last week I judged another group of Exhibitions when students in the Design and Engineering Workshop presented their proposals for design tasks, ranging from an outdoor seating structure to a go-kart. Students outlined each step of the engineering process and reported the progress of their groups in choosing a project, outlining designs, creating a prototype, acquiring materials, and deciding on next steps. Perhaps most importantly, students had to work as teams to make decisions at each stage of the process. The format of the Workshop is teaching students not just about engineering, but about the real challenges that people face in the workplace when they are required to demonstrate expertise, and also to work with others.

At the high school level, Exhibitions of Mastery move away from the research and present model of the lower grades and move more into the capacity of demonstrating mastery through a culminating piece of work or presentation. These presentations include the Fashion Show, the Poetry Slam, plays, and musical performances. Other students complete original research or contribute to publications. Students are judged by faculty as well as by experts from outside our building. Often these presentations occur when the project is still a work in progress, as is the case with the science based Workshops. The opportunity to present to experts provides students with critical feedback that they can use to improve their work as they move forward.

These Exhibitions of Mastery at the high school level coincide with midyear exams, a more traditional form of assessment. I am impressed with the ability of our students to perform at both types of tasks. At the college level, students will be required to complete midterm exams, but they will also be asked to negotiate working in groups and to demonstrate mastery of their chosen field of study though practicums, clinicals, and internships. I am confident that coupling traditional assessment with the opportunity for students to delve into a topic of interest as they continue to develop the group skills teachers at SSCPS have fostered since kindergarten through Project-based learning prepares them for college and the world beyond.

Last week I wrote about why I like going to PA meetings. There are so many reasons; I just couldn't possibly fit them into one Update. So here I am again.

What goes on at PA meetings, anyway? Well, each principal gives an overview of what's going on lately in their part of the school. Alicia chimes in on the issues that are school-wide. And Grade Reps – those are parents from each grade – give quick updates on what is going on in each grade and what is coming down the pike, like Exhibitions and field trips.
