## FROM THE 7-12 PRINCIPAL

The season of MCAS testing began this week with 4<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, and 10<sup>th</sup> graders completing the English Language Arts Long Composition test on Tuesday and 10<sup>th</sup> graders taking the Reading Comprehension test on Wednesday and Thursday. Over the next two weeks the remainder of our students in grades 3 through 8 will be tested in English Language Arts.

With the importance placed on testing and the energy into MCAS preparation it is easy for teachers, students, and parents to forget or fail to realize that the MCAS tests valuable skills. I spent some time in a seventh grade English class last week and had a conversation with the students about the upcoming English Language Arts Long Composition test. The students were concerned because the test was approaching quickly and they felt that they had not spent a great deal of time preparing. I pointed to all of the writing assignments that they completed in English class, the five-paragraph essay structure that they studied in history, as well as the writing that is incorporated across the curriculum. When I explained to the students all of these different ways that their teachers were getting them ready, they had a hard time grasping this. They viewed MCAS testing as an end to itself, something to be prepared for in isolation and accomplished. I explained to them my view of the MCAS; the test is a measurement of student progress towards acquiring the skills needed for continued academic success in school, college, and beyond. By my definition the Long Composition test is crucial since the focus is on competent writing, a skill vital for effective communication no matter where our students end up following graduation.

We know that the MCAS can cause anxiety in some students but we also know that MCAS is a useful assessment of valuable knowledge, concepts and skills. The tests are based on the Massachusetts Frameworks, which outline what students in our state are expected to learn. Students don't prepare for the Long Composition MCAS just to score well on the test, but to learn to effectively express themselves in writing. The MCAS just tells us how we're doing in our efforts towards this goal. We are glad that the students care about their performance but our goal is to teach the competencies, not to achieve a mark on a test. In a world where so much is riding on test scores, especially for our 10<sup>th</sup> graders, it is easy for all of us to forget why the tests were created in the first place.

At Tuesday's administration of the Long Composition test I saw students who were prepared and confident in all three tested grades. Teachers reported to me that students planned effectively; using the organizational tools they were taught to use. They wrote a great deal and took the time necessary to appropriately revise and edit their work. These skills will prove valuable long after we receive the test results.

As much as the MCAS requires a great deal of planning, organization, and bureaucracy, I have to say that it has made us a stronger school. Over the past few years we have more effectively incorporated test preparation into our curriculum across subjects. The result is that students are not always aware that MCAS preparation is taking place. As much as I am looking forward to the results of the test, the test is just a measurement. Our focus as a school is not solely on MCAS success, but on what MCAS success tells us about our students and their knowledge.

#### Announcements

- We apologize for no meeting last month... scheduling was too difficult
- Next PA meeting will be Saturday April 2<sup>nd</sup> at 9am
- Golf Outing Update: please contact Kerry Benjamin if you want to help out.

#### School Reports

Jackie Perry

- Some student drivers are concerned with safety at drop off. Jonathan (HS student) attended meeting to address this issue: gated off area is getting blocked, people stop and won't allow traffic to move, with all the snow it is difficult to see, ... He wants to know if this is an issue for parents...
- Discussion: signboards costs \$300 and so we didn't get one for under the basketball hoop... parents are lingering in the dropoff line... We will remind people of safety concerns in the drop-off line in the update. Heather will contact the Health and Safety Committee Chair. Everyone can drop off in the front in the morning. Adult Safety Patrol in the short term. Summer Planning

#### Alicia Savage-

- High School Environmental Workshop won First Prize in Samsung's Solve for Tomorrow competition. 5 first place winners each won \$70000 technology prize, \$5000 scholarship, & a trip to NY. The high school kids produced a fabulous video... we should all check it out <a href="http://pages.samsung.com/us/sft/finalists.html">http://pages.samsung.com/us/sft/finalists.html</a>
- 40% voting 60% panel of experts... Samsung, Microsoft, Directv, Adobe community experts weighed in.... 2 of 4 students in the project get to go on the trip... (Is there a way to arrange for all kids to go?)
- <u>SSCPS enrollment lottery</u>: 35 kindergarten, 3 10th grade slots... lots of waiting lists... as slots open up, kids will come off waiting lists... as of now everyone is intending to return next year.
- <u>b.good</u>: On the Friday before Feb break, b.good served lunch to kids pro bono... very successful!
- <u>Annual Fund:</u> has raised over \$21000.... 100% participation from families and faculty is essential for each year. (capital campaign should be 3xs annual)
- <u>New student email accounts</u>: hs, middle, & level 3 students will be given a school email account because kids who are registering for college boards and sites need an email address and colleges are looking at what the email address is... also sky web account kids will be able to upload their assignments
- For grades 5-8, the system is a closed campus... only can email within school but for grades 9-12 the system is an open campus- can email beyond SSCPS
- no instant messaging will be allowed within the systems, Microsoft filters will prevent questionable content. Student, parent, faculty will monitor these email accounts (in this order)...
- <u>Gym Space</u>- wasn't working for middle and high school... in the school... renting a space allows for real PE. but this is a band-aid... we really need a permanent gym space.
- Kindergarten and level 2 do not go to new PE space. Level 2 has 2 PE times per week but shorter so it is not worth the travel time to go to new space

#### Ted Hirsch-

- <u>SSCPS enrollment lottery</u>... lots of people wanted to get in but didn't because we didn't have enough space. Ted was sad. None of the SSCPS teachers were able to get their kids in...
- <u>No snow days</u> lately is good- lots more disciplinary problems.... he feels because of snow and weather, etc.
- EOMs were as good this year as any he has seen- Teachers are really impressed with the students' work
- Field trips to MFA and BSO are traditional and have continued this year
- Everyone is working hard.

Angie Pepin-

• <u>High school presentation</u>: slideshow to give us an idea about how the high school works. (This presentation is typically given to current 8th grade parents to encourage them to make the decision for students to stay for high school).

- Grade 9-12 have more requirements than typical district school... college prep, classes are small 8-20 students. Advisory: each student has a teacher that is responsible for helping the student keep track of with where they are academically and socially, etc. (e.g. bullying, make-up work, portfolios, etc)
- They are taught that everything counts! For every action you do there is a reaction and a consequence... grades, activities, discipline, attitude (recommendations), portraying your image positively (Facebook, twitter, Myspace, etc.) Colleges and employers are looking at all that students put out in public.
- SSCPS difference: very rigorous community service requirement (over 100 hours)
- Mandatory 9th grade summer institute for students to get to know each other (assessments are done too...math/ELA)
- 4yrs of core subject: English, history, math, science, Spanish, project
- 2 college courses (school pays for them at Quincy College)
- 100% college placement
- Year long workshops
- All seniors next year will take calculus either at AP or regular level
- Options: can do dual enrollment jr/sr graduate from SSCPS with high school diploma and associates degree, virtual high school to take APs that SSCPS doesn't offer, independent workshop: kid designs his/her own workshop...
- Workshop is like an extension to projects... workshop is year long and is a course that counts toward GPA
- 42% of our seniors eligible for John and Abigail Adams scholarships (for scoring in top 25% on MCAS among students in their towns)
- 67% of 10th graders scored advanced on math MCAS
- senior debate: pick an issue and debate it (grad requirement)
- seniors are not here for 4th quarter, they do internships in companies...
- 29 seniors this year.
- Discussion: Is there a way to improve MCAS ELA preparation? Mayflower RSVP retired volunteers will work in the school for free and may be able to tutor in ELA (some are retired teachers).

#### Facilities Report: David Whitemeyer

- The roof will be replaced this summer. We have a contractor selected and contracted... they will begin construction the day after school ends for summer and complete the work in time for school to open in the fall. The whole roof is being replaced...
- There will be no kindergarten playgroup here, but summer school will be held in the building and faculty will be able to work in the building (will be loud).
- Kids were never in danger of roof collapse... the building was behaving exactly the way it was supposed to... steel frame building bends ... plaster doesn't bend so walls cracked...
- Importantly, the whole community came together to make sure everyone was safe... Mark Flanagan is amazing ... faculty gave him a special gift because of the way he handles everything that falls in his lap happily!
- Green roof? The greenest building you can have is one that you don't have to build...
- Couple of other things that are happening... replacing flooring, Ted wants to improve level 3 and 4 green areas

#### Jessica Roman- Tummies to Teens

- A new upscale boutique/consignment center for children has opened just down the street from the school... is partnering with school and donating profit back to school once a month.
- They are now officially the Cradles to Crayons drop off site for the South Shore and community service hours can be done for Cradles to Crayons
- A senior intern from SSCPS will work with Jessica, to learn what it is like to start a business from the ground up
- Girl Scouts community event March 27th selling cookies
- Work for clothes program is offered through the store
