FROM THE K-6 PRINCIPAL

Last Friday I went up to Merrimack New Hampshire to give the Keynote talk at the New Hampshire Charter Schools first annual Professional Development Conference. New Hampshire Charter Schools are much newer than the charter schools we have here in Massachusetts. The oldest of the ten New Hampshire charter schools has been in operation for only seven years. I was invited to give a talk and a workshop because I was free and have seventeen years of experience in many things "Charter." This conference was very nostalgic for me because I spent the day with people who were currently involved in work that reminded me of the work that we had been doing as a school a decade ago. I saw tremendous energy and passion on Friday, but on Monday I was also very grateful to be here in Norwell knowing that we had gone through that period and were a more developed school.

My talk titled, "Why Schools, Why Public Schools, Why Public Charter Schools" was a message to these educational pioneers explaining that it really did get better and that their current hard work was worth it. I told them that for us the tipping point was about year thirteen. As an illustration of our new found stability I gave the example that next year, for the first time in sixteen years, we would have a 7-12 schedule nearly identical to the one this year. I then tried to reassure them that we had not become complacent as we were redesigning the K – 6 schedules.

Two weeks ago I wrote that this is the planning season for next year and that we would be hosting spring coffees to share with you our vision for the 2011-2012 school year. The administrative team and the faculty have been and are working very hard on this planning process and things are beginning to coalesce. We are ready to begin sharing and refining our ideas. The coffees in May are an important part of the planning process as they will give us the opportunity to describe the changes we are proposing and to gather feedback both on our current program and on our ideas for the future. We need you to be involved in this vetting process so that in August we will be ready to begin the new school year with enthusiasm and purpose. Coffees will be held from 8:30 – 9:30am in the music room on the following dates:

- May 4 – Level I
- May 11 – Level II
- May 18 – Level III

- May 25 – Grades 7-12

Another part of the planning process is the construction of student groups for classrooms. A tradition here at SSCPS is family input on class placement. If you have a child entering kindergarten, first, third, or fifth grade please contact me by e-mail at thirsch@sscps.org with your request. While family requests are the single most important factor in determining class grouping, it is not the only factor. If we are not able to grant your request I will contact you. **The deadline for notifying me of your preference is Monday April 11th.**

The good news just keeps coming as the work of our students and teachers is gathering recognition across the state, region and country. Last week a group of Third and Fourth Grade students from the Waste Watchers Project went up to Bowdoin College in Brunswick, Maine and presented their work at a service learning conference. They were proud and we are proud of them and their teachers, Sarah Roberts and Bill Tramontana, and grateful to the parent volunteer chaperones who helped with the trip. Last weekend a group of student coached by Amy Vandenberg competed in Massachusetts' Odyssey of the Mind tournament. Please read about it in Amy Vandenberg's piece in this Update. Lastly I would like to congratulate Courtney Huber and her Health and Fitness Project. The Project spent the trimester researching Epilepsy and decided to raise money to promote awareness and to support education, research, and services for those with epilepsy. With the help of Julianne Tilden, we got the South Shore Sports Center to donate their facility for us to hold a soccer shoot out. In addition to the shoot out (with Donovan Fauvelle as goalie) the kids participated in many other activities such as relays, scrimmages, and agility exercises. When the students got back to school I saw lots of happy students and lots of purple as a symbol of epilepsy awareness. I thought *what a great celebration of fitness and health!* Then I learned that through this event the Project had raised close to \$2,000 for the Epilepsy Foundation of MA. It was not merely an important physical and academic experience; it was important work for an important cause.

We are all so very proud of them and I am also proud of the project model that we have developed over 16 years here at SSCPS. Thanks Courtney and all of her students and volunteer parents for making this happen. We can and do accomplish so much through Project because it puts responsibility and power into the hands of children and partners the school with other supporting organizations.

ODYSSEY OF THE MIND

Odyssey of the Mind is an international program that provides creative problem solving opportunities for students from kindergarten to college. The problems in Odyssey of the Mind range from the technical to the theatrical. This year, SSCPS had its first two teams, made up from students in Levels I and II. The students in the teams worked tirelessly, after school and on weekends from October until March, to select a problem and then create a solution. This past weekend they presented their work at the Massachusetts State Odyssey of the Mind Tournament.

One team chose to solve a problem in which they had to create and perform an original performance where a character from a piece of classic literature was transformed into a tour guide. They had to pick, research, and depict two real places and create their own original place, and have the character guide a group of tourists through the three areas. In addition, they had to design a worthless item, and make up a reason that the item would be guarded and highlighted on their tour. This team of students, composed of Sydney Hebert, Cleo Belber, Georgia Chambers, Arthur Almeda, and Maya Levitt of Amy's Pod and Emerson Stout and Kai Schildmeier of Nora's Pod, chose to research and depict Arlington National Cemetery and the Evergreen Aviation and Space Museum (home of the Spruce Goose), as well as to create their own Forest of Mustard, and to have the Wicked Witch of the West from L. Frank Baum's The Wonderful Wizard of Oz be their tour guide. They designed a "Statue of Homework" as their worthless item, and decided to have it worthy of guarding because "George Washington made it when he was 5." They presented their creative and humorous solution to judges at the tournament and were rewarded with third place!

The other team chose to solve a problem in which they had to create a Rube Goldberg machine to complete a simple task in a complicated manner. In addition to designing, creating, and building a machine, they also

had to write a skit incorporating it, but also involving an inventor character and an ad campaign. This team of students, composed of Noel Hill, Skylar Jordan, Olivia Harvey, Drew Macdonald, Annika Brooks, and Malescha Nelson of Amy's Pod and Kaitlyn Grable of Kristin's Pod, made their Rube Goldberg machine complete the task of putting mail in a mailbox through complicated steps involving Newton Balls, homemade stairs and a Slinky, and a car made of Legos. They wrote a humorous skit involving an inflexible inventor, an overzealous young child, and a few infomercials. They presented their solution to judges at the tournament and were rewarded with second place! In addition, because a team member was unable to be present on the day of the tournament, and because the rest of the team was creative and flexible in working around that blip, they were awarded with an extra award, The Omer Award, which honors perseverance and team spirit.

It should be conveyed that Odyssey of the Mind is an entirely student-centered program. The solutions these students came up with were entirely theirs: I, as their coach, could teach them how to use tools or help them stay on track with their thinking, but the process of trial and error, speaking up with their ideas, creating, building, painting, and rehearsing was all based around their needs, wants, and desires. When the students wanted to use a jigsaw, drill, staple gun, or hammer and nails, they learned how to use them and then, with guidance, were responsible for getting the work done. When the children wanted to write their play or create a costume, they had to decide on characters and plot, or take into account the size of the actors. The students involved in Odyssey of the Mind accomplished much, and in an incredibly creative and collaborative manner. They have much to be proud of, and we, as a school community, have much to be proud of, too. Congratulations to all involved in Odyssey of the Mind!


