## WHAT'S HAPPENING IN WORKSHOPS & PROJECTS?

High School Animal & Environmental Workshop News

This has been an eventful quarter! We had our first round of exhibitions of mastery presentations which included:

Veterinary Medicine – Emilie Gray

The alternative travel group (Jonathan Jackson, Jonathan Boyle, Robert Eloi, and Kayleigh Wright) submitted their proposal for two grants, and they filtered enough oil (approximately 70 gallons) for their trip to Washington D.C. The group only used <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tank of diesel on their 800+ mile journey. They also supplied Level II with 40 gallons for their trip to Bowdoin College.

Breighanna Weed planned her EOM trip to Washington D.C. bringing students from Lora DeSalvo's workshop and the Animal & Environmental Workshop along for the ride. The twelve students made it to Washington D.C. in 9 and ½ hours and spent 2 ½ days visiting the National Zoo, Smithsonian Museums, the Crime & Punishment Museum, Library of Congress, and the National Archives. A highlight of the visit included a view of the Super Moon over the Washington Monument from the Lincoln Memorial.

The Workshop has been invited to attend the May 3<sup>rd</sup> Service Learning Conference to share their work.

**High School World Heritage Workshop-** The objective of this workshop is to raise students' awareness regarding cultural diversity by looking into the world heritages. Students have researched, inquired, differentiated and gained appreciation of each country: its history, its people, and its culture. They have studied in the areas of art, music, dance, and food. On April 15<sup>th</sup>, the workshop is sharing this learning experience by celebrating the SSCPS Heritage Day. All the High School students will embark on a World Cruise through the different continents to get to know our school heritages: Caribbean, Europe, Africa, Asia, North America, Central America,

and South America. The students have worked extremely hard to organize this day. For this event, we are asking for parents to donate food from their homelands in order to share with our community. #### Level IV Shakespeare Project

Recently in the Shakespeare project we have been working on more deeply understanding the meaning of Shakespearean scenes. One way which we have done this was by working in groups to analyze a given scene. Each group began by paraphrasing the lines in their scene. Using these translations as well as Shakespearean quotes, the groups composed a rap to deliver the general idea of their scene. We performed these raps in front of the level. After completing this assignment, we started to organize the creation of our graphic novel. This graphic novel will be based upon both the raps we created and summaries we will be writing of the corresponding scenes. Together, we formed jobs, job descriptions, and groups of people to perform these jobs. We are now working together to compose the graphic novel and our goal is to be finished with it by the end of April. In addition to the graphic novel, each person in the project will be required to completely memorize an assigned Shakespearean speech. These speeches are all of about equal length from various plays. After memorizing them, students will deliver them to both the project and the level using emotion and subtext. All students in the Shakespeare project are very proud of our rap performances, and are excited to finish our graphic novel as well as our speeches.

## FROM THE 7-12 PRINCIPAL

We are at the time of year that marks many important milestones for our Senior class. This week Seniors are completing their Senior Debates, the culminating project for their Ethics course and a graduation requirement. Senior Debates are a deeply embedded tradition at SSCPS, as they have been an exit standard since the founding of the school. Each year the Senior class chooses a topic to focus on. This year the debates will center on the DREAM (Development, Relief, and Education of Alien Minors) Act, several versions of which have been brought before Congress since 2001. Students were put on teams, assigned positions and tasked with researching and preparing for their presentations. This exercise in logic and rhetoric results in students that are experienced in presenting, supporting, and developing arguments and is the culmination of years of Exhibitions of Mastery.

As the final round of college acceptances are rolling in, our Seniors are left with tough decisions to make as they plan for next year, with students left choosing between several attractive options. Our students have gained acceptance to an impressive list of colleges and universities. Many of our students have also earned scholarship money to support their continued studies. It is exciting to watch our students prepare for this next step in their academic careers.

Next week Seniors take their last set of final exams as high school students. April 15<sup>th</sup> marks their last day at SSCPS. Following the April vacation twelfth graders will not return to school and instead will spend the fourth quarter out on Senior Project internships. Students have worked with Mary Carter, our guidance counselor, as well as with other members of the K-12 staff to match their interests with internship opportunities in the community. Throughout the Senior Project experience, faculty advisors remain in contact with students to ensure that things are running smoothly. At the end of the internship period prior to graduation, Seniors write a paper describing their experience and present their work to a team of faculty members. Senior Projects allow students to get a taste of fields that they are interested in pursuing in college and beyond. I am looking forward to listening to their presentations and hearing about their varied experiences.

As a teacher it is particularly gratifying for me to see this group of students move towards the next stage in their lives. Many of the current twelfth grade students were my students on Level III when I first started here at SSCPS. The incredible amount of growth that they've experienced since that time is a testament to their own efforts as well as those of their families and teachers.

#### Parents Association Job Descriptions

#### <u>Chair</u>

- The Chair will have previously held a PA office or have attended a majority of the year's regular PA meetings.
- The Chair will plan the agenda and chair PA meetings.
- The Chair will have monthly meetings with the Executive Director to coordinate some of the PA activities and initiatives.
- The Chair will write a monthly report to the parents to be submitted to the Update (the official SSCPS communication vehicle) at the end of each month.
- The Chair will coordinate all PA committee activities.
- The Chair is the official spokesperson for the PA and as such will make reports to the SSCPS Board of Trustees.
- The Chair will write a year-end report in May and submit it to the incoming Chairperson.

#### Vice Chair (VC)

- The VC will assist the Chair with meeting organization and appointment of chairs.
- The VC will write a year-end report in May and submit it to the incoming VCs.
- The VC will preside at meetings in the absence of the Chair or if the Chair decides to participate in discussion as a parent only.

#### **Secretary**

- The Secretary will take minutes of the meetings (to be approved at the subsequent meeting), post minutes, post meeting times, and reminders to the Executive Directors office for posting in the SSCPS Update.
- The Secretary will write a year-end report in May and submit it to the incoming Secretary.
- The Secretary will help the Chair write the monthly reports.

#### <u>Treasurer</u>

- The Treasurer will keep the books of the PA and make monthly reports to the PA.
- The Treasurer will manage the funds disbursement process.
- The Treasurer will write a year-end report in May and submit it to the incoming Treasurer.

#### Arts & Music Committee Chair

Acts as an advocate for all of the Arts in the school curriculum: drama, literature, music and visual arts. Sets up visiting artist schedules, art-related field trips, and works to find grants to fund arts in the school.

#### **Community Service Committee Chair**

Establishes and maintains ties between SSCPS and various community groups, with the purpose of guiding our students towards opportunities for fulfilling their community service requirements. Looks for grants to fund community service programs.

#### Fundraising & Events Committee Chair

Organizes the parent fundraising activities and social events at the school. Each event may have a separate leader to orchestrate activities.

#### Health & Safety Committee Chair

Guides the development of the health curriculum, safety policies and relations with various medical centers, adherence to related health laws, anti-smoking programs, drug prevention programs, medical policies and procedures.

#### Library Committee Chair

Participates in all aspects of maintaining the school's library, including ongoing management of the library collection, fundraising to acquire new materials, writing grants, supporting students and teachers in their use of the library, and participating in the creation of an expanded library/media center. The goals for this school year are to update the current collection using a new computerized cataloging system and to partner with community libraries to introduce library skills to our students.

#### Volunteer Coordinator Chair

Communicates interesting and rewarding opportunities to volunteer for our students and parents both inside and outside of our school. The Chair also manages the log book for volunteer hours.


#### Welcoming & Events Committee Chair
