FROM THE K-6 PRINCIPAL

On my way to school yesterday I looked for my friends the skunk cabbages on the edge of the Hingham Town Forest. I drove the back way to school in the hopes of seeing them and I was rewarded by a patch I have been watching over the last seven years. Skunk cabbage is a perennial that grows in wet places and is particularly apparent in the early spring as green leaves seemingly appear out of the brown of winter. I first became aware of skunk cabbage when I was 20 and living on a farm in the mountains of Virginia. It is a beautiful plant that is an indicator of spring as it rises out of the ground with great rapidity. You can see it change from day to day. My youthful experience of spending time outdoors on a farm as spring returned echoes with my time in the classroom as our annual lessons in spring at Holly Hill Farm were always anchored in the observation of the skunk cabbage. Yesterday I saw and participated in another sign of spring as Wardie Mannix taught some of her Level II music classes outside. These classes were outside because there were formative math assessments going on adjacent to the music room and it was just plain nice out. I went to see them at work and I was so pleased to hear them sing. One song that they were singing was "The Rainbow Connection" made famous by the Muppet Kermit. There is a line in the song that goes "*Is this the sweet sound that calls the young sailors?*" I asked the students if they knew what the line might be alluding to. A third or more of the hands shoot up and the student that I called on told us that the lyric was referring to the Sirens. A five minute conversation ensued about the "irresistible" quality to the Sirens' song, about the Odyssey and Greek myths and about art and how allusions to other works of art enrich our experience. It was so rewarding to see the students carrying their learning from second grade up into third and fourth grade. Now there is no way for me to know if the students were feeling the connection of Greek mythology to the Muppets before the question was asked. But what was apparent was that as soon as the question was asked, the quantity of hands and then the discussion clearly showed that they were ready for deep enjoyment. Certainly the sound of their voices outside was a sound of spring I enjoyed hearing.

There are more signs of spring all around us. The one that I follow the most closely is my own garden. From under a cold frame for the past two weeks we have been eating perennial arugula and this weekend I will need to thin the lettuce and spinach. For me April vacation is the time to fully immerse myself in the garden. At home after some intense lobbying I am going to expand our vegetable garden into the other parts of the front yard. I know that breaking the sod and building the soil will take some time to reach the quality of the ten year old garden on the other side but I look forward to the opportunity to have more space and to grow more food. I hope that you and your children have some time next week to explore the world outside. It is spring!!!

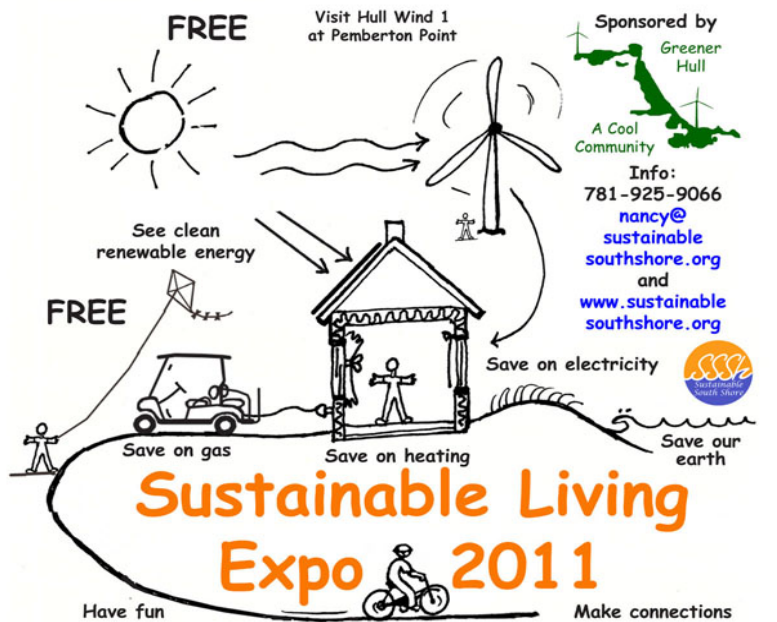

Parents Association Job Descriptions

Chair

- The Chair will have previously held a PA office or have attended a majority of the year's regular PA meetings.
- The Chair will plan the agenda and chair PA meetings.
- The Chair will have monthly meetings with the Executive Director to coordinate some of the PA activities and initiatives.
- The Chair will write a monthly report to the parents to be submitted to the Update (the official SSCPS communication vehicle) at the end of each month.
- The Chair will coordinate all PA committee activities.
- The Chair is the official spokesperson for the PA and as such will make reports to the SSCPS Board of Trustees.
- The Chair will write a year-end report in May and submit it to the incoming Chairperson.

Vice Chair (VC)

- The VC will assist the Chair with meeting organization and appointment of chairs.
- The VC will write a year-end report in May and submit it to the incoming VCs.
- The VC will preside at meetings in the absence of the Chair or if the Chair decides to participate in discussion as a parent only.

Secretary

- The Secretary will take minutes of the meetings (to be approved at the subsequent meeting), post minutes, post meeting times, and reminders to the Executive Directors office for posting in the SSCPS Update.
- The Secretary will write a year-end report in May and submit it to the incoming Secretary.
- The Secretary will help the Chair write the monthly reports.

Treasurer

- The Treasurer will keep the books of the PA and make monthly reports to the PA.
- The Treasurer will manage the funds disbursement process.
- The Treasurer will write a year-end report in May and submit it to the incoming Treasurer.

Arts & Music Committee Chair

Acts as an advocate for all of the Arts in the school curriculum: drama, literature, music and visual arts. Sets up visiting artist schedules, art-related field trips, and works to find grants to fund arts in the school.

Community Service Committee Chair

Establishes and maintains ties between SSCPS and various community groups, with the purpose of guiding our students towards opportunities for fulfilling their community service requirements. Looks for grants to fund community service programs.

Fundraising & Events Committee Chair

Organizes the parent fundraising activities and social events at the school. Each event may have a separate leader to orchestrate activities.

Health & Safety Committee Chair

Guides the development of the health curriculum, safety policies and relations with various medical centers, adherence to related health laws, anti-smoking programs, drug prevention programs, medical policies and procedures.

Library Committee Chair

Participates in all aspects of maintaining the school's library, including ongoing management of the library collection, fundraising to acquire new materials, writing grants, supporting students and teachers in their use of the library, and participating in the creation of an expanded library/media center. The goals for this school year are to update the current collection using a new computerized cataloging system and to partner with community libraries to introduce library skills to our students.

Volunteer Coordinator Chair

Communicates interesting and rewarding opportunities to volunteer for our students and parents both inside and outside of our school. The Chair also manages the log book for volunteer hours.

Welcoming & Events Committee Chair

Contacts families of new, incoming SSCPS students, to welcome them into the school community, and to provide them with information about the school and the Parents Association.

Grade Representatives K-12:

The role of the Grade Rep is to reach out to all families in his/her grade and serve as a personal link to the SSCPS Parents Association (PA). We hope that all parents will feel involved and connected to the ongoing events and issues in our school even if they are unable to attend the monthly PA meetings. Additional responsibilities include:

- Attending all monthly PA meetings.
- Serving as a conduit for thoughts, ideas, and concerns from families in his/her grade.
- Reporting each month on any happenings, events, or issues in his/her grade.
- Guiding parents in making appropriate connections to school staff and resources as needed.
- Answering questions not found in the "Update", SSCPS website, or other SSCPS documents.
- Being available as a resource to new families.

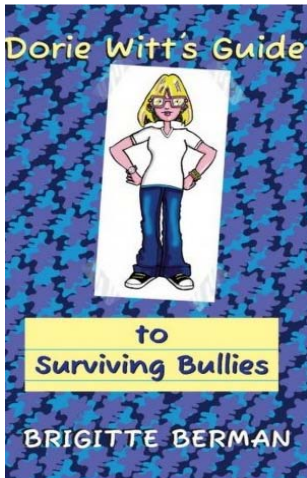
