FROM THE HEALTH OFFICE

Please remember to pick up your child's medication by the last day of school, any medication left in the health office will be disposed of or destroyed after this date. State mandated law requires new medication orders to be written by your child's PCP at the beginning of every school year, all current medication orders will expire on the last day of the school year. FROM THE K-6 PRINCIPAL

When I taught writing to second graders I always tried to get their pieces to be "round." I aspire to that in my own writing and at an attempt to round out my Updates I have included below a passage from every month this year. These words help me remember a wonderful year. Thank you for your children, for reading these accounts, and for believing in my favorite school in the world The South Shore Charter Public School.

September: I have also been talking to the children and they have told me that they like their new levels, but they have also acknowledged some longing for their past classrooms. To me the students sounded just the right mix of nostalgia for the past and excitement about their new positions and status. You have given us very composed and capable children and we are grateful.

October: The weather is turning cooler and it is coat season and I was reprimanded this morning by a Level I student for not wearing a coat as I did my daily sweeping. There are two parts of my day that are like anchors. In the morning the greeting of the students while I sweep, and the calling of names in the afternoon at dismissal. They both have to do with names and acknowledgment and while neither interaction is profound it can let me know how children are doing.

November: Yesterday our teachers were busy in professional development workshops. Professional development days can be a challenge for families as work schedules and routines are altered. We take our responsibility to use the professional development time wisely and as a school to assure that the learning and work that goes on during professional development days make our students' lives and education better.

December: Another thing that has come to an end is autumn and today is the first full day of winter. It is and has been winter from midnight last night until midnight tonight and there will be about ninety more days that meet that description before we have a day that is part winter and part spring. It really looks and feels like winter. The children have been enjoying the snow. Thanks for knowing the rules about snow clothing and what is required for the weather but do not forget to label your child's clothes with names as snow pants and hats look a lot alike. The snow is not only a thing that makes child's play more fun but it also adds refracted sun light that makes up for the shortness of the day and the acute angle of the sun. Snow is downright pretty.

January: Yesterday was the one-year anniversary of the earthquake in Haiti. At SSCPS we have many families with relatives in Haiti and the earthquake touched us all. Today in school we took a moment of silence to honor the spirit, courage, and perseverance which are helping to pull the families of Haiti through this horrible natural

disaster. The pain and suffering is unimaginable but from what can be seen of the Haitian strength, the will of people is stronger than any disaster and with time and continued support things will get better. We must not forget. May this year be a better year for the people of Haiti and for all of us who know and therefore love Haitians.

February: We have a wonderful building which is in good shape and is unscathed. Thanks go out to:

- Mark Flanagan, our maintenance director, who worked and works tirelessly to make sure that building is and will always be safe,
- Our students who were ready for an adventure and cooperated and somehow knew that last Thursday was a time for following directions no matter how unusual they were,
- Our teachers who seized the moment to read stories, direct student learning and respond to all situations with professionalism and grace,
- Our parents who allowed the unusualness of the situation to be yet another chance to respect and support us here at school,
- The folks who manned the phones at the front desk that day Pam Algera, Kathy Sobol, Dee Delaney and Jo Feldman.
- Alicia Savage who led us all with decisiveness and thoughtfulness,
- The firefighters and police of the Town of Norwell who took charged and treated us well and made excellent decisions,
- The Public Schools of Norwell, which took us in and gave us great digs and showed us kindness and generosity,
- There is one more person to thank and that is Mark Flanagan because I could not just thank him once.

"You hear so often how things don't work, but this thing, to me, worked like clockwork, almost like it was rehearsed," said Norwell Fire Chief, Andy Reardon. "I'm very pleased with the charter school and school district for being so cooperative."

March: Tradition and charter school in the same sentence. Sixteen years ago we were trying to break free from tradition and in fact we often refer to non charter public schools as traditional public schools. We are now sixteen years old and we have many traditions that have evolved and changed over time but their pattern has become very important to us. An important tradition that is going on right now are Exhibitions of Mastery, as our students work earnestly and bravely to present for their classmates, families and teachers. I have seen some and the teachers have told me how proud they are of their students and I could not agree more!

April: On my way to school yesterday I looked for my friends the skunk cabbage on the edge of the Hingham Town Forest. I drove the back way to school in the hopes of seeing them and I was rewarded by a patch I have been watching over the last seven years. Skunk cabbage is a perennial that grows in wet places and is particularly apparent in the early spring as green leaves seemingly appear out of the brown of winter. I first became aware of skunk cabbage when I was 20 and living on a farm in the mountains of Virginia. It is a beautiful plant that is an indicator of spring as it rises out of the ground with great rapidity. You can see it change from day to day.

May: On Monday May 2^{nd} I saw the future of the South Shore Charter School – and it is bright. It happens every year here, we got a new crop of Kindergartners and we send out a group of seniors. It is part of a cycle that repeats itself year after year because we have the privilege of being a K-12 school. On Monday a group of twelve incoming Kindergartners came to visit and we welcomed them and their families into the school. More than half of our incoming K's are siblings of enrolled students and many of these children and families know us and we know them but it was great to spend two hours together. Last year for the first time we had spring intake sessions with families. These sessions help us welcome our new students, complete a state mandated screening, and begin planning for next year, but most importantly they are a chance to meet our future seniors and begin the remarkable journey that is a South Shore Charter School education.

June: The big event is on Saturday. All graduation ceremonies are important events but SSCPS graduation is my favorite graduation ceremony. I have been to almost all of the first fifteen and I am excited to be at the sixteenth. What makes these events so significant for me is the chance to hear the stories of the graduates told by the graduates themselves in their own distinct voices. We are a small school and there were many years where our graduation class was very small and all of the graduates spoke. The tradition of seniors telling their own story, because they had voice not because they were selected by the school, is an important tradition here at SSCPS.

Any senior who wants to share their own story with the guests got up and told us all. I am excited to hear the stories of maturation and appreciation that I know I will hear on Saturday. When the seniors talk on Saturday they deliver the most powerful message as to why our school is here, why the work of its teachers, founding families, and graduates is worth it. They tell the stories of their lives. Please come on Saturday and I believe your commitment to our school will be redoubled. I know mine is every year.

Thank you for your children and for all of the faith that you put in us. I love my job, your children and our school.
