7-12 Principal's Report



Last Thursday and Friday Jared Rose, Mary Carter and I joined our Senior class on an overnight Senior Retreat at Camp Burgess in Sandwich. This was our first year of a trip we hope to turn into an annual tradition. The schedule for the two days combined organized activities with open recreation, archery, kayaking, and canoeing. We ended our evening on Thursday with a flashlight-less night hike and a campfire.

During the structured portion of the trip, the Seniors participated in a series of team activities designed to encourage leadership skills and cooperation. On the low ropes

course students were given a variety of challenges to overcome that required them to work together to come up with a plan and effectively execute it. For example, groups of eight students were asked to come up with a way to get every member of the group to walk across a tightrope with the support of only a rope, line up on the opposite end and remain standing as a group while singing "Row, Row, Row, Your Boat." What really struck us was the way that our students persevered in the face of challenges and supported one another. Everyone was willing to try and with help from one another everyone succeeded. It was incredibly rewarding as an educator to see our



students bring together their interpersonal skills, problem-solving techniques, and leadership abilities in their pursuit of a goal and enjoy it. The performance of our students provided me with further evidence that SSCPS gives students an education that goes far beyond academics.

One of the things that I most enjoy about my job is hearing from the outside world what I already know; our students are outstanding. Before we left the camp on Friday afternoon one of the staff members who worked with us over the two days came up to our cabins to see us off. She explained to me that our group was incredibly impressive and had been "a breath of fresh air" after weeks of difficult student groups. She described our students as being well-behaved, willing to try, and a pleasure to be around. I couldn't agree more.

The retreat provided our Seniors with time to come together as a class and to strengthen their community as they enter their final year with us. Our hope is that they will use the skills that they honed last week to help them lead not only the High School, but the school as a whole as we continue to develop as a seamless K-12 school. The Senior Retreat is just one example of how our students and faculty K-12 are working to strengthen our community. Throughout the building activities like Town Meeting, Community Meeting, Advisory, and Open Circle, as well as initiatives that teachers take in their individual classrooms help bring our students together. While academic achievement remains our most important goal, I am proud to be part of a school where students learn to support each other, work together, and persevere.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN WORKSHOPS & PROJECTS

The Level IV Conservation Project this year is going to be filled with activities. The GLOBE project is when we go to ponds or beaches to test the water and post the results on the GLOBE website. There are results from ponds and parts of the ocean from all over the world. We are also doing the turtle project. We are trying to repopulate turtles. To do so we will be raising young turtles in the classroom. In addition to other field trips where we explore animal and plant habitats, we will also be reading "Under The Sea-Wind" by Rachel Carson. This book provides an accurate and descriptive narration of organisms in their natural habitat.

Level IV's **Literary Magazine Project** is back again! This year there are some changes. Not only can students submit short stories and poems, they can also now submit drawings for a new artwork section and essays for an editorial section. Submission envelopes will be hung around the school in Levels I through IV and throughout the hallways. Teachers are welcome to collect BIG piles of student work and pass it into the Literary Magazine Project. Anything submitted will be of help to complete the first edition of the 2010-2011 Literary Magazine for January. Any questions, come to room 202 or talk to Rachel Jones on Level IV.

A revived **Animals and the Environment Workshop** returns this year to the High School with new projects, environmental reading, and rigorous discussion. Students in small groups have chosen specific topics and have created year long projects surrounding their interests. Each project was designed to fit under the topics of animals, agriculture, medicine, or environment. Some focuses of such projects include veterinary medicine and technicians, zoo careers, hydroponics, forensics science, the Veggie Van and more. In addition to individual ventures, workshop students are reading *In Defense of Food* written by Michael Pollan and *Animals Matter* written by Marc Bekoff & Jane Godall. The important issues brought up in the books are being discussed with Jonny Belber and Tara Turner. Outside of the classroom students are participating in outings to Holly Hill Farm in Cohasset, Briarwood Marine Research Center in the Buzzard Bay area, and Sauchuk Family Farm in Plympton. Other upcoming workshop events include a Veggie Van appearance at the second annual Harvest Run at Wompatuck State Park on October 16.
