## K-6 Principal's REPORT

Schools are complex entities with competing needs and reasons for being; in short they are complicated. With our new mission statement the South Shore Charter Public School can both express our aspirations and focus our attention with one phrase, "Inspiring every student to excel in academics, service and life." It is so helpful to me to be able to say that and think about what we do in such a compressed form. Are we doing all that we can to inspire? Are we doing all that we can to inspire every student? Are we inspiring in academics? Are we inspiring in service? Are we inspiring in life? These are high goals that we have set for ourselves but the fact is that we are not doing these things alone. It is the students; it is the teachers; it is all of the support staff, who makes the school operational; it is the families, who trust us with their children; and it is the belief that learning and purpose and joy can inspire.

I know that I was inspired yesterday by the folks who attended and taught a workshop, for school administrators, in the Open Circle curriculum. The folks at the training gave me increased confidence in all the public schools in Massachusetts. These professionals all had a common purpose - the happiness and accomplishment of children. There were three individuals I met at the meeting who had a particular influence on me. One was a principal of a small school $\mathrm{K}-5$ school with an attached pre-school. We talked about the parent drive to make this the school for their children and how they had worked to include the fifth grade this year. We also talked about the benefit of being a small school. He was such a calm and practical man and part of his inspiration was his biography as his father had been a custodian in the same district he was now a principal. I also met two educators from another charter school and while all of the educators that I met were smart committed and dedicated people, these two had a focused vision about what they were doing that seemed a little different. I talked with them afterward about what it meant to be in a charter school in Massachusetts and what an important part of improving the education for all students, charter schools can be and have been. I was also inspired by the trainers and it is outside consultants like those from Wellesley College who work to improve the life at school for students. They have been dedicated to make sure teachers have the tools to support students’ social and emotional learning. It is no wonder that Massachusetts students do well when compared to students from other states.

We have been training teachers in Open Circle for the past ten years and this work is very important. The idea of Open Circle is that we need to teach children how to interact with each other and that if we take the time to be explicit and use common language to communicate with children and with each other we will be a more successful community. I am particularly pleased with the conduct of the students this year. One thing I learned yesterday was that the typical pattern of behavior in a school is that as the year goes on there is more conflict among children and while Open Circle does not eliminate conflict it does keep conflict at a steady state. Our mission states that we want to inspire students to excel in life and what that means to me is that we value the student years as being as significant as any years in a life. When we invest in our students' social and emotional growth we are investing in our mission. I look forward to learning more about Open Circle and sharing with you its philosophy of "getting to the heart of learning."

## Green Initiatives

We are sending a team from the school on October 24th, 25th, and 26th to the Green Schools National Conference in Minneapolis, MN. Kristine Shipps, Sarah Roberts and Mark Flanagan will be representing the school and its green initiatives.

They will be returning to the school with a strategic plan for the green initiatives for our school. The bus should be coming in November, until ICA Bus Company is able to give us a date for the arrival of the bus, we are frozen in what we will be able to do with planning and public relations. We have an event we would like to plan, however, due to the unknown day of arrival, we know we have to develop a secondary plan as well.

## MCAS

Three weeks ago we learned that the Commonwealth had given us a commendation for moving the most students into the Advanced and Proficient categories. We are now in the interesting place of determining what it is we need to modify, without changing what has been working so well. The Boston Globe has compiled its annual MCAS rankings and released the rankings to the public on September 22nd.

We were very pleased to see that South Shore Charter Public School ranked 11th in the state in 10th Grade Mathematics with a score of 97 . This means we ranked higher in tenth grade mathematics than all other schools in our sending districts. The tenth graders who took the exam in May are now eleventh grade students who will be taking the PSAT one week from today.

## Singapore Math

The New York Times recently published an article, Making Math Lessons as Easy as 1, Pause, 2, Pause... This article discusses the theory and methodology behind the Singapore math curriculum and why so many schools and districts have adopted the program. Although the article does not go into detail about the system of explaining mathematical concepts, how students gain mathematical fluency, or how it differs from other math programs, the article does provide an engaging overview through anecdotal information. As Singapore math is the curriculum used at SSCPS in grades K-6, we found the article to be worthwhile reading. If you would like to learn more about your child's math program, there will be a Singapore math information session tomorrow evening at 6:30.
