K-6 PRINCIPAL REPORT

Next week we will be celebrating Thanksgiving and the first quarter of the school year has passed. While I am still harvesting lettuce from my cold frame at home, it is the season for gathering seaweed and repairing and recharging the soil. I have had a garden for almost all of the past forty years. In that time my view of gardening has changed and though I love the harvesting, the digging, the weeding and the eating, my principle goal is now the soil. I want to have the best soil I can have. I know that in order to do that I need to put more into the soil in the form of compost and seaweed than I take out in crops. I care a great deal about this little piece of earth and last week a neighbor lost control of their car and drove up into my garden. They were not hurt and though there was a little damage to a rock wall and the cold frame, there was only minor compaction to the soil. There was no oil spill or spilled antifreeze. I rebuilt the cold frame, a little better than it was before, and felt how lucky we were that no one was hurt and the dirt was still healthy. Now that is something for which I am grateful.

So what is the soil of a school? Hard to know, and no direct analogy is clear to me but there is so much that I am grateful for here at school. The most important daily gratitude is for the joy and energy I see in the children every morning, most of them happy to be coming into school, to see their friends and to learn. Yesterday I was helping out in Velma Begley's classroom with the first graders' globes. Helping out as well were three parents. Now without the effort of so many parents over so many years we could not have the first graders making globes for the past sixteen years. Maybe we could have done it for a year but not for sixteen; it is just too much work. But volunteering here does more than help children and enrich their lives, it helps build community. As we put on continents the parents and I talked. One parent told me of how wonderful our first grade is and another told me of her pleasure in hearing her first grade son talk to her everyday about the facts he had learned at school. Now that is a joy, to hear about what your child has learned in school every day. I know that every time I am in Velma's classroom I learn something and it is apparent that the children are learning too. Perhaps the soil of a school is the traditions that get built up and the people who foster and support them. Certainly the volunteers that make this possible are something for which I am grateful.

Another tradition of SSCPS, which might be the soil of our school, is Project. I know a Project is successful when the students are talking about it all the time. This year whenever I go into Level III on a Project afternoon I can feel the energy. One day I saw a former Level III student elated after going back to Level III

to teach an acting lesson. I was told by others with even more joy about the completion of a Rube Goldberg machine. Two weeks ago we had a Professional Development afternoon and the students tried to convince the teachers that they needed to rearrange the schedule and have Project on Monday because Tuesday was going to be a day off for them. I asked a Level III student what her favorite day of the week was and she said Tuesday. I asked why and the child said because we have P.E. and Project on Tuesday. I know from talking to my adult children that a part of their Charter School experience that has helped them later on in life is the planning and student-led work they did in Project. In Project we have all of the students write reflections about their work. Here are some of their journal entries:

"...The last important job is tech, they are making a website for our Project. We all work very hard to keep Project running smoothly."

In another Project journal a student wrote, "Soon we'll be able to practice our real play for this year. I'm so excited! We're going to do "Dowap Wittle Wed Widing Wood!" (a version of Little Red Riding Hood).

The significant words/phrases for me in these children's writing are "important," "work very hard" and "excited." Perhaps Project is part of our soil here at SSCPS and these students are putting in the nutrients that will turn into a crop in the form of valuable community work and skills for life. Now if we are making a rich soil of community and students invested in their own collective work, that is soil for which I am grateful.
