PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

As we complete the March round of MCAS exams and the April vacation quickly approaches we are at the time of year when our Seniors begin the process of moving on to the next stage in their lives. Last week I had the opportunity to listen to students present the arguments that they are working on for their Senior Debates. The Senior Debate is a culminating project for the Ethics course and a graduation requirement. Since the founding of the school the Senior Debate has been an exit standard. For students who have completed years of presentations through Exhibitions of Mastery and class assignments, the Senior Debate is a chance to bring that work all together. The debate is an exercise in logic and rhetoric that requires students to support and develop arguments while they work on a team, skills crucial to success in college and in the workplace. Students are put on teams, assigned positions and tasked with researching and preparing for their presentations based on a topic they choose as a group. This year's Senior Debates will be held on April 10th and 11th.

Over the next two weeks twelfth graders will hear from the remaining colleges on their lists. Our Seniors are left with tough decisions to make as they choose where they will continue their educations from an impressive list of options. In addition to gaining acceptance, many schools have provided our students with substantial financial support. This is a terrific group!

April 13th marks Seniors' final day at SSCPS as they wrap up their last round of final exams as high school students. Following the April vacation twelfth graders will not return to school and instead will spend the fourth quarter out on Senior Project internships. Mary Carter our guidance counselor has worked tirelessly with our students to match their interests with internship opportunities in the community. We are grateful for the parents at all levels and for the faculty members who have provided leads for potential internships. At the end of the internship period prior to graduation Seniors write a paper describing their experience and present their work to a team of faculty members and to their peers. Senior Projects allow students to get a feel for fields that they are interested in and for the working world. Consistently I am impressed with the work that our students do outside of this building. I'm looking forward to hearing about their experiences come May.

On a different note, last Saturday was the first Massachusetts Charter School Athletic Association (MCSAO) All-Star basketball game. Two of our student athletes, Marven Alcindor and Nicole Newcomb, were selected by the coaches as all-league nominations from this prior season. I've included below some comments about Marven from his coach, Joe Kay, and about Nicole from her coach, Jenn Johnson.

"Marven Alcindor has been a leader on and off the court. On the court, Marven can be seen as the best player on the court in most games. He averaged around 18 points per game, while grabbing nearly ten boards a game. His defensive tenacity produced many steals and blocks, and his athleticism excited many crowds through his fast break dunks. Off the court, Marven is a model student and a positive role model for his teammates for underclassmen at SSCPS. He is respected by all his teachers and by the administration. Marven gave South Shore Charter School a chance to compete in every game. This year Marven was voted to the All-Conference Second Team. This means he was recognized as one of the top ten players in the league as voted on by the coaches and athletic directors."

"Nicole is not only a phenomenal, hard-working athlete, but she is also an exemplary teammate. She supports her team as well as gives her strongest effort in all challenges, on and off the court. Rather than focusing on negatives, Nicole focuses on how she can make herself and her team better basketball players. She is an integral part of our basketball team and a strong leader. Nicole is an example of the kind of player any coach would want to have on their team."

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN WORKSHOPS AND PROJECTS?

Green Building Workshop

In the Green Building workshop, students have been conducting a water audit. We have taken an inventory of all the water-using fixtures in the school, including sinks, toilets, dishwashers, etc. and found out how much water they use. We found that if we flushed all the toilets plus ran all the sinks in the school for one minute, it would use nearly 75 gallons of water. This information combined with information about how people use water at the school will help us make recommendations to save water.

High School Design and Engineering Workshop

On Thursday, March 22nd, the High School Design and Engineering Workshop hosted a field trip for the high school students. The Design and Engineering workshop was invited to attend the kick off event for the NASCAR STEM Initiative program, "The Student Racing Challenge". The workshop was hosted by Solidworks Software, NASCAR, Ten 80 Education, MIT, and the United States Army. The program encompasses student initiative and success in STEM academia through project based learning and student racing series. Ten 80 Education's focus on the program was to incorporate the STEM curriculum into an interactive program using scale model RC race cars that can be related to the components of NASCAR race cars. The students follow a year long, interactive curriculum that is science, technology, engineering, and math based, as well as enter races and competitions that focus on individual and team efforts. Students master components in science, technology, engineering, math, as well as learn the fundamentals of auto mechanics, marketing, and sponsorship. All students that attended the field trip are optimistic about starting a racing team for next year. The Student Racing Challenge offers many opportunities for our students to grow and develop as individuals and team players, as well as succeed in STEM.

Level IV Projects have been working to produce pieces for the auction that represent each project. Students have brainstormed ideas, and after some help acquiring materials or instruction on how to form the object, some really creative pieces have been put together by Level IV. The Repertory Theater Project will be donating decorated ceramic tiles, Helping Hands is offering 3 hours of work and Sailing, Students and the Sea

is creating oval shaped braided doormats using the "Ocean Plat" knot, which is a flat knot suitable for rugs and other decorative purposes as well as practical applications on boats. We also have a seedling herb garden and sketchbook with original drawings from the Conservation Project and A Healthy You is contributing a unique mosaic garden piece! We look forward to seeing you on March 30th at the auction where you can view and perhaps purchase these fabulous Level IV pieces.

FROM THE HEALTH OFFICE

8th Grade Health Screenings will be taking place this week and next week. Please contact the health office if you do not want your child to participate in the vision, hearing, height, weight or postural screening.

There have been several cases of Coxsackie virus (hand, foot, and mouth syndrome) in the school population. Coxsackie virus is a mild viral disease, symptoms include fever, sore throat, stomach pain, diarrhea and a rash of tiny blisters on the palms, feet and in the mouth. The virus is contagious before symptoms begin so *unfortunately* staff and students have already been exposed by the time the illness is discovered. The rash often appears after the fever and physical symptoms have passed, your child may come to school with the rash if feeling well enough to attend. The best prevention is hand washing after using the bathroom and before eating or handling food. Please notify the Heath office if your child develops these symptoms.

Tick Season: Due to the warm weather the ticks are out early. Please remember to check your children every day for ticks. We will be keeping all children out of the wooded areas during the school day. If a tick is found and removed on your child at school, you will be notified. Please contact me with any questions or concerns.

Sunscreen: Please remember to apply sunscreen to your child before school as most children will be spending time outdoors during the warm weather.

Lice: There have been four recent cases of lice in the school. Please remember to have your child's hair pulled up and back. If your child develops symptoms, itchy scalp, please check for nits / lice or send to the health office for screening. Also please report all cases to the school nurse, this will help alleviate the spread by checking classmates.
