## **PRINCIPAL'S REPORT**

Last Saturday night I was at a dinner party where I was asked by a woman how creative the graduates of the South Shore Charter Public school were. I then went on and on about our graduates and their creative endeavors. I talked about the new D.J. entrepreneur, the opera singer, the photographers, the students at Berklee, the graduate who just got into The Center of Cartoon Studies and the resilient and compassionate students who have gone through and built our school. Jean White of Holly Hill Farm was at the same party and perhaps because she was there I began to explain why I thought our school helps develop creative people. I started with my own experience as a teacher bringing kids to Holly Hill Farm and the openness of that experience. I told a story about this year's sophomores back when they were in second grade. The students were on their last day at the farm after three years of visits. It was a big day for them and we spent most of the day at the farm as part of the process of leaving Level I and moving on in school. We, as was the typical routine, split into two groups. I, as always, stayed in the garden and worked with a group of about ten students while the other ten were off roaming and learning and exploring at the farm with one of the Holly Hill folks and Sharon Stuart. On this extended visit the second graders all came back and insisted that I had to leave the garden and see something. They needed to show me their land; they had to show me their place. Holly Hill Farm was not a place they visited; it was their farm. That is the beauty of project-based, place-based learning. That day they took me to the cliff above Holly Hill's Ice Pond and as we looked down it was a view as memorable to me as the top of Mt. Marcy or Mt. Katahdin. They were leading me.

At the party, after talking for about ten minutes on the virtues of our school and the way the structure of both our classes and projects builds the repertoire of experiences needed to be creative in the life of students, I asked the woman why she asked the question. Why did she want to know about the creativity of our students? She said simply that creativity is supposed to be the most important quality in the hiring of workers. She wanted to find out how we were doing in what she thought of as a crucial quality for our country's future.

In the past weeks we have had conversations with families about each Level and what our plans are for the future. In these conversations I have heard some worry that the particular sequence of instruction is not providing the appropriate amount of rigor for our students. I write this Update piece not just to brag but also to try to articulate why the mix of independent and group work and introspection through course work and life experience is working. I see it working for my own older children who have received a "Charter School" education and in our graduates.

Congratulations to Amy Vandenberg and the Garden Project students as they just received word that they were awarded a Whole Kids Foundation and FoodCorps for a School Garden grant. It is not only our students and graduates who are entrepreneurial. It is our teachers.
