This level of scholarship is difficult to attain. Our students, parents, and faculty should be recognized for the tremendous amount of effort inherent to this accomplishment. These students have not only achieved high academic honors within their senior class, but within their sending districts as well. In a traditional district school, students who perform at the top 25 percent of their class receive this scholarship. As a charter school, our students are eligible by being in the top 25 percent of their class, or in the top 25 percent of their sending district's senior class. In the class of 2012 over 35 percent of our students have been awarded this opportunity. We are very proud that once again, our students have achieved at this high level and now reside at the top of their sending districts as well.

Not enough can be said about our faculty. From our Kindergarten classrooms to Advanced Placement Calculus, our faculty continues to work hard moving our children forward. Every day they relentlessly beat a path to that door - they research, collaborate, invigorate, persevere, and most importantly, believe that every student can achieve. Congratulations and thank you. ## What's Happening in Projects \& Workshops!

In the Level IV S ${ }^{3}$ (Students, Sailing, and the Sea), we have been researching the Cape Wind Project, a 130 turbine wind farm proposed for Nantucket Sound. Through research with the iPads our students decided if they supported or were against the project. We then went on to have an organized debate on the topic, which consisted of an introduction, a rebuttal, answering questions, and a summary/conclusion. ## PRINCIPAL's REPORT

Next Tuesday night November 8 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ from 6:00-7:00 PM we will have Singapore Math Night for Levels I, II and III families. We very much hope you can come and visit with your child's math teacher. On Math Night we will describe and explain how we teach math here at SSCPS. We have had Math Night three times before and every time we have invited families the response of those who attend has been very grateful. For next Tuesday night we would like to have at least six adults for every teacher. Please tell your friends to come to Math Night!!!!

On Monday morning I heard strains of Bach organ music coming from the music room. I had to go in and hear for myself. Wardie Mannix is an organist and she was sharing the sound of Bach organ music with the children when inspiration struck. She reached out to Ralph "Rio" DeGennaro, our new IT director, for help as the organ is both a visual and an aural experience. In a matter of moments Rio had the room connected
to the internet and pictures of some of the world's great organists playing some of the great organs were there for all of us to see. It was inspiring as we saw the organists playing these instruments that were whole environments. There were huge pipes and multiple keyboards, hundreds of stops, the pedals, and oh, the sculptures that put Walt Disney to shame!!! As the small children reveled in the experience I heard a girl say as she watched the coordination of the organist's feet and hands, "It would take twenty years to learn that." No wonder there is an expression regarding wisdom coming from "the mouths of babes." Thanks to Wardie and Rio and children as it is always good to be learning. I sure learned on Monday.

Yesterday at a coffee a parent challenged a statement I made that said we do not want the children to be stressed in the process of learning. She was right to challenge me as there is a need for the right kind of stress. This morning as I was swimming I was thinking about athletic training. I am a swimmer and in the summer I swim with a coach whose work I think about all winter. I know that I will get coached again next summer. One thing I learned last summer was about the balance between aerobic practice and anaerobic practice. Now, I am far from an expert but my understanding is that in aerobic practice you are building up strength and work at a steady pace. This is very good for you but for further improvement you need to push yourself beyond that steady state and go into an anaerobic state. Learning is like that. Sometimes we should push our students and ourselves in an aerobic way with not too much stress. We need aerobic practice to build up strength. But other times we need to push harder and increase the stress. I love the feedback that we get from parents as it forces me to go into that anaerobic state. Keep pushing us and making us better. Getting better feels good and is worth being challenged so that we too have just the right level of stress!
