## Safety Measures at SSCPS

The safety of students, faculty and staff are of utmost importance at SSCPS. Over the past few weeks the school’s Crisis Team has been collaborating with the Norwell Police Department to plan for a critical incident drill. This drill, in addition to fire drills, is part of our routine safety procedures and protocols. Our last critical incident drill was in October 2009 and went smoothly and securely. Our faculty, including new faculty, have been preparing for this year's drill. We will be conducting this same practice critical incident drill in December.

The purpose of the critical incident drill is to familiarize students, faculty, and staff with lock down procedures should there ever be an emergency in the building. During this drill all classrooms and offices will be secured. Students, faculty, staff, and all others in the building at that time will remain in secured areas. All visitors, including parents, in the building at the time of the drill are required to remain in a secured area until the lock down exercises conclude.

As outlined in the Student Handbook on page 26, students are not allowed to carry cell phones on their persons from 8:15 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. This must be adhered to in order to be compliant with lock down protocols. Students should not use cell phones to make calls or text during the drill. Cell phone use during a real emergency can cause police response lines to overload thus impeding rescue efforts.

It is imperative that students take this drill seriously. Please talk to your child about the importance of this drill and following the directions of our faculty. If you have concerns about your child's level of stress or anxiety during the drill, please contact the school immediately. It is imperative that your child feel safe and secure at all times. This drill serves as an important tool to prepare our students, faculty, and staff for an emergency situation within our building in the unlikely event that one would ever occur.
