PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

In the Principal's Update I try to give a sense of the goings on here at SSCPS and every day there are many events that are worthy of documentation and reporting but only a few get written about. I choose what to write about by picking out events that are emblematic of our work here at SSCPS. Usually I write about teachers and how they do such inspiring work but today I will write about the actions of students.

The Monday before last, one of my fifth grade math FIT groups was in the library for math class and we were casting about for things to do and came up with the idea that we ought to estimate the number of books in the library. I gave a little lesson on how I thought it best to estimate the books and we decided to have a contest to see who could come up with the closest estimate. The fifth graders diligently estimated the number of books and we thought that right after class we would ask Bev Bruce, our reading specialist and staff library guru, how many books we had in the library. Well it turns out we did not have an actual count of the books but that Bev had made an estimate and it was around 6,000 books. For the fifth graders, the estimate did not qualify as a precise enough figure; there was no way to know who had actually made the best estimate since we only had another estimate to compare. I did not think much more about this problem until the group met again this Monday and the students wanted to know who had the best estimate.

The saying is that "an elephant never forgets" but it seems to me it should be amended to say "a fifth grader never forgets." The only way to solve the problem was to count the books ourselves.

We went in as a team with yellow stickies and counted and posted the number of books on every shelf. That took all FIT time but the students were not satisfied. They wanted the total so I got the adding machine with a tape from our bookkeeper Linda Weldon and gave advice as to how to use a team approach to make the tally. With over a hundred figures to sum I insisted that they needed two counts that were identical to be sure we had an accurate count. When I went to check on the group they explained a wonderfully elaborate team approach that was much more inclusive and egalitarian that the one I had suggested but had only run the numbers once and were halfway through their second tally when they ran out of time. Yesterday morning three of the group completed the task using Excel, and Excel sorting, and yellow sticky sorting, and missing yellow stickies, and all kinds of other complications. With the group now able to show that the tally was accurate and the inputs were error free we are proud to report that there were 7,054 books in the library on Monday. This is the count of the books that were actually in the library that day. There are other books out in circulation so our total book count is even higher than that.

There were many things that pleased me about the exercise of estimating and then counting the library books. Here a few bulleted points:

- When it looked as though we might need to repeat the task because of missing slips, (solved through reading the tape after sorting the data from largest to smallest, and discovering the missing figures), the amazing attitude of the students, their joy in the work and their willingness to do it all over again.
- Bev's encouragement and compliments about our work and her telling us how pleased she was to have a more accurate count of the books in the library.
- The most significant joy I felt was in having over 7,000 books in our library.
- One last thing, it turned out my estimate was the closest to the total! Now it may seem odd than an adult would be proud to be more accurate than a group of fifth graders but those folks don't know how outstanding these fifth graders are.

We as a school want to send out compliments to all of the folks who have worked on our library over these past years, over 7,000 quality and labeled books, wow.
