### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Over the past six weeks we have had Parent Coffees for the four Levels and the High School. Several years ago, we designed the Coffees with families, the Principals, and the Level Coordinators, to be times when we would discuss the proposed changes for the following year and as a time when we could gather feedback about how the current year was going for families. We found that there were two important audiences for these meetings, families of students who in the following year would be new to the Level and families with students in the first year of the Level. In today's Update I will be giving a short summary of three of the Coffees for Levels I, II, and III. I want to thank Velma Begley, Krista Cafourek, Kristin Waldron, Joyce Dandrow, and Mac Haran for the work they have done with and for me this past year. I know that they have also done work with and for you, your students and their faculty, but this is an opportunity for me to publicly thank them for what they have done for me – it has been immense.

The Level Coordinators were great in the Coffees, as they are everyday. They know their colleagues, they know their students, they know their subjects and they know their Levels backwards and forwards. This year, as I told the Board of Trustees at the May meeting, we have made only minor changes for next year. I then said I hoped this was because we were getting close to getting it right and not that we were getting complacent. In the Coffees there was not much to describe in the way of change but there was great conversation and very useful ideas were generated which the Level Coordinators and I will be bringing to our colleagues.

<u>Level I</u>: There will be very little change on Level I next year and the big news is that Kassandra has had her babies and she is planning to be back next year. She will be working a four day week and I will be the teacher in the class on the fifth day and supported by Melissa Freitas who will be there every day. We will be adding some additional student teaching time with two very valuable and experienced teachers. Both Bev Bruce and Emily Lincoln will be working for an additional four hours a week with students on Level I. Bev will be teaching reading and Emily will do a variety of things to support student learning in ways that only a trained artist can. It is wonderful that we will be able to give our youngest students even more adult

help from two such talented people. Emily's time is purely additional while Bev's time will be replacing the time Donovan Fauvelle spent on Level I this year. We are reducing second grade math to two sections to match the number of sections in first and third grades. We will also be starting F.I.T. (Focused Instructional Time) with the first and second graders. Two years ago we introduced F.I.T. on Levels II and III and this year we brought F.I.T. to Kindergarten and grades 7 -12. Next year we will be bringing F.I.T. to Level I for several mornings a week. Velma and I explained at the Coffee that we do not yet know exactly how that will be worked into the schedule, but that it will allow us to give students more targeted instruction and will also be a great opportunity for parents to volunteer.

**Level II**: There are no plans for a change in staff or schedule on Level II so we did not have any changes to talk about. Below are excerpts from an e-mail I wrote to a Level II parent who was not able to attend, which describes the Coffee.

The meeting was attended by about 18 moms, they were all women except for me. We opened with the news that next year on Level II the schedule and staffing are expected to be just as they are this year. This does not happen often.

We went into an in-depth description of Project on Level II and the school as a whole. There was affirmation of Project as well as an explanation of the group or collective function of Project. That function is to give students a chance to work on something important as a group where they have some choice and control. It helps give them the chance to see the effect their work can have on the larger community. One parent came up to me and said the Kristin's explanation of Project was so good she wished we had videotaped it so all could see it.

We then went into a discussion of F.I.T. There were several moms who run F.I.T. groups and they expressed the satisfaction that comes from running a F.I.T. group. We seek even more volunteer leaders for next year and there was a comment that they could work outside of your own Level.

We talked about how over time the effectiveness of a team improves as the adults get to know each other better and can communicate more effectively and to prove it Krista always knew what I was going to say before I said it.

There was a discussion about how to make the teaching that goes on in science class as preparation for the Science Exhibition of Mastery more explicit to facilitate communication.

It was a very nice and encouraging meeting.

**Level III**: We began with a discussion about Mac Haran and why she needed to take a medical leave of absence for the remainder of the year. Everyone expressed how we all wished Mac well and are looking forward to her return. Mac's leave is an investment in our school's future as she is such a creative force and has done a great deal to help us improve.

Level III, like Level II, is making no change in schedule but there are some minor staffing changes. Donovan Fauvelle will be working exclusively on Level III. He will now be available to teach a F.I.T. His dedicated presence on Level III will simplify the math schedule. Donovan and Ben will teach all of the math classes and all of the students will have three small group math classes per week and two full size math classes a week. Bev Bruce will no longer be teaching reading but instead Claire Overlee, who is an Orton-Gillingham trained reading teacher, will ably take over that role during F.I.T. We talked about volunteers running F.I.T. groups and we even had a parent volunteer to run a series of outside-of-school socials.

We ended the meeting with a discussion about the transition from Level III to Level IV. There was good conversation about how it was a different experience for kids. We got good feedback and in fact I used that feedback yesterday when a teacher and I talked to a sixth grader who had not followed a rule about getting ready for Level IV. In school there is an important balance between thinking of the present schooling as preparation for future tasks and in learning for the present needs and joys. These Coffees give us

wonderful information that helps continue to refine our balance. Thanks to all of the parents who gave us such valuable information and support at the Coffees.

I hope that the lack of planned change is because we are getting closer to where we want to be, not because of complacency. I am counting on you to tell me if you believe this is so. *Ted Hirsch thirsch@sscps.org*

### **High School Track Performs Well in Their Second Meet**

The SSCPS High School track team competed in their second meet of the season at Madison Park High School on May 15<sup>th</sup>. The Jaguar runners delivered another impressive performance. The boys and girls both finished second out of seven schools. Some of the top performers for the boys were: Chad Bruce finished 2<sup>nd</sup> in the 200, Jerome Sullivan finished third in the 200, Kaissac Griffin finished 1<sup>st</sup> in the 800, Paul Sullivan finished 3<sup>rd</sup> in the 1600 and 5<sup>th</sup> in the 800, Ian Wright finished 2<sup>nd</sup> in the 400. Tyler Johnston finished 3<sup>rd</sup> in the 400, David Benoit finished 4<sup>th</sup>in the 400, and the 4x100 relay team of Darius Anderson, Wright, Jerome Sullivan, and Chad Bruce finished 2<sup>nd</sup>. Other notable performers: Jacob Gray in the 200, Tyler Tsang in the 100, Jacob Gray in the 200, and Liam Hartz in the 800, whose time improved six seconds from the previous meet. The Girls team improved from their previous finish of third to finish second overall. The team was led by speedy freshman Melissa Theodore, who finished 1<sup>st</sup>in the 100 and 2<sup>nd</sup> in the 200. Other girls that placed were: Jessie Lutts finished 5<sup>th</sup> in the 100, Courtney Barry finished 3<sup>rd</sup> in the 800, Christine Nwafor finished 2<sup>nd</sup> in the 400, and the 4x100 relay team comprised of Theodore, Lutts, Nwafor, and Abby Cerilli finished third. Jessica Guerrier also contributed to the team effort by running a solid 100. Congratulations to all the runners and good luck to the Jaguars as they have their third meet on Wednesday, May 22<sup>nd</sup>, at Madison Park High School in Boston. ## WHAT'S HAPPENING IN PROJECTS AND WORKSHOPS?

<u>Field of Flags</u> The Level IV S<sup>3</sup> Project is planning to create a Field of Flags in front of the school to honor those who have served or are currently serving in the Armed Forces. The flags will be on display from Memorial Day to Flag Day. The flags cost \$5 per flag and the proceeds will benefit the Home Base Program (<u>www.homebaseprogram.org</u>). The program is dedicated to improving the lives for veterans who deployed in support of the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan and live with deployment or combat-related stress and/or traumatic brain injury. Among many other tasks completed, Helping Hands also has helped Ellen Dresser's sailing project by designing and constructing knot tying boards. The students can use these boards to help practice their knots which would be appropriate for tying off a sea vessel. In the near future, the Helping Hands will be traveling to a school's family residence to cash in their coupon which was sold at the annual auction for three hours of physical labor.
