PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

What follows are some excerpts from Updates from the past year. One of the things I love about working in a school is that a school year is a cycle, now that we are coming to the end of a year it has been a tradition for me to take parts of what I have written and put them together to be a reflection back on the year that is now coming to a close. Thanks to all who have read these pieces and thanks for sending us your wonderful children.

September: Of course the story of the swim is unimportant for its change in the body of water but it is an example of having the time to watch and observe and to think. That is what summer can give to us: time to think, see, study and learn. Most of what we learn we are taught, but there are those few moments when we teach ourselves. They are very beautiful especially if we can tell them to someone else. I hope that each of you has some moment during the year when you are told by your student something that they learned because learning is one of the most beautiful things in life.

October: We host Literacy Night In October to promote reading and reading aloud to children. At SSCPS, Literacy Night is quite simple. We invite children to come to school in their pajamas and we read to them. That night we will have teachers and school staff who will read our favorite stories to the kids in several fifteen minute sessions. The children will go from room to room listening to stories with their friends. There will be no long talk about why you should read to kids (stories help explain the world, the world's natural and social histories – stories give children voice and help us all with the emotions of being a person – stories are full of words and words are power) we will just model how to read to children. When you see a practiced reader reading it is not just the text on the page, there is the whole presence of the reader that helps draw in the child and expands the child's mind. The children

wear pajamas to make it fun and so that they can go right to bed afterwards. If there is one thing that can rival reading for a child's education it is a good night's sleep.

November: I am grateful to the teachers of SSCPS because they share with me a commitment to knowing all of our students and teaching them all well. When I was twenty-three I got to know the artist Frank Stella and I asked him for a job in his studio. He told me that he worked with all kinds of caustic materials and that I did not need to work for another artist, that I had what was needed. He told me that what had been essential for him was finding a peer group and together they had changed art. He told me that if artists found each other at the right moment then with that collective energy and thought something new could come into the world. In the seventeen years where my primary profession was making art I had many friends and artists that I admired but I never found that collective group. I am thankful that here at SSCPS I do have such a group of peers and collectively we are making something new. It feels very good to be part of a great experiment that after eighteen years really works. ... I am thankful I have found that group in my current profession, teaching. It was not the group I thought I was looking for but as Robert Frost tells us, "way leads on to way" and Mick Jagger tells us, "you get what you need."

December: On Monday morning I came to school with anxiety but also with the resolve that I would say good morning and sweep the back walk with purpose. I was thrilled to see all of the children and adults. I thought of the 1000 South Shore Charter Public School folks who have relationships with one another through the school. On Monday I saw the same school I left on Friday before any of the children knew [about the shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School], except it was a bit more beautiful because I saw happy children taught by loving adults and my anxiety lessened. It lessened more on Tuesday.

January: On Tuesday I was visiting a Level I classroom and I was present when the teacher was assigning this week's homework. The students were to learn about Susan B. Anthony and women's suffrage. The day before that it was Martin Luther King Day and Barack Obama's second inaugural speech; in his speech he mentioned Seneca Falls, Selma, and Stonewall. As he said it I thought, "wow" I did not think we were there yet. We teach our students about the first two events and it felt good that our students are learning American History and that our second graders will know what a reference to Seneca Falls means. And that they also learn about Selma. We will not teach second graders about Stonewall, that will wait until they are older, but they will learn about how the rights and responsibilities we have today were fought for by brave folks in the past. At Christmas time I was down in Greenwich Village, New York with my youngest daughter Josie. I went to Greenwich Village to buy cheese in a famous cheese store and we saw the sign commemorating Stonewall protests. Josie and I talked about gay rights and how the world has changed. Days do follow days but on some days like Monday it is noticeable how much has changed in our society. Our task as a school is to try to help you prepare your children for the inevitably different future. I think the best way to do that is with love and a lot of facts and of course lots of old fashioned work because some things don't change.

February: I know hearing the forecast on Thursday and Friday I worried that the storm might be a repeat of the Blizzard of '78. I live in Hull and I have seen the pictures of how Hull was devastated by that storm. I have read how it took the town many, many years to recover and I was worried it might happen again. I worried that I might wake up in a drowned town – thankfully that did not happen. There were lessons learned from the Blizzard of '78 and the storms since than that helped us handle this one better. I hope that you are doing okay and if you are not, please let us know and we will do what we can to support you. The South Shore had the heaviest snow and some of the worst damage. We are a community and we will do what we can to help. Please let us know how we can support your students. If there was or is a way for your children to get some fun out of the snow that helps us all.

March: Some of you have asked me if I was able to harvest food from my Hull garden every month this year as I wrote about in last years' Updates. I am thrilled to report that due to the climatic zone changing properties of a cold frame my family ate beautiful turnips and turnip greens in February and

arugula in March. Spring is coming. If you too want to cheat winter I'd love to teach you how to build a cold frame.

May: Here at school teachers have reached out to be the light that drives out darkness and I quote below from an e-mail that Judy Pritchard, one of our Kindergarten teachers, wrote on April 16th.

Hello All,

For any of you who may check their email during vacation...Melissa and I are going to attempt to collect 1000 Acts of Kindness as a response to Monday's tragedy. (We will not be addressing the circumstances with our little ones, but will tie it in to their community service experiences.) We are asking that anyone (faculty, families, or students) who is interested write down any act of kindness they may do, or have done, since Monday on a paper heart and bring it to my classroom (305). Wouldn't it be meaningful if this awful act was buried by acts of kindness??? Thank you! Judy

There are ripples of good coming from many places and may those ripples help folks heal and may those paper hearts bury much evil with kindness.

Thanks for the year and I am looking forward to the doing it all again next year. Thanks for reading.

The Jaguars made their final run at the MCSAO Track Championships

The SSCPS High School track team finished their season on a strong note at the MCSAO championships on June 5th, at Madison Park High School. Out of the 12 charter schools competing for the championship, the boys finished in fifth place and the girls finished third. Medal winners for the boys were Ian Wright (2nd in the 800) and Kaisaac Griffin (3rd in the 800). Strong performances were also registered by Paul Sullivan (4th in the mile and 8th in the 800), Wright (8th in the 400), and a fourth place finish by the 4 x 100 relay team (Darius Anderson, Ian Wright, Jerome Sullivan, and Chad Bruce). Medal winners for the lady Jags were Melissa Theodore (3rd in the 100), Christine Nwafor (3rd in the 400) and Courtney Barry (2nd in the 800).
