FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Last week we celebrated one hundred days of school. Although we have had to move the marking due to four snow days, the occasion remains a teachable moment for students in our earlier grades as they move from concrete understanding to abstract comprehension. One hundred days is also an opportune time to evaluate the current school year and ask ourselves if we are moving forward in the correct direction. It is a time to check our compass to evaluate who we are as a school, what we do well, and where we need to improve.

As a charter school, laws established by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts determine certain elements of our programming. The Common Core State Standards and the MCAS assessments, soon to be replaced by the PARCC assessments, are solid examples of this limited autonomy. However, Massachusetts General Laws, Part I, Title XII, Chapter 71, Section 89 was written, implemented and revised to provide some definition on the purpose of establishing charter school throughout the Commonwealth. Seven purposes are identified within Section 89 (b). The first three purposes of charter schools are defined in Section 89 (b) as the following:

- (i) to stimulate the development of innovative programs within public education;
- (ii) to provide opportunities for innovative learning and assessments;
- (iii) to provide parents and students with greater options in selecting schools within and outside their school districts;

In consideration of the original intent of charter schools and who we are as a school community, we hold true to certain ideals. To be able to balance statewide requirements with innovative learning is indeed a challenge. As a school community we have embraced state mandated accountability and remain encouraged by our growth and achievement in statewide assessments. Yet we have to ask ourselves if success in statewide standardized testing means success in achieving educational innovation and successful student life outcomes.

These are questions that our faculty and administration ask consistently with each new development and requirement from the Massachusetts Department Elementary and Secondary Education. The reconciliation of the new statewide requirements and the original intent of charter schools is the gray area in which we know we must define ourselves.

The reminders of the importance of innovation are frequent. A few weeks ago, the South Shore Charter Public School received notification of eleven students enrolled in the School's innovative art program winning this year's Scholastic Art Awards. Two students at the middle school level received awards; Kenny Dera won Honorable Mention, and Sabrina Sprague was awarded a Gold Key. Students at the high school level in the Graphic Design and Fine Arts Workshops received awards as well. Katherine Griffiths, Jessica Hoffman, Edina Lemkin, Grace Moore, Morgan Rousseau, Kaylee Urquiza-Anagnos and Ila White all received Honorable Mention. Nicolas Moore and Tyler Tsang were awarded the Gold Key. All three Gold Key winners will advance to a national competition and will receive recognition during an exhibition at Boston City Hall from March 7 to March 30.

Another example of our inquiry-based learning model, and the success of our purpose, was evident during the MathCounts South East Regional Competition. This was the first time the South Shore Charter Public School entered a team into this competition. Our math team, Ana Aniagu, Nicky Aniagu, Henry Chao, Zoe Childs, Jared Farmer, and Ryan Gallagher have been practicing for this competition as part of their Project on Level IV. All students performed well; Henry Chao received an award for placing fourth overall and qualified to compete at the State Level MathCounts competition on March 8 at the Wentworth Institute of Technology in Boston.

Our students are exceedingly talented, that is no secret. But talent not nurtured is like a seed in dry sand. This opportunity, fostered by an innovative inquiry-based model of education and a hardworking faculty, Marianne Buckley Curran, Christine Bodnar, and Jody Regan, remind us all of the importance of our original intent.

Events of the past week provide the opportunity for our school community to think about the third purpose of charter schools. The annual Enrollment Lottery was held on Saturday, February 8, 2014. This year was a record year for applications, resulting in 928 applications being entered into the lottery for 63 anticipated openings. In addition to this year's data, Table I provides some essential data on student application trends for our school and district over the past three years.

The data presented on Table I make it challenging to reconcile the third purpose of charter schools with our current reality. Over half of our grade levels have no anticipated openings. Although this may change by the beginning of the next school year, the odds for new families seeking enrollment for their children are difficult to overcome. If the de jure purpose is, to provide parents and students with greater options in selecting schools within and outside their school districts, so few openings create a de facto exclusion from educational opportunity.

And so it is time once again to check our compass and I ask for your help in doing so. Below please find the link to our Annual Parent Survey.
