FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Welcome back! It is difficult to believe that these days and weeks of cold temperatures will bring us to May, placing us all in the home stretch of the school year. Although the amount of tasks needing to be accomplished at this time of year is always great, this spring we have some additional considerations. One of these will happen on May 20 and May 22 when our third grade students will experience a second round of the PARCC, *Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers*, for the End of Year field test.

As you know, our third grade students were among the first in the state to take the PARCC by participating in the field test in April. In Massachusetts approximately 350 districts, over 1,100 schools, approximately 82,000 students in grades 3-11, were part of this initial field test. The April on-line assessment was to measure student math achievement over all elementary years. The PARCC end of year assessment will be criterion-referenced, meaning it has been specifically designed to measure student mastery of the third grade math curriculum. As this is a field study, the real element of the PARCC that is being measured is the assessment.

It is important to reiterate that because of the amount of non-instructional time the PARCC and MCAS assessments consume, third grade students will not be participating in the MCAS Mathematics Assessments. As discussed during the parent coffee in March, parents of third grade students, teachers, and school administrators will not receive individualized student scores. Instead the school will receive a general score and an overview of student performance. However, all third grade students have taken the ELA MCAS and those scores will be made available as has been done in previous years.

We had some interesting feedback from the initial field test in April. Faculty and students reported the PARCC as being more challenging than the MCAS. There were mathematical problems and concepts somewhat new to students. Although no one likes the feeling of being tested on the unfamiliar, we believe this could be a step in the positive direction of increased rigor for all public schools. The Department of Education now points out that despite efforts from school districts across the state, forty percent of high school graduates from public schools entering state colleges and universities have to enroll in remedial, non-credit coursework to be ready for the reading, writing, and math rigors of higher education. In light of this, we welcome change efforts.

One significant concern that surfaced throughout the initial field test is one of technology. PARCC requires a comprehensive transformation to digital learning and on-line assessments. In order to meet the recommended standards for PARCC, the South Shore Charter Public School, and over one third of all schools statewide, are now in need of infrastructure upgrades. Because of this statewide situation, the House Committee on Bonding, Capital Expenditures and State Assets recommended a \$38 million dollar program to upgrade school infrastructures to support digital learning and on-line assessments in November of 2013. The infrastructure bond bill may or may not create some relief for district schools. As a public school district, we are no strangers to the unfunded mandate. However, what the bill does do is provide data that the technology infrastructure in schools throughout the commonwealth is inadequate for the PARCC initiative.

The Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education stated intent to give individual districts two years to make the transition to computer-based assessments. The technology department has taken a hardware inventory and has outlined specific needs within the school. This is done every year as part of the Technology Plan. However, this year it was done with the new PARCC requirements and the goals of the Strategic Plan under consideration. This year the Technology Plan will include laptops and other devices needed for the unique environment created by on-line assessments.
